Community Blood Drive

There will be a Community Blood Drive November 18, 1986 held at the Spearman High School Library from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The drive is sponsored by the Spearman High School Student Council. Everyone is invited to participate. Students who wish to donate blood must be 17 years of age or older and weigh at least 110 pounds. They must have a signed permit from their parents. We encourage all interested adults of the community to donate and to help Spearman High School in this project.

Prior to donating, you should have a good night's rest—at least 6 hours of sleep within the past 24 hours. Eat a good breakfast, even if you usually omit it. You must not have a cold, sore throat or flu. You are eligible to donate blood once every 8 to 10 weeks.

We hope that you will consider sharing your good health by volunteering to donate blood on November 18, 1986 when the Blood Center comes to our school.

Here are some of the facts about AIDS that are furnished by the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services that concern the donating and receiving of blood donations.
IS THERE A DANGER OF CONTRACTING AIDS FROM DONATING BLOOD?

No. Blood banks and other blood collection centers use sterile equipment and disposable needles. The need for blood is great, and people who are not at increased risk for getting AIDS are urged to continue to donate blood as they have in the past.
IS THERE A LABORATORY TEST FOR AIDS?

As with many other diseases, there is no single test for diagnosing AIDS. There is now a test for detecting antibodies (substances produced in the blood to fight disease organisms) to the virus that causes AIDS. Presence of HTLV-III antibodies means that a person has been infected with that virus; it does not tell whether the person is still infected. The antibody test is used to screen donated blood and plasma and assist in preventing cases of AIDS resulting from blood transfusions or use of blood products, such as Factor VIII, needed by patients with hemophilia. The test is also available through private physicians, most State or local health departments and at other sites.
CAN AIDS BE PREVENTED?

Yes. Cases of AIDS related to medical use of blood or blood products are being prevented by use of HTLV-III antibody screening tests at blood donor sites and by members of high risk groups voluntarily not donating blood. Heat treatment of Factor VIII and other blood products helps prevent AIDS in patients with hemophilia and other clotting disorders. There is no vaccine for AIDS itself. However, there is good reason to believe that individuals can reduce their risk of contracting AIDS by following existing recommendations. Communities can help prevent AIDS by vigorous efforts to educate and inform their populations about the illness, with special emphasis on educational activities for members of high risk groups. Meanwhile, the effort to produce vaccines and drugs against AIDS continues.

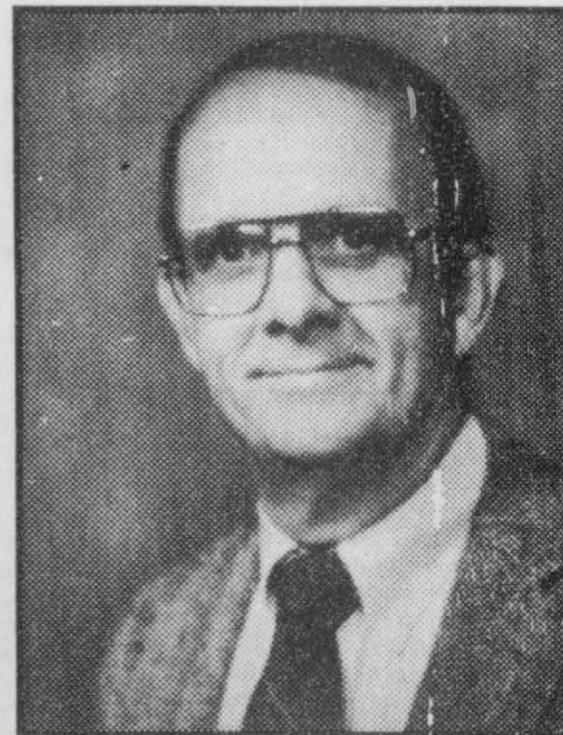

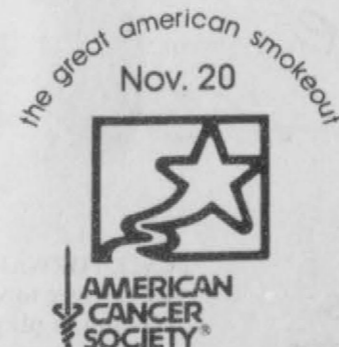

Games Dieters Play

One out of every three Americans is on a weight reducing diet. With so much dieting going on, why are so many Americans—young and old—still overweight?

One reason may be that while it's fashionable to "be on a diet," it's actually very difficult to permanently change eating and exercise habits to maintain weight loss. As a result, Americans have devised a clever array of Diet Games—mental maneuvers designed to create the illusion that we're dealing with a weight problem.

