## Alliance Sets City Census

Spearman's Ministerial Alliance will sponsor a city-wide Religious Census Sunday afternoon, Sept. 20.

Alliance President, the Rev. Charles Gates said this week that in every community a religious census is needed at least once every other year.

This year the alliance hopes to have enough workers so the entire city can be canvassed from 1:30 until 4:30 p.m.

This will require 15 team captains and six or eight workers for each captain. The Rev. Gates is general chairman and is assisted by vice chairman the Rev. George Bollinger, vice president of the alliance.

A committee is working with the alliance to prepare the census. This committee is Richard Fancher, Orvil Brummett, Orville Fullbright and Frank Buzzard.

Chairman Fancher is mapping out the areas to be covered by each team captain.

A copy of the census card will be published in the papers before the census and persons can speed the census by filling the cards out in advance and having them ready for the census takers, or pinned to the door, if the householder is not going to be at home.

## Man Killed Near Gruver

A Perryton oilfield worker was killed and another seriously injured in a one-car accident 11 miles west of Gruver sometime Thursday night or Friday morning.

Killed in the accident was Clair Curtis Snyder, 34, of Perryton.

Seriously injured was Marvin Lee Corder. He was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

The wreck was found about 4 a.m. Friday morning at the Sunray-Stratford Y in the highway west of Gruver. Officers said the man had been dead for a few hours.

Highway patrolman Bob Richardson said Snyder left Perryton about 9:30 p.m. and was supposed to be at his job on a drilling rig at 11 p.m.

The officer said the car left the road at the turn and overturned.

Snyder had lived in Perryton for a year. He is survived by his wife, Gloria, two stepdaughters, Gloria and Carlotta Stenfanik, and a son, Larry Snyder, all of Perryton. His parents, two brothers, and a sister, all of Ohio.

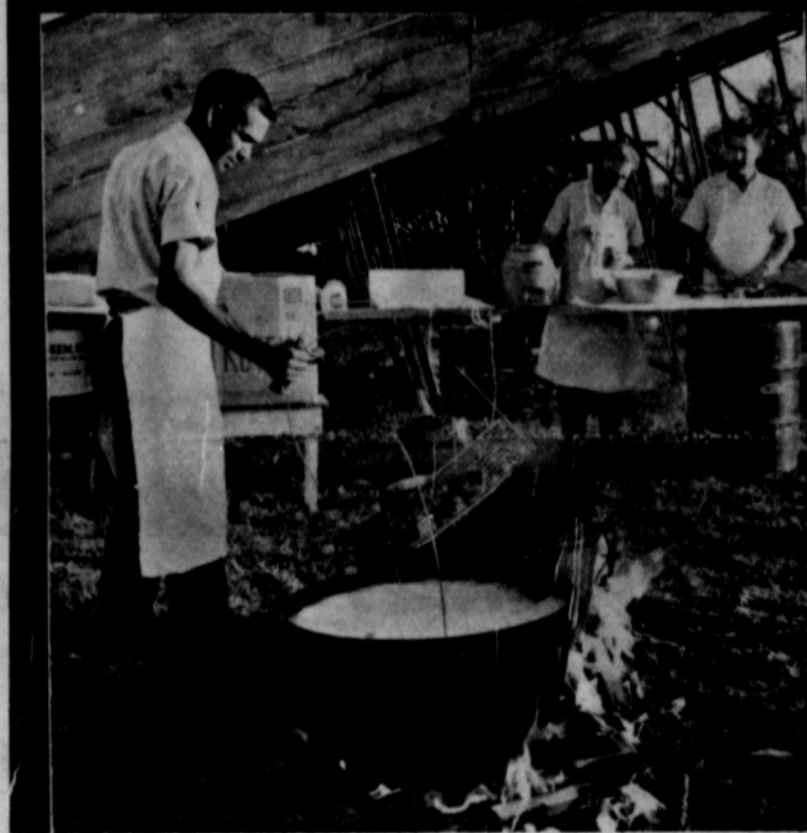
## Candidate Price To Speak Here

## Chamber To Renew Roundup

Another concentrated effort will be made during the next two weeks to add 61 more names to the Chamber of Commerce membership list.

