I was in charge of the shore patrol. My men had "billyclubs" and knew how to use them. I had only an SP band around my arm and Lt (jg) bars on my shoulder.

At the stroke of 12, bottles were being thrown, drinks were thrown into faces, and fights began. The place was filled with Brazilian and American soldiers, sailors, and marines. The crew of the old USS

ager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, this new tax provision is one part of the 1983 law passed to put the Social Security system on a sound financial footing. Talbot said taxes collected under the new law will be returned to the Social Security trust funds, providing new revenue to help assure the ability of the system to pay future benefits.

In January, all those who received Social Security payments in 1984 will be sent a statement showing the amount of benefits received that year. Retired and disabled workers, eligible spouses, widows and the caretakers of child beneficiaries will get Form SSA-1099 sometime in January 1985, Talbot said. The information on the Form SSA-1099 is also provided to the Internal Revenue Service.

Like an annual statement from a bank showing the amount of interest earned in a year, Form SSA-1099 is a record of income which may be subject to federal income tax, and it should be kept with other tax records. The form should not be returned to Social Security, nor be sent to IRS with a person's tax returns. The Form SSA-1099 includes an explanation the figures shown and a of toll-free number to call for more information.

Along with the Form SSA-1099, Social Security beneficiaries will receive a worksheet, IRS Notice 703, to help them find out quickly if part of their benefits may be subject to tax. Most people will not owe any tax on their benefits. Talbot stressed. If more information is needed, a free booklet ---Publication 915, Tax Information on Social Security and Railroad Retirement Benefits--is available at any Social Security or Internal Revenue Service office, Talbot said. He also suggested watching for more articles in the newspaper about the income amounts which determine whether or not Social Security benefits are subject to tax, and the amount of benefits subject to tax.

### **Hansford County residents** have tax refunds due

'Tis the giving season, and the Interal Revenue Service is trying to give 4194 taxpayers in the North Texas area the refunds it has been unable to deliver to them. "The total owed in this year's undelivered refund program is \$1,913,913," said Whittenburg, Chief of the Dallas IRS Taxpayer Service Division. "That's an average refund of \$456.85, although the range goes all the way from \$1 to \$22,416!"

Ms. Whittenburg said that the most common reason for IRS' inability to deliver the refunds is attributable to taxpayers' moving after they've filed their returns and neglecting to notify IRS and the post office of their new address. "Even moving from one apartment to another in the same complex could be the reason for the snafu," she explained.

"We're asking the news media to

#### checks in hopes that the taxpayers themselves, or maybe friends or relatives, will spot their names and contact us with their correct address. Last year, a relative of a Texas man. who was on a missionary assignement in Africa, discovered his name on our list published in a local newspaper. Within 2 weeks, the missionary had sent in his claim for his overdue refund check. I doubt that we could have found this taxpayer any other way."

Kansas City, Missouri, December 18, 1984 -- A listing of 1.701 registered Hereford cows has been granted special recognition by the American Hereford Association. Cows named in this elite group have combined the single most important trait of fertility. with the second most important trait, the trait of growth of the cow's offspring.

To be a member of this group, a cow must meet very high standards in that she must be four years of age or older, must have been 25 months of age or younger when she had her first calf, have a calving interval of 370 days or less, and her calves must have weaned at least five percent above the average of her herd. One of the calculating tools used for determining the "Most Efficient Cow' is the MPPA, or most probable producing ability, which compares dams which do not have the same number of calf records in their averages. MPPA is most halpful to the breeder in identify. ing the highest producing cows to be kept.

### Only some one-half of one percent of the nation's registered

Hereford breeding cows can meet the rigid standards to attain "Most Efficient" status. H.H. Dickenson, executive vice-president of the American Hereford Association, Kansas City, explained, "Because of different management systems, many cows do not have the opportunity to be listed, however, those making the list are efficient, productive cows. and are deserving of special recognition."