One very popular game, **Joker's Wild**, can be played alone or in a group. The object is to avoid actually ever starting a diet by claiming, "I have to start a new diet tomorrow." Usually this devious play is preceded by a request for "just one more helping of that wonderful cherry pie ala mode because..." The pros at this game dream of that sleek new figure, but anticipation is the only hand they're dealt. If you've been playing this game, stop drawing cupcakes and cash in your potato chips. Get started on a sensible weight reduction program today.

Humdrum Squares is another common game amid the thick of midriff. In this game players subject themselves to a steady diet of "X's" and "O's." The object is to create a diet regime so monotonous that your eyes glaze and your hands shake at the mere mention of grapefruit and poached eggs or tuna fish and pickles. Of course, you can't maintain this facade for very long and your near fast is followed by a calorie binge of immense proportions.

The solution here, of course, is to choose a balanced, nourishing weight loss program—one which allows a variety of food choices from avocado to zucchini.

Then there's the sportsman who plays **Wheel of Portion**. He eats only the "legal" foods prescribed on a diet—but in quantities to feed the proverbial army. In this game no one loses—everyone gains.

Of course, **Wheel of Portion** players are really just poor judges of amounts. Distinguishing between three and six ounces of meat or between a quarter-cup and a half-cup of milk is difficult unless you take the time to weigh and measure.

If this is your diet ploy, invest in a food scale and a set of measuring cups. It won't take long until you can accurately judge the correct amounts—and you'll be amazed at the effect on your waistline.

A variation of **Wheel of Portion** is a diet game called **Let's Sneak a Meal**. Here, the rule is "if someone doesn't see me eat it, it doesn't really count." While your friends and co-workers may be impressed with your public displays of willpower, the midnight raids to the fridge and that bag of Keeblers in the glove compartment are not fooling anybody or your body.

You can help eliminate sneaky eating by keeping a daily food diary. The frequency of your "occasional" indulgences are much harder to deny when they appear in black and white. In addition, a food diary will help you become aware of where and when you tend to stray. At those times, remember: nothing tastes as good as being thin feels. You will find that compliments make you feel so much better than cookies.

These are just a few of the games we use to avoid the demands of an effective weight loss program. But the stakes of the game are changing. Risk of hypertension, heart disease, diabetes, and even some types of cancer increases for individuals who are overweight. Don't play diet games. You may find your health in **Jeopardy**.

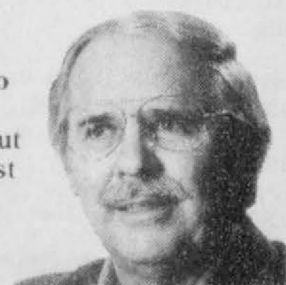

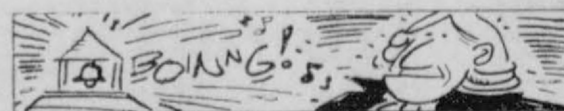

Final Planting November 15

November 15 is the Final Planting Date for Insured Barley and Wheat in Hansford County, Texas, according to Jackie Harris, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Insured Barley and Wheat planted by November 15 must be reported by November 30 in order to receive full Crop Insurance Coverage. The Acreage Report reflects the actual Acreage planted and reported by the farmer.

"During the Growing Season, if damage occurs, notice should be given promptly," Harris said.

Crop Insurance based on actual production history (aph), is available this year to producers of Wheat, Barley, Oats and Rye in addition to Corn, Grain Sorghum, Soybeans, Peanuts, Cotton, Rice and other Crops.

"Increasingly, our Insured Producers and discovering that with a yield guarantee which reflects production capability, Crop Insurance establishes a Farm Income Floor. Thus, Cash Flow and the ability to repay a loan may be more accurately projected," explained Harris.

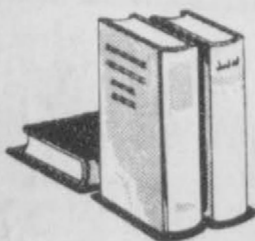
General Telephone customers in Spearman can begin making direct-dialed long-distance calls using the long-distance company of their choice when a service called Equal Access starts November 22.

"With Equal Access, customers select a preferred long-distance company for '1+0+' calls," said Robert Meyers, Operation Manager. "Customers also can use other long-distance companies by dialing their five-digit access code."

Customers who chose their preferred long-distance company during the initial sign up period will begin using that service on November 22, 1986.

"Customers who did not make a choice will receive a mailing that includes the name of the long-distance company randomly assigned to them," Meyers said. The assignment was made using a formula based on the percentage of customers who did choose long-distance companies. For instance, if 30 percent of those customers chose Company C as their presubscribed long-distance company, then 30 percent of the customers who did not make a selection could be assigned to Company C.
