


Three residents of Hansford County sustained injuries Wednesday night shortly after 10:00 P.M. when the pick-up truck in which they were riding struck and killed a calf three miles West of

Spearman on Highway 15. Hansford County Chief Deputy Sheriff John Mull said that the pick-up was driven by 19 year old Darrell Wayne West went out of control after it struck a calf and then struck a culvert. West was admitted to Hansford Hospital with undetermined injuries while two passengers Vicki Britt 21, of Gruver and Donna Riley, 21, of Gruver apparently sustained serious injuries and were transferred by ambulance to Amarillo.

New Exhibits At Amarillo Art Center

opened two new exhibits last week; the prints of eight abstract artists and the puppets of world-famous puppeteer, Frank Paris, The two exhibits will be showing the Plaza Level galleries until January 7th, while the fabulous Faberge exhibit con-tinues in the third floor galler

The eight contemporary artists exhibited are Mel Bochner. Sol LeWitt, Robert Mangold, Brice Marden, Agnes Martin. Edda Renouf, Dorothea Rockburne, and Robert Ryman. Although it is unusual to show so many artists together, their works are related to each other by two factors: The first is that all eight artists are printmakers, working in the difficult medium "Intaglio" printing. "Intaglio" is a process of engraving, drypoint, etching or aquatint as old as Rembrant. While the technical process of print-making has not changed in 500 years, the subject matter of prints has been through many stages of evolution. The problem of making new images with old techniques is one of the main subjects of this exhibit.

The second common factor among the artists is the form of their abstraction. They call themselves "minimalists", a term invented by art critics in the midsixties to describe younger artists who had rejected the emotionalism of their "abstractexpressionist" predecessor. The minimalists originated a style of art that is simple, clear and direct, dealing only with form and scale as art. attempt is made to analyze or represent an image. The line of paper is the art, not what it represents to a viewer. Minimal abstraction must be approached with an open mind, claim the artists, as it is not always clear at a glance what

they are trying to accomplish. The puppets of Frank Paris are the subject of the second new exhibit. Frank Paris was born in Frederick, Oklahoma and grew up in Amarillo and Borger. In 1930, he performed his first professional show at the Amarillo Tri-State Fair. In 1937, he made an innovation in puppeteering which launched him into a bright and long career as puppet-maker and performer. He did away with the standard marionette state.

The Amarillo Art Center showing himself as part of the

performance of his puppets. Frank Paris and his puppets have performed in New York's leading theaters and supper clubs, including Radio City Music Hall, the Persian Room and Madison Square Garden. He was one of the first to perform puppets for television. Among his most famous creations is the puppet "Howdy Doody," which had it's own

show for years. Frank Paris made his real name, however, in the supper clubs with his delightful foradults-only figures of "Carmen Miranda'', Vera Zorina'', "Sonja Henie'', "Doopey", and "The Ostrich Ballerina". He works currently with Bob Baker's Marionette Theater in Hollywood doing special projects for television and the movies. A recent accomplishment is the construction of the extraterrestrial beings in "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" and robots for the proposed movie 'Star Trek."

Frank Paris builds and sculpts his own puppets. Many of his marionettes are quite large. 'Carmen Miranda' is 31/2 feet tall and wears a full satin skirt with over 4,000 sequins which Paris sewed on himself.

Unfortunately, Frank Paris cannot be here to perform the puppets during the run of the exhibit, but a video tape of him making and performing the puppets will be available in the gallery via closed circuit TV. On December 10th, the Art Center will host another "Family Day" with special activities and programming designed around the puppet exhibition. It will be a special day for marionette lovers of all ages.

Tours are still being scheduled regularly for the "Treasures by Peter Carl Faberge and Other Master Jewellers.' which will continue at the Art Center until January 7th. Over 15,000 visitors have already viewed the exhibit, and those who have not are urged to do so







The Legislation, which was signed on October 18, by President Carter, also permits certain severely disabled veterans to obtain a VA grant of up to \$30,000 to buy or adapt a residence to meet their special needs, Coker said.

new bill should be of special duty service required for eligibility for VA home, condominium or mobile home loan guaranty benefits.

Vietnam Era veterans now need to have served only 90 days on active duty--one day of which must have been during the period of August 5, 1964, to May 7, 1975--to be eligible for these VA benefits.

'The new law brings th eligibility requirements for Korean Conflict veterans.' Coker said.

In addition, the law authorizes VA to guarantee loans for converted condominiums as of July 1, 1979. The agency currently is authorized to guarantee condominium loans in buildings constructed and sold as this type of dwelling.

Coker said another significant section of the legislation restructures VA's mobile home loan program--setting a \$17,500 loan maximum and extending single-wide mobile homes to 15 years, an increase of 36 months.