Chamber Manager Don Floyd said the 61 new members are needed this year to reach the membership goal.

Prospective members will be contacted by directors of the Chamber and other members of the Membership Round-Up Club.

Floyd said the chamber, to be effective, needs everyone as active members.

A complete program of work has been planned for the Chamber in agriculture, industry, commercial, aviation, publicity and civic activities.

In agriculture the chamber will continue to promote new crops; work for sugar allotments and a processing plant north of the Canadian River; promote irrigation and other agriculture activities.

In the industrial field the chamber is working to establish an industrial foundation; keep an up-to-date industrial survey on what Spearman has to offer industry and have groups contacting industrial prospects.

Commercial activities include the Christmas Trade promotion and decorations of Main and Collard streets; establishing and advertise general closing dates, have a public relations school for employees and continue to screen and investigate all solicitation.

The Chamber will continue to try and improve airport facilities. In transportation and communications the chamber is working for better rail freight service from the railroad, better bus schedules and improve telephone service. It will also continue to work with the Highway 15 Association to encourage more tourist traffic through Spearman.

To advertise Spearman more the chamber will con-

## Lynx Seek Second Victory at Booker

With one big serving of victory safely digested, Coach Don Seymour's hungry Lynx will go to Booker Friday night looking for serving number two.

This will be another of those uphill battle type games with the Booker starters reported to carry weight and speed advantages on the Lynx.

Weight and speed will be about the only advantages Booker can claim. This is their first year in 11-man football and this will be the opening game for the class B outfit.

Against the speed and size of the Booker 11, Seymour will send two Lynx units that work together or separately as the toughest, most aggressive football squad seen in the purple and white in many years.

The red and gold units have no first or second string players, according to the coaches. The competition for positions is so keen and the abilities so near equal any of the group can win a starting position.

Last week the Lynx amassed more than 400 yards rushing against the big Sunray Bobcats. The locals won the game 54-20 as players from both units got

into the scoring act.

Junior wingback Ken Shufeldt took the rushing honors for the first three quarters with a total of 89 yards and three touchdowns in 11 carries.

Senior halfback Mike Morris also totaled 89 yards in the recorded three quarters in 12 carries. In the final go he added 65 yards in one scoring dash to make him the leader in total yards.

Fullback Clayton Cochran was among the leaders with 85 yards in 10 tries. His relief, Bill Cator picked up 28 yards in three tries.

Quarterback Johnny Crawford only dialed his number six times, but he brought home 38 yards. Dave Clement, gold quarterback, picked up four yards on one scamper.

Wingback Ronald McDonald ran only in the rain, but unofficially he galloped off about 50 yards in the last scoring drive on two carries.

Crawford completed one pass to end Leroy Callaway for 20 yards.

Seymour said all of his varsity came out of the contest

in good condition. Fullback Clayton Cockran was still sore Monday, but will be ready Friday. Cochran was blasted almost out of the park with a clean, hard blind-side block when he and Wesley Brinkley trapped a Bobcat for a safety.

## Nine Students Open School

Spearman's Rotary Drilling Crew School will be reopened next week for training nine foreign students.

Nine of the petroleum industry students from Kuwait will be here for the three weeks of instruction. These nine men are part of the group from the Middle East country in the United States for two years training in the petroleum industry.

**Applications For Wells Increase**

Farmers are once again increasing their applications for irrigation well permits, according to Dallasene Reynolds of the water district office. Hansford County now has 574 irrigation wells on farms, 22 industrial or city water wells and application for 72 more

farm wells are pending. Application for new wells has slowed some during late July and early August, but with the approach of irrigated wheat seeding time, wells are more in demand.

