## SPEARMAN TO BE IN W.T. ECONOMIC STUDY

### 15 West Texas Towns To Face Task Force

Spearman is one of 15 West Texas towns to be the subject of an intensive project by the Small Town Task Force of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Wayne B. (Red) Smith said Friday he had not received any notification of when the study group will be here.

The first phase of this project is supposed to be initiated this week when members of the Task Force meet with leaders of the towns for the completion of a questionnaire.

Other towns selected for the pilot studies include Anson, Bronte, Crane, Dublin, Garden City, Hale Center, Hamilton, Littlefield, Mentone, Olney, Robert Lee and Throckmorton.

Other cities with less than 12,000 population will be included in the plan as soon as the pilot questionnaires are studied by the Task Force.

The plan calls for the Task Force members to meet with the mayor, chamber of commerce president and manager, school officials, newspaper men, county commissioners, cultural leaders, womens' club presidents, youth leaders and other key business people in the selected town.

An in-depth questionnaire covering community problems, assets and potentials, prepared by a panel of specialists, will be completed by the local leaders. Recommendations for solutions of problems or exploitation of assets and potentials will not be made at this time. These recommendations will be made later, after the study is completed.

Tourist attractions, school systems, recreational and cultural facilities, industrial potentials, transportation, water supplies, churches, tax structures, agricultural and ranching and many other facets of a community's complex make-up will be examined by the local leaders.

C.L. Cooke, Fort Worth, chairman of the Task Force, said at the initial meeting in Olney, "The recognition of the existence of a problem or the awareness of an asset or potential by local leadership is the first and most important step in arriving at proper answers. We think the questionnaire will assist materially in this respect."

After the on-the-spot studies are completed, six hearings will be held in various geographical locations in the West Texas area. Dates and places for the hearings will be announced next week.

The findings will follow the general format of congressional hearings. Testimony will be heard by representatives of towns affected and presentations on specific subjects will be made by outstanding specialists. Questioning of the "witnesses" will be conducted by a member of the panel.

The findings of six hearings will be prepared by subcommittees, compiled and published in a special "white paper" on March 15.

Solutions to the individual community problems will be recommended by the committee in a report to the town concerned.

Six subjects have been selected for the hearings. They are (1) The Role of City and County Governments in Developing the Small Community; (2) The Role of State and Federal Governments in Developing the Small Community; (3) Industrial Potentials of Small Towns; (4) Educational and Recreational, Cultural and Tourist Opportunities of the Small Town; (5) The Responsibility of Metropolitan Areas to Develop Small Towns in Their Areas; and (6) The Role of Community Leaders in Developing Their Towns.

John Ben Sheppard, president of W.T.C.C., in announcing the formation of the Small Town Task Force, said, "More than half of our towns in West Texas with less than 12,000 population have lost ground in the past 10 years. This is a trend which must be reversed."

"We believe that a concentrated effort by knowledgeable people can assist in the development of assets and the minimizing of problems. If the leadership of a community sincerely wants to "do something" about their town, we can help them."

Although the theme of each hearing has been established, it is anticipated that testimony

## Local Auto Dealers Need More Vehicles

The planned 8.1 percent cut-back in production by General Motors was not greeted with enthusiasm by the two General Motors Dealers in Spearman.

Ford and Chrysler products dealers here said they were receiving all the cars they were ordering now. These two big auto makers have indicated they will also trim production.

General Motors dealers in Spearman are crying for more cars to meet their sales demands and both said they were losing sales because they did not have or could not get what the customers wanted.

Jimmy Shieldknight of Excel Chevrolet-Olds said his firm lost sales on 14 vehicles last month because they could not get the cars, trucks or pick-ups customers wanted.

Shieldknight said his firm was still about 30 orders behind on vehicles they have sold and the customers are waiting on delivery.

Most of the sales lost here have gone to dealers in Oklahoma, Kansas and South Texas; because, Shieldknight said, most other local area dealers are having problems getting delivery.

The Chevrolet dealers said the shortage of trucks and pick-ups is severe.

Shieldknight is expecting the situation to improve. The GM assembly is supposed to be closing down for eight days to rearrange production schedules and he expects this to correct much of the shortage.

Doug Connelly of North

Plains Truck and Implement, the Buick and Pontiac dealer said the demand for cars was just greater right now than can be delivered.

Connelly said he felt like the local shortage was caused in part by the central sales planning of the companies.

They figure sales on the basis of population and they just don't know this Panhandle county.

Connelly said he lost sales on five Buicks in one day last week just because he could not get the cars the people wanted.

