Bond Questions Are Difficult for Board

How much bond money and how should the bond question be presented to the voters were the big questions discussed by the Spearman School Board Tuesday night.

The seven-man board again went over the long list of things needed by the school to be included in the bond vote. The original list of 24 items has been cut to 11.

The actual costs of some of these needed items are still awaiting estimates. The board is awaiting these figures before setting the amount of the bonds to be voted upon.

The board is divided upon how the bond question should be voted upon. Part of the board wants the question divided into related groups and have the voters decide upon each group. The other board members want to present the

entire issue in one question and let the voters decide yes or no.

Howard Kenyon of Texas Bond Co., met with the board and discussed handling the bond issue for the district when the board decides upon the amount to be put before the voters.

The other business of the board was mostly routine matters.

A new telephone system was approved for the Junior High, Elementary, gym, cafeteria, band and music hall complex.

Trips by Science instructor Robert Barker and Business Manager Orville Latham to attend workshops were approved.

A new Hobart mixer was approved for the Jr. High cafeteria kitchen.

A discussion of policy on the end of school picnics and drivers education in the summer was postponed because Supt. James Bramlett was ill and could not attend the meeting.

The attendance report for the first six weeks showed an average daily attendance of 1,095.35 students per day. The average enrollment for the period is 1,110.34. This gives a 99 percent attendance for the first six weeks.

Spearman's share of the gate receipts in the first eight football games of the year totaled \$5,287.44. The gate is divided equally after officials are paid at all schools except Boys Ranch. Because there is no town there, Boys Ranch does not participate in the gate receipts when it plays on the road and it keeps what is taken in at games played at the ranch.

Morse 4-H's Are Gold Star Winners

Two Morse High School students were named the Gold Star Boy and Girl for Hansford County 4-H clubs at the Annual 40H Achievement Program in the Morse School Saturday night.

The top county awards went to Miss Patricia Henderson and Alan Dixon.

The gold star girl is the 16 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Henderson of Morse. Miss Henderson has been a 4-H club member for eight years and has completed projects in a number of fields, among them clothing, foods, safety, bedroom improvement, junior leadership, electricity and other areas.

She has a number of district and state honors to her credit, notable among them being winner of the junior leadership lab trip in 1964; representing district I in the state dress revue where she placed in the top ten; serving as district council delegate from Hansford county; holding two second and one third place state safety demonstration team awards; district winner in Home Economics program; being honored by the Hansford County Farm Bureau as the outstanding 4-H girl of the year and attending the district electric camp last summer.

Patricia has held every office in her local club and is currently serving as president of the Morse Junior Leaders Club. She is past chairman of the Hansford County Council.

Patricia, a junior in Morse High School, is very active in school activities. She is head cheerleader and vice president of the Student Council.

Alan Dixon has been a 4-H club member for nine years and has completed projects in beef, electricity, horsemanship, rifle team, crops and junior leadership.

Dixon, son of Mrs. Gene Dixon, was a member of the senior rifle team last spring which placed third in district competition at Canyon. He is the boys district council delegate from Hansford County and attended the district electric camp held at Cloudercroft this past summer. He was also honored by the Hansford County Farm Bureau recently as being the most outstanding boy in 4-H for the year.

Electricity has been a project that Dixon has worked on quite a bit. Due to his efforts and those of his subject matter

group in electricity, the record submitted by Hansford County in the electric awards program placed first in district this year.

Another outstanding project undertaken by Dixon has been his junior leadership. In this capacity he has worked on the community improvement program that has been carried out at Morse these past two years. As a result of his leadership efforts, he was a member of the football team, is on the annual staff and a class officer.

As winners of the gold star awards, both Miss Henderson and Alan Dixon will attend the Gold Star Awards banquet this Saturday night in Amarillo. This event, which will have Allen McCloy, also of Morse, serving as master of ceremonies, will honor winners from 22 counties over the Panhandle.

Serving as mistress of ceremonies for the event was Sylvia Parks, chairman of the Hansford County 4-H Council. Others participating in the opening exercises were Gary Heath giving the invocation; David Johnson, the pledge of allegiance; Jan Trindle the 4-H pledge; and group singing led by Evelyn Kelly with Patricia Henderson at the piano.