## 18-Year Olds Examined

State draft boards will forward 1,430 18-year-old males for Army mental-physical examinations in October, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Wednesday.

These tests are the result of President Johnson's action early this year which ordered the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newly-registered men who are out of school and available for service.

Colonel Schwartz stressed that these youths will not be considered for armed forces service at this time. Normally, draft for service is about age 22.

In addition to the 18-year-olds, 1,139 older males will be sent for the examination. It is from these that inductees for service will be drawn in the future. Most of these will be 20 years old.

Only 236 men will be drafted for Army service in October. Quotas for induction and the pre-induction examinations are scheduled to be mailed to local boards Sept. 9.

Males married at age 18 and those known to be in school at that age will not be examined.

The 18-year-olds who fail the Army's mental examination will be referred by draft board letters to local offices of the Texas Employment Commission, where they will receive advice and counsel on jobs and preparation for jobs.

Youths who get the letters are under no compulsion to visit the TEC offices, but may go if they feel the government can benefit them.

### TAKE A BREAK

"Turn it off and take a break" -- don't let an accident cause someone to get hurt.

This is sound advice for anyone operating farm machinery during this busy harvest season.

Everybody gets in a hurry this time of the year, but it's a good idea to take a break at midmorning and midafternoon. Experience has shown that these are the times when most farm machinery accidents occur.

This is true mainly because machine operators often become drowsy and tired at these times of the day and accidents have a way of happening when operators aren't alert. Take a short rest period for a cup of coffee, glass of milk or drink of water to replenish energy and restore alertness. Safer work can then be done.

Even if you can't stop work, take an occasional stretch or do something different for a few minutes to break the monotony. Always be sure you are wide awake while operating any type of farm machinery.

Habit plays an important part in safe machinery operation. So learn how to properly handle the machines you operate. Practice what you have learned until habit will cause you to automatically react properly in dangerous situations. The habit "Turn it off and take a break" will help keep you awake, alert and out of dangerous situations.

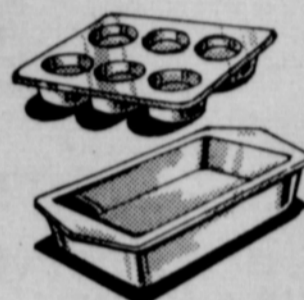

I hear the baseball scores on the sports every night but I never can quite figure out all those half games and besides it changes every day.

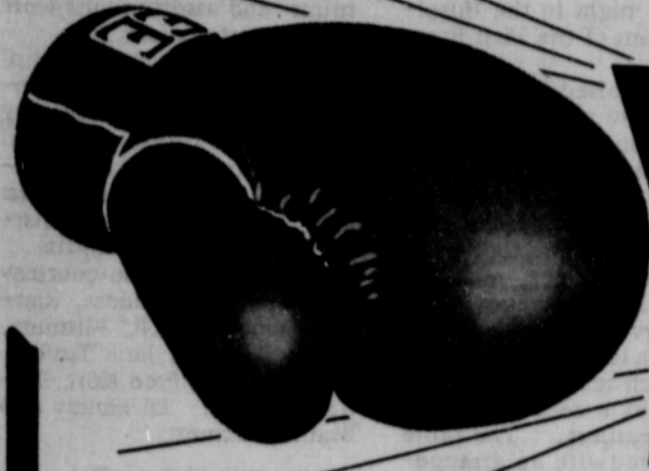

New sorghum hybrids stimulated a lot of interest at a recent field day at Lubbock.

Local dealer, Chalmers Porter, T.J. Bergin and Doug Moore from this area along with Bill Douglas, a local farmer visited the extensive demonstration plot.

Of special interest were new hybrids developed by the "Kaleidoscopic Breeding" approach. Dr. Bruce Maunder, DeKalb's sorghum breeder, has incorporated many desirable characteristics of the new plant introductions into these hybrids.