The list contains 1,701 cows representing 374 breeders from "This widespread 30 states. distribution in numbers and area further reflects the Hereford cow's ability to adapt to different climates and management programs," Dickenson added.

Cows ranking first through tenth in calving interval included 3rd Place to L.M. Patterson, Jr., Spearman, Tx. LMP L1 Lady 7912. The calving interval was 322.

4th Place was a tie between L.M. Patterson, Jr., Spearman, Tx.

## Ninety-nine years for fraudulent promoter

Peggy E. Stines, age 43, was sentenced on Friday, December 14, 1984, to serve 99 years in prison for her participation in a scheme which ultimately took approximately \$17,000,000 from over 1200 investors. U.S. Federal District Judge Jerry Buckmeyer, Dallas, sentenced Stines to the lengthy prison term after she was convicted on all counts of a 23-count indictment, charging her and her husband, Donald R. Stines, with mail fraud and induoing interstate travel to invest in a scheme.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Cheryl Wattley, who prosecuted the govvernment's case, stated that Peggy Stines, while doing business as North Texas Film Processors, Inc., and Garland Film

Stines, commented about how she had ruthlessly defrauded the life savings from elderly and invalid victims. He described her actions as "cold, calculating, and heart-

According to Postal Inspector in Charge D.C. Strader of Fort Worth, the investigation revealed that Stines continued to recruit new investors and spend money recklessly, even after postal inspectors made her aware she was under investigation.

Trial for her husband, Donald Stines, is scheduled to begin Janary 7, 1985. He has been charged with 11 counts of mail fraud for his alleged participation in the scheme.

A. In part, the answer to your question depends upon the cause of the elevated blood pressure, since some of them are quite amenable to permanent cure. However, esse...... hypertension is the most common form of this disease and tends to persist for long periods of time. It may be benefited by medications, but if this is discontinued, the pressure usually works its way back up.

#### Scrapbook For **1985 Memories**

1. You will need two pieces of cardboard that are 9" x 12". Cut 1" off the short end of each piece.

2. Decorate the 4 pieces with pictures from magazines. A thin coat of shellac keeps it clean.

3. After the shellac is dry, paste construction paper on the inside of the covers.

4. Punch holes in the 1" pieces, 2" from the bottom and the top. Make sure each piece is marked exactly the same as the other.

5. Tape the 1" piece to the larger piece with strong binding tape leaving the inside tape loose enough so that the large piece can bend outward easily.

6. Punch holes in 81/2" x 11" piece of construction paper to match the holes in the 1" piece, using as many pieces of paper as you'd like. You can add more later if you wish.

7. Put the paper between the book covers. Line up the holes and thread a long shoe lace or a ribbon through the holes and tie in a bow.

8. Collect clippings, pictures, etc. all year for souvenirs to place in your memory book.

Changes in body weight or decreases in daily stress may lower the blood pressure so that medication isn't necessary. For this ytpe of hypertension a patient should expect to take medications for several years at least.

Q. I've been treated for high blood pressure for a couple of years and find that every summer I tend to break out in a rash which last well into fall. Is this common with high blood pressure?

A. No, but it is a common side effect of taking certain medications often used to treat hypertension. The "thiazide" diuretics do cause what we call photosensitivity in some people, and during the summer when they are out in the sun, the exposed areas of the body (face, arms and legs) may erupt in a persistent rash. It seems to be the combination of the medication and the sun that causes the trouble. You might ask your

Q. What kinds of hypertensive disease can be helped surgically?

A. Certain tumors of the adrenal gland cause the blood pressure to rise, and removal of these tumors allows the pressure to resume normal levels. Obstruction in the artery leading to the kidney may also cause hypertension and surgical correction of the obstruction cures the problem.

Q. My doctor says I have high blood pressure and suggests I take medication for it. I feel fine, and have never missed a day's work or had any kind of symptom. Does it seem reasonable to take medication when a person feels perfectly O.K.?

A. It makes excellent sense to treat elevated blood pressure regardless of whether or not you have symptoms.

#### New Year