Entertainment was provided by Wade Parks who presented a magician show. The guest speaker was J.E. Langley of Amarillo, representative of the Santa Fe Railway Company. Langley spoke to the group on the subject of leadership, stressing the ne-

Lynx Seek Eighth Win in Final Game

Spearman's Lynx will end the highly successful 1964 football season Friday night in Shamrock against the Fighting Irish. Game time is 8 p.m. This will be the final game for 11 boys completing their

football careers with the Lynx.

Boys playing their last games will be backs Johnny Crawford, Mike Morris, Ronald McDonald, Jimmy Ownbey and Bill Cator; linemen Wesley Brinkley, Richard Smith, Larry Babbs, Ike Richeson, Gary Haner and Leroy Callaway.

The Lynx will go into this final game as favorites, even though they have absorbed two successive losses. Spearman has lost only two district games, those to Phillips and Dalhart. Shamrock has only beaten Boys Ranch in the district scramble.

Like the Lynx, the Irish do not have an abundance of size. Quarterback Dickie Reeves, who has been running the team since he was a sophomore, throws the ball well.

Reeves at 162 and Jessie Terry at 165 are the two big backs in the Irish attack. Tackle Bobby Isaacs at 160 is their biggest lineman. According to their listed weights, the Irish line will average 160 pounds per man.

Sophomore tackle Randy Moore at 170 is the biggest Lynx starting lineman. The seven starters in the Lynx forward wall will average 149 according to their listed weights. Shamrock runs from the winged T formation with several split ends and flankers split out wide.

Lynx varsity members who will be returning next year include backs Dave Clements, Mike Babbs, Ken Shufeldt, Clayton Cochran, Rennie Berry and Bill Greenway; linemen Harold Adkison, Randy Moore, Mart Brillhart, Gary Gray, Lynn Buzzard, Glenn Blodgett and Skipper Robinson.

Clements Trial Moved Here From Amarillo

Robert Earl Clements of Amarillo will be tried here in 84th District Court on a charge of venue from Amarillo.

Clements is accused in the theft of \$32,690 check from Southwestern Investment Co. in 1962.

He was first indicted on a felony-theft charge and was convicted by a Potter County jury. He was sentenced to two years in prison.

The conviction was nullified by the Court of Criminal Appeals because the indictment on which he was charged failed to name the firm from which the check was allegedly stolen.

A new and corrected indictment was returned by a later grand jury. This indictment charges theft over \$50.

Sheriff J.B. Cooke said this was the first change of venue trial he could remember here.

District Judge Max Boyer will have to set the date of the trial.

First grader Bethany Day, daughter of Mrs. Jeanie Day, will undergo open heart surgery in the Texas Children Hospital in Dallas the first week in December.

The young girl has just returned from the hospital in Dallas after undergoing numerous tests, including heart

