All-district defense included Steve Burke of Spearman; Ricky

Lopez of Spearman; and center Teddy Vela of Spearman. Also Damon Goodheart, a lineman from Spearman.

Honorable mention defense: included Ross Donahue and lineman Karl Bynum. Linebackers on the honorable mention team included Mack McLain. Coach of the year in District 1-AA was Danny Chisum of Sunray.

We would like to congratulate Larry Lanier for his fine record this year. His 1-AA district

co-champion Lynx lost only one district game, and actually lost to only two teams this year. White Deer beat the Lynx in their opening game 7-6 and eliminated the Lynx in the bi-district game.

The sports department feels that Larry Lanier should have been named along with Danny Chisum as a coach of the year. His Lynx had an excellent season and actually outplayed Panhandle for the first 15 minutes of their district ball game in Spearman.

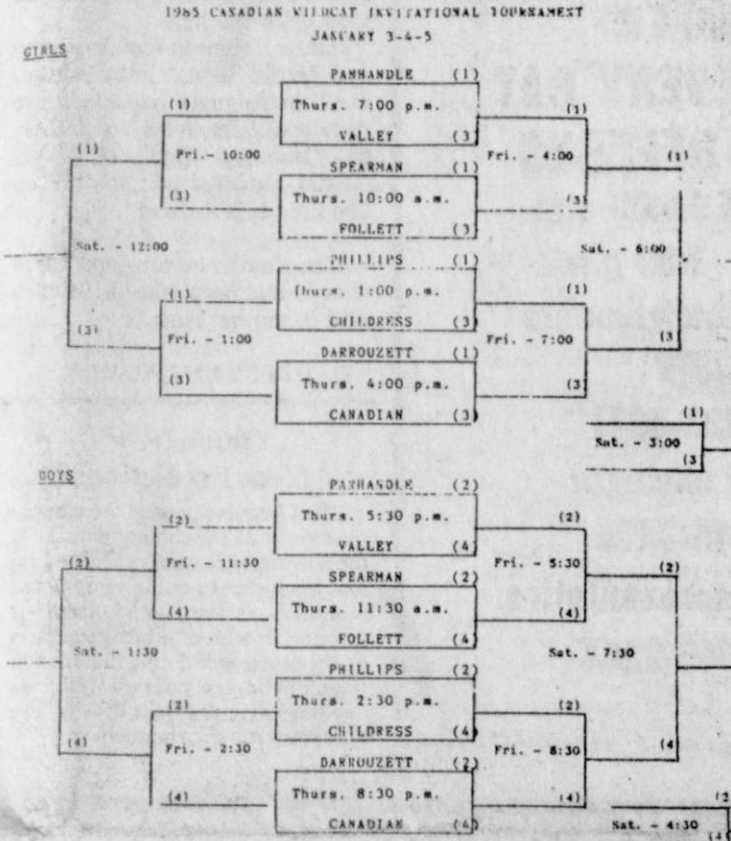

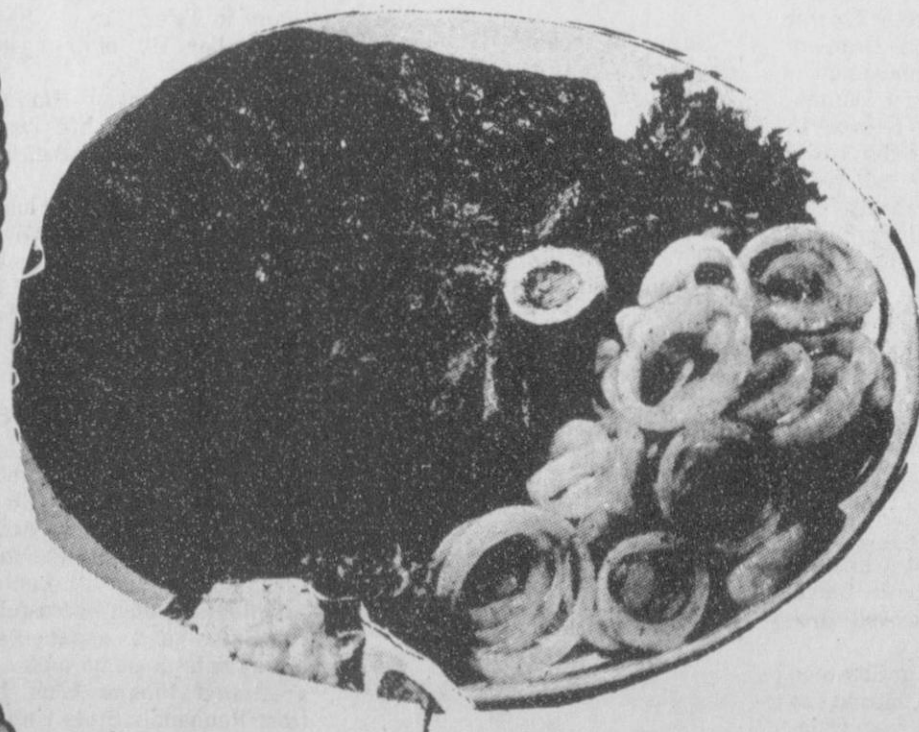

To the Editor:
Usually, New Year's Eve brings back so many happy memories, such as trips to Times Square in the old days. 40 years ago, I spent my most horrible New Year's Eve.

