captains and six or eight workers for each captain. The Rev. Gates is general chairman and is assisted by vice chairman the Rev. George Bollinger, vice president of the alliance.


A committee is working with the alliance to prepare the census. This committee is Richard Fancher, Orvil Brummett, Orville Fullbright and Frank Buzzard.

Highway patrolman Bob Richardson said Snyder left Perryton about 9:30 p.m. and was supposed to be at his job on a drilling rig at 11 p.m. The officer said the car

left the road at the turn and overturned.

Snyder had lived in Perryton for a year. He is survived by his wife, Gloria, two stepdaughters, Gloria and Carlotte Stenfanik, and a son, Larry Snyder, all of Perryton. His parents, two brothers, and a sister, all of Ohio.







## **18-Year Olds** Examined

State draft boards will forward 1,430 18-year-old males for Army mental-physical examinations in October, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service dir-

ector, said Wednesday. These tests are the result of President Johnson's action early this year which ordered the Director of Selective Ser-vice and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newlyregistered men who are out of school and available for service.

Colonel Schwartz stressed that these youths will not be considered for armed forces service at this time. Nor-mally, draft for service is about age 22. In addition to the 18-year-olds, 1,139 older males will

be sent for the examination. It is from these that inductees for service will be drawn in the future. Most of these will be 20 years old. Only 236 men will be

drafted for Army service in October. Quotas for induction and the pre-induction examinations are scheduled to be mailed to local boards Sept.

Males married at age 18 and those known to be in school at that age will not be examined.

The 18-year-olds who fail the Army's mental examina-tion will be referred by draft board letters to local offices of the Texas Employment Commission, where they will receive advice and counsel on jobs and preparation for jobs .

Youths who get the letters under no compulsion to are visit the TEC offices, but may go if they feel the govern-ment can benefit them.

## **Dealers See New Hybrids**

New sorghum hybrids stimu-lated a lot of interest at a re-

cent field day at Lubbock. Local dealer, Chalmers Porter, T.J. Bergin and Doug Moore from this area along with Bill Douglas, a local farmer, visited the extensive demon-

stration plot. Of special interest were new hybrids developed by the "Kaleidoscopic Breeding" ap-proach. Dr. Bruce Maunder, DeKalb's sorghum breeder, has incorporated many desir-able characteristics of the new plant introductions into these hybrids.

Bird resistance, new bronze hybrids, early maturity and full yellow-grained hybrids made up part of the impressive display. Researchers pointed out that a new plateau of sor-ghum research has been reached and that new hybrids being introduced have been out yielding the old standard hy-brids from 10-15% in most tests.
