Delmer Wayne Miller, 47, was killed at the Midco Drilling Co. yard here Wednesday when a load of pipe on a truck came loose and fell on him.





The budget for the upcoming year was adopted.



Last year almost 905 million pieces of mail were sent from the United States to other countries.







Two-Bit Sermons

by James D. Jones, Pastor Fellowship Baptist Church A Real Eye-Opener Isaiah 6:5

Some people compare themselves with others and conclude that they are not so bad after all. They are proud that they go to church every Sunday, try to obey the Ten Commandments, pay their bills, help their neighbors, and participate in civic affairs. Comparing themselves with people whose lifestyles are immoral, they give themselves an excellent rating. Yes, as long as it's "apples with apples," they appear acceptable. But what a difference it makes when man's standards are set alongside the standard of a holy God. Next to His absolute perfection, "all our righteousness are as filthy rags" (Isa. 64:6). After Isaiah saw the Lord upon His throne, he exclaimed, "Woe is mel For I am undone, because I am a man of unclean lips,...for mine eyes have seen the King."

Likewise, only when the sinner sees himself in the light of God's holiness can he be saved, for only then does he recognize his need for a Savior. 



Texas graduates, licenses record

number of doctors

AUSTIN--Texas medical schools graduated more doctors than ever last year, and the State Board of Medical Examiners licensed a record number of physians, says a Texas Medical Association official.

TMA Executive Director C. Lincoln Williston said the state's seven MD schools graduated 1.049 doctors last year, the first time the figure has topped 1,000.

"It is anticipated that those schools will be graduating 1,100 physicians each year by 1985," he said.

"In addition, physicians in great numbers continue to move to Texas from other states and from foreign countries," Williston continued. He noted that the State Board of Medical Examiners licensed a record 3,167 doctors last year and 10,300 in the past four years.

Estimates are that the state board will license more than 20,000 additional physicians in the next 10 years, he said.

The board of medical examiners is the state agency that licenses and monitors Texas doctors. TMA is a 23,500-member professional organization of doctors and medical students. About 80 percent of the state's physicians are TMA members.

'Doctors of medicine who are licensed and reside in Texas now number 25,300. There also are 1,300 doctors of ostepathy. The state now has the third largest physician population, exceeded only by California and New York," Williston said.

The number of physicians in Texas per 100,000 population has increased from 118 thirty years ago to 172 today, he said. This ratio has grown despite the "dramatic increase in the state's total population."

Williston noted that 46 percent of Texas physicians are in the primary-care specialties--family practice, obstetrics-gynecology, pediatrics, and internal medicine.

"Fifty-five percent of Texas medical school graduates in the past five years have chosen post-graduate training in the primary-care fields," said Williston, citing a need for more primarycare physicians.

But he said Texas medical schools now are graduating more doctors than there are available first-year positions in post-graduate training in the state. "In the 1970's the need for additional residency positions became--and remains -- a critical issue, particulary residencies in primary-care specialties," he said.

He noted that the Texas Legislature had funded additional residency positions in 1977 and 1983, but that more funding is needed to permit young physicians to train and remain in the state.







Police report light week

On Friday, July 20, 1984 at approximately 2:30 p.m., an officer was advised by the ACO officer that a gas meter had been struck with a vehicle at East Kenneth and North Snider. Upon arrival, the officer was met by a city employee who advised the person or persons unknown had run over a gas meter and guide wire. 