We had three loads of cars last week, but I would like to have 20 more cars to meet the Christmas rush.

Connelly expects the condition to improve since delivery is improving and apparently the shortage over the area is beginning to be filled.

Connelly said he had cars on the showroom floor, but they were not what most people were wanting.

He, too, is having trouble getting all the trucks and pick-ups he can sell.

Tommy Russell at Joe Traylor Ford said the situation with Fords is improving. After the first three months the delivery situation has improved.

He said they were getting good delivery on cars and trucks and pick-ups now.

A Spearman Motor representative said they were having no trouble getting Chrysler products.

## Wilde Leads Lynxettes By Gruver

Great second and fourth quarter scoring surges by Barbara Wilde gave the Spearman Lynxettes a 39-35 win over the Gruver girls here Friday night.

The tall, fast scoring Lynxette scoring machine scored from the inside and outside and picked off some Gruver passes for points when they were badly needed.

In the second quarter when Gruver had taken the lead, Wilde scored, then took the ball away from the Gruver guards and scored again to regain the lead.

The score was tied 5-5 at the end of the first quarter. Wilde scored 12 points in the second quarter to lead Spearman to a 19-13 halftime lead.

Gruver closed the gap in the third quarter when Karen Wright started hitting for Gruver. The score was tied 26-26 at the end of three quarters.

Lynxette defenders had a hard time keeping up with the speedy Gruver forwards. Wright managed to screen off her defender, Nancy McCullough, in the second half and was open for numerous shots.

Sandra Shufeldt, a freshman who plays on both ends of the court, turned in some good rebounding and helped McCullough hold down the Gruver girls in the fourth quarter.

An Editorial

Resolution

An Italian resolution, supported by the United States, calls upon the United Nations to name a committee to study the realities of the question of Chinese representation in the United Nations.

Right away the Communist Chinese called attention to some of the realities. One of these is that the Peking regime's view of association with the United Nations is that the United Nations would have to join Red China, not the other way around.

The New China News Agency which says what the government thinks said: "Everybody knows China's stand toward the United Nations under U.S.-Soviet control."

We are referred, then, to what Red China has said repeatedly about the subject. It demands as conditions for membership a complete reorganization of the United Nations and expulsion of one of the charter members, Nationalist China.

Last year when the question of Red Chinese membership was being considered the official Red Chinese press said it would be necessary for the United Nations to condemn "U.S. imperialism" repeal resolutions condemning Communist China and North Korea as aggressors and to exclude "all imperialist puppets."

When proponents of the admission of Red China talk about the realities of the situation they usually have in mind the fact that the Communist regime has physical control of mainland China and of about 700 million Chinese. It is argued that these have no representation in the United Nations.

But the reality is that the Peking regime represents nothing more than the gangster organization that holds the masses under police-state control. The original representative of the Chinese people still exists as a functioning government on Chinese territory.

The current resolution for a study of the realities mentions the realities of the political situation and is generally interpreted to mean that consideration should be taken of the fact that there really are two Chinese governments and of the advisability of representation by both of them in the United Nations.

The reality is that neither the Peking government nor the Taipei government will have anything to do with dual representation.

A year's study by a committee should not be necessary in order to discover these realities.

Poverty Declines' With Education

Poverty is more widespread among Spanish-Americans in Texas than in other Southwestern States.

The 139,663 families of Spanish surname in Texas whose incomes were less than \$3,000 constituted nearly 52 per cent of all Mexican-American families in the state and 57 per cent of all poor Latin-Americans in the five states of Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico, and Texas.

These are among the findings of a study recently completed by W. K. Upham and D. E. Wright of Texas A&M University's Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology.

Since the average Spanish-American family had 4.6 members compared with 3.2 for Anglo-white and 3.4 for Negroes, the relative economic and social deprivation would appear even greater for the Latins, say the researchers.

Analyzing the 67 counties with the largest Latin populations, containing 93 per cent of the Spanish families, Upham and Wright found the incidence of poverty ranged from a low of 18 per cent in Jefferson County to a high of 83 per cent in Dimmit County.

(Con't. from page 1.) and questions will lead into many other related subjects vital to the problems of small towns. Each town will be asked to have one or more representatives at each hearing if possible. This will enable the community to have a comprehensive background on all the subjects discussed, according to Cooke.

After the results of the hearings are published, the town's leaders are expected to hold another local meeting at which time the findings of the Task Force and their recommendations will be examined by the leadership of the town.

Additional consultations will be arranged for those towns that want further information and advice.

"This can be the greatest movement for the benefit of the smaller town that has ever been undertaken," said Cooke, "if the people of the community really want to move forward."