My old ship, the USS PATOKA (AO-9), a tanker, pulled into the port of Maceio, Brazil. The PATOKA had to supply a shore patrol to supervise behavior in a large ballroom-bar. I was in charge of the shore patrol. My men had "billyclubs" and know how to use them. I had only an SP band around my arm and Lt (jg) bars on my shoulder.

At the stroke of 12, bottles were being thrown, drinks were thrown into faces, and fights began. The place was filled with Brazilian and American soldiers, sailors, and marines. The crew of the old USS

Social Security tax for first time

People may owe income tax on part of their Social Security benefits if they had substantial income in 1984 in addition to Social Security. It is estimated that only one out of 10 Social Security beneficiaries will owe tax on their benefits, and in no case will more than one half of annual benefits be subject to tax.

According to Jim Talbot, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office, this new tax provision is one part of the 1983 law passed to put the Social Security system on a sound financial footing. Talbot said taxes collected under the new law will be returned to the Social Security trust funds, providing new revenue to help assure the ability of the system to pay future benefits.

In January, all those who received Social Security payments in 1984 will be sent a statement showing the amount of benefits received that year. Retired and disabled workers, eligible spouses, widows and the caretakers of child beneficiaries will get Form SSA-1099 sometime in January 1985, Talbot said. The information on the Form SSA-1099 is also provided to the Internal Revenue Service.

Like an annual statement from a bank showing the amount of interest earned in a year, Form SSA-1099 is a record of income which may be subject to federal income tax, and it should be kept with other tax records. The form should not be returned to Social Security, nor be sent to IRS with a person's tax returns. The Form SSA-1099 includes an explanation of the figures shown and a toll-free number to call for more information.

Along with the Form SSA-1099, Social Security beneficiaries will receive a worksheet, IRS Notice 703, to help them find out quickly if part of their benefits may be subject to tax. Most people will not owe any tax on their benefits, Talbot stressed. If more information is needed, a free booklet—Publication 915, Tax Information on Social Security and Railroad Retirement Benefits—is available at any Social Security or Internal Revenue Service office, Talbot said. He also suggested watching for more articles in the newspaper about the income amounts which determine whether or not Social Security benefits are subject to tax, and the amount of benefits subject to tax.

Irrigation conference to spotlight new methods

AMARILLO—the results producers and researchers are having with two new methods of irrigation and displays of new equipment will be featured Jan. 17 at the High Plains Irrigation Conference here. The annual program will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd., West.

Low-energy precision application (LEPA) and surge irrigation systems will be examined from the crop producer's viewpoint, said Leon New, agricultural engineer and irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. New is conference coordinator.

"Considerable interest and use of these two improved irrigation methods have developed during the past two growing seasons," New said. Growers will share their experiences with the methods and equipment, researchers and Extension specialists will discuss them, and manufacturers and dealers will show their equipment, he said.

The LEPA method involves

droplines attached to center pivots; these apply water close to the ground, reducing water application losses and mainline pressure. "This more efficient irrigation system offers growers a way to offset irrigation costs," the Extension engineer said.

Developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock and Halfway, LEPA is increasingly being adopted by growers and shows considerable promise in Extension field demonstrations in 1983-84, New said.

The Extension specialist said that rapid acceptance of surge irrigation, combined with intense demands for soil moisture caused some disappointment among growers this season. He said improved surge valves and controls, including a solar-controlled valve, will be exhibited at the conference.

The conference is sponsored each year by the Extension Service, an arm of the Texas A&M University System, to present developments and improvements in irrigation practices and equipment.

Tree planting educational unit available

Civic organizations, parents, and teachers can now obtain an educational unit about trees from the National Arbor Day Foundation.

"The National Arbor Day Foundation considers teaching children about the value of trees to be a very important priority," John Rosenow, the Foundation's executive director, said. "To meet this need, the Foundation has produced a special instructional unit called 'Grow Your Own Tree.'"

"The 'Grow Your Own Tree' unit includes two full-color filmstrips, audio cassettes, a teacher's guide, wall posters, student activity materials, and student

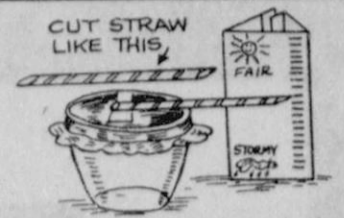
awards for participating children," Rosenow said. "It is organized as an easy-to-use, week-long unit for grade schools."

"A special feature of the unit will be individual student kits containing everything children need to grow trees from seeds. The kits include seeds, planting instructions, a planting container, and a growing medium. The students just add water," Rosenow said.

10. Keep a cheerful countenance. Battles have been lost by frowns. Many successes have been won by smiles.



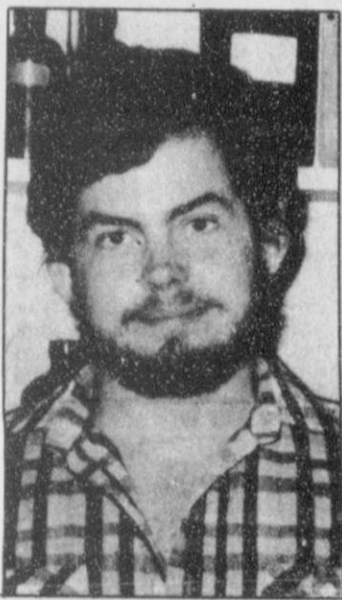
Barometer For A New Year

1. Wash out a small jar like a wide-mouthed peanut butter jar. Remove label.