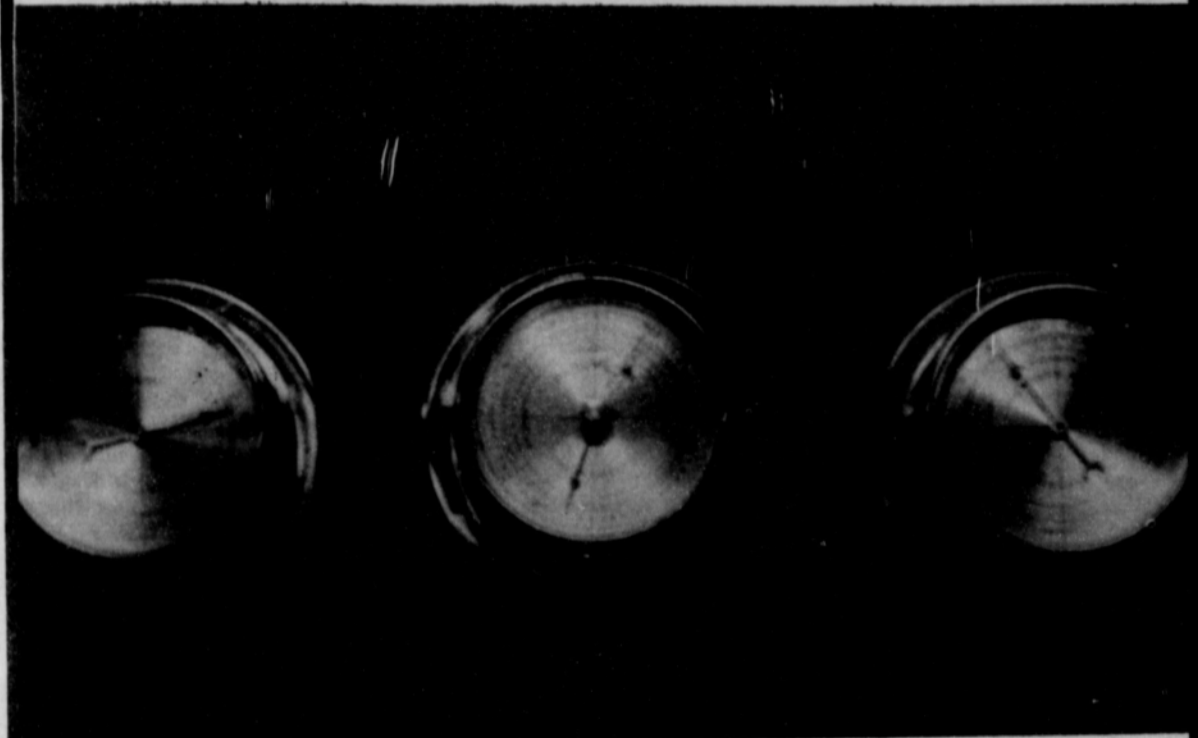

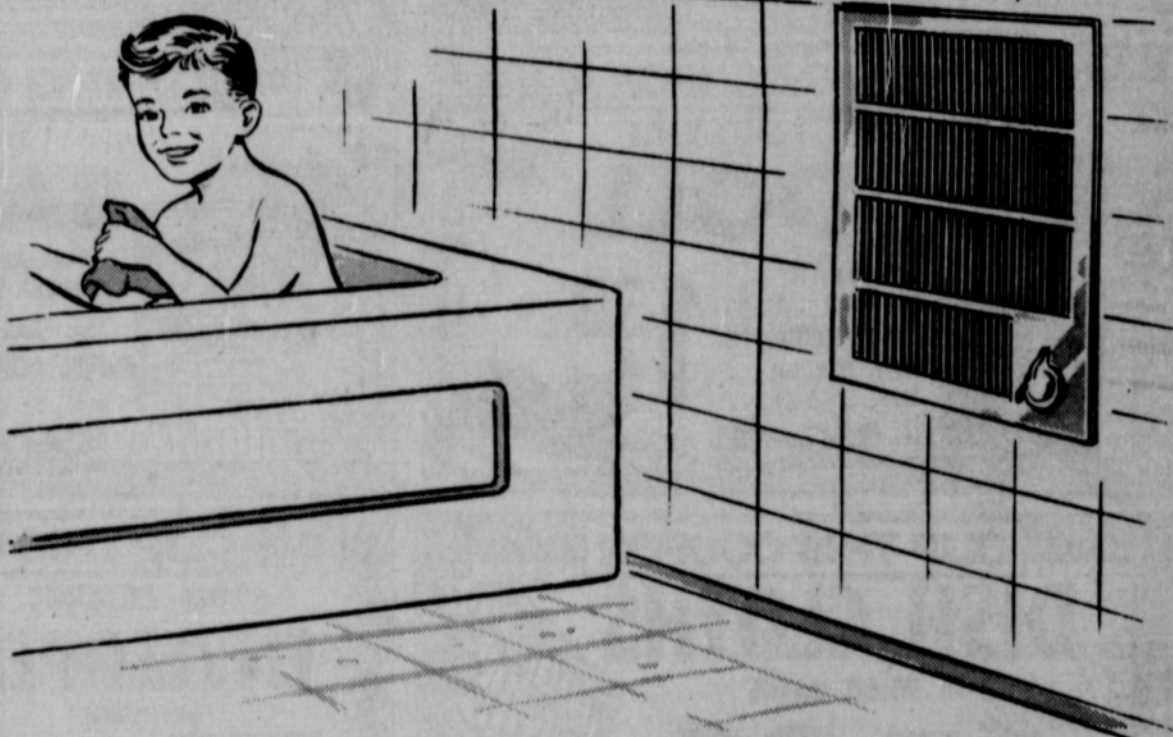

Accent on Health

J.E. Peavy, M.D., Commissioner of Health

Your PH is showing... it always does.

PH (personal hygiene) always shows, whether you've brushed your teeth or combed your hair. And whether or not you've had a bath is quite obvious, too, to those people who work or play around you.

Not only is PH—call it cleanliness if you like—an investment in success but it's a definite investment in health and a disease deterrent.