Bird resistance, new bronze hybrids, early maturity and full yellow-grained hybrids made up part of the impressive display. Researchers pointed out that a new plateau of sorghum research has been reached and that new hybrids being introduced have been out yielding the old standard hybrids from 10-15% in most tests.

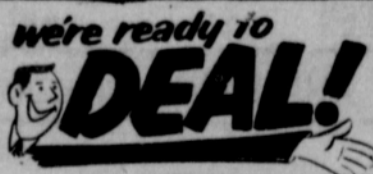

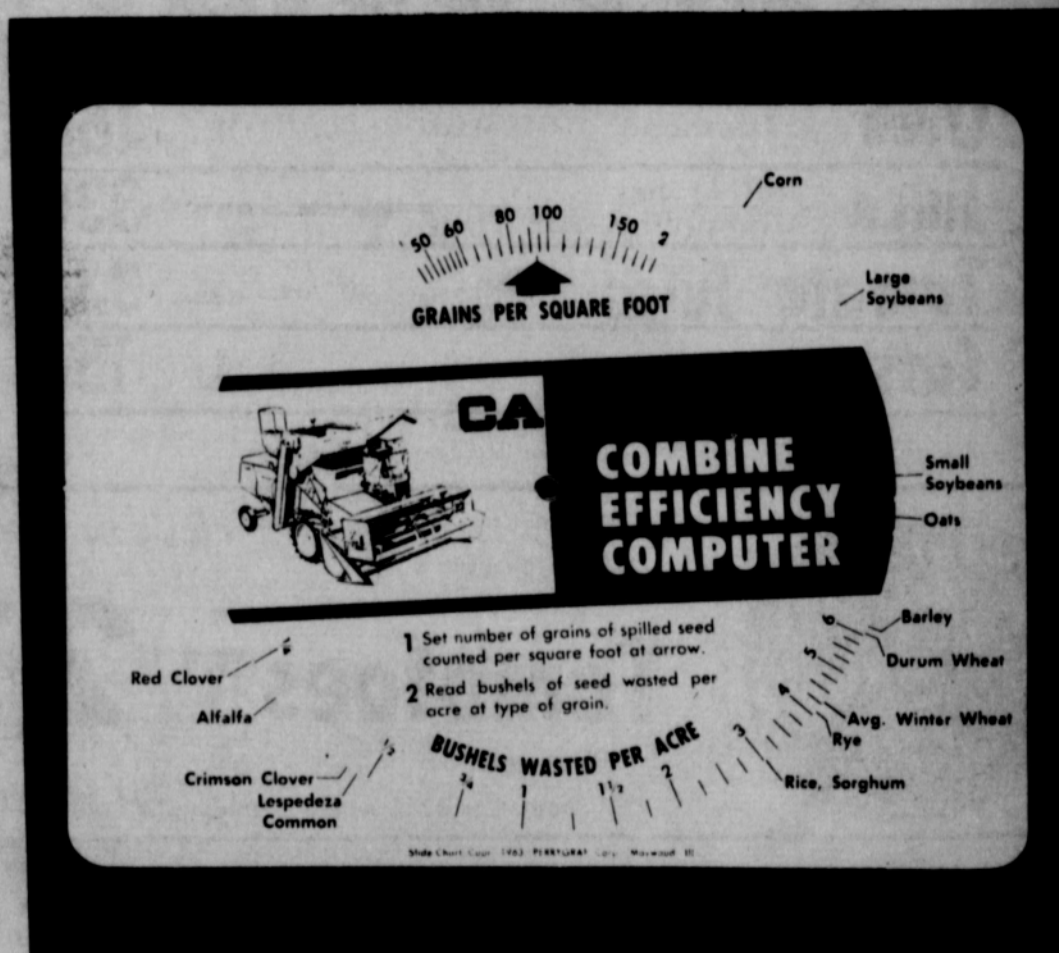