How is this so? With good PH you can often break the chain of disease transmission. Diseases don't just happen. The circle of disease transmission—simply means that germs which cause disease are permitted to enter your body by some process. For example, if you cut yourself and the wound is not properly cleaned, germs may enter the body and multiply, causing an infection. Or someone with the flu may cough or sneeze in your face. The virus, inhaled into your system, may cause you to have a case of the flu.

The circle, or spiral as it may become, continues when you pass the germ on to someone else.

Handwashing—thorough scrubbing with soap in hot running water—is one of the very best known ways of preventing the spread of disease.

A mother who does not wash her hands before fixing baby's bottle may quite unknowingly precipitate a case of diarrhea.

Or if you are eating out and visit a public restroom with out thoroughly washing your hands you may be inviting a case of infectious hepatitis, diarrhea or worse.

The kitchen at home is certainly not immune. Food handlers especially need to be conscientious handwashers, for theirs is the responsibility for what goes into

the family's mouths. Handwashing is repeatedly emphasized in short courses for foodhandlers conducted by the State Health Department.

Build yourself a high standard of PH through a daily bath, tooth brushing after meals, frequent hand washing and good sanitation in your home.

Sparkling PH will pay off with health and happiness for you and your family.

JURY DUTY

Jury duty is an experience everybody ought to have.

In a criminal case twelve jurors have a duty to do justice as each one sees it, and yet be unanimous. In most trials both sides have much to say, and the evidence is conflicting. The twelve jurors vary in their ability, temperament, character, education, and their experience in the world, and in the question at stake.

Yet a jury made up of both sexes, with wide age and educational differences, jobs and origins must all come up with the same verdict. Upon their verdict much depends—the life or liberty of others, and the public good. So it may take days of talking among themselves, all to agree.

Jury duty calls for insight, common sense, courage, tact, fair-mindedness, patience, (especially toward the jurors who disagree with you), good humor, tolerance, balance, willingness to hear others out and change one's mind, readiness to go over and over the facts to find something to bring agreement. In short, jury duty demands a "decent respect for the opinions" of others.

More and more women share civic duties, especially as jurors. Time was in Texas when women could not serve on juries. They still cannot in four states.

A jury finds facts. It hears and weighs evidence and then comes to a verdict. It does not make the law—the legislature does; and the judge "charges" or instructs the jury concerning the law applicable to the particular case it is considering.

The judge will tell you not to find the accused guilty until he is proved so under strict rules of evidence. If you have any "reasonable doubt,"—not imaginary or far-fetched—acquit the accused.

Civil cases do not demand a moral certainty, merely the "preponderance" of what you regard as reliable and believable evidence.

Consumers Get More Protection

There's more protection on the way for consumers. It will be unlawful, starting next January 1, to label belts by using such words as "leather, hide, or skin" or to use pictures suggesting the hide or skin of animals to describe belts not truly made from animal skin, says Lynn Parks, Extension consumer education specialist.

"Split leather" must then be so marked and not represented as "genuine cowhide," "alligator," or any other term indicating that it is top grain leather, the Texas A&M specialist says.

If a belt is labeled alligator, it must in fact be made from alligator skin and not be cowhide just made to resemble alligator. Labels must indicate, as the case may be, "ground, pulverized, shredded leather, or plastic."

When belt leather has been treated to look like something else, a label must so state. For example, a label might indicate that a product is "Split cowhide with simulated pigskin grain." If another kind of leather, or non-leather material is used for backing, the label must carry this information.

Firemen said the fire in the wastebasket burned through the floor and the fire and basket fell under the floor of the house.

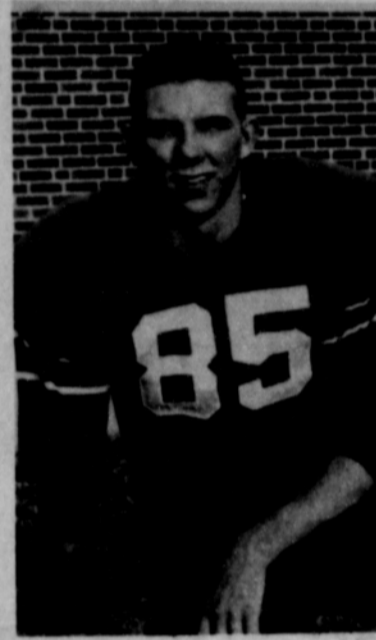
The fire was put out before it could spread. The house was filled with smoke. Bagawell discovered the fire when he came home.
