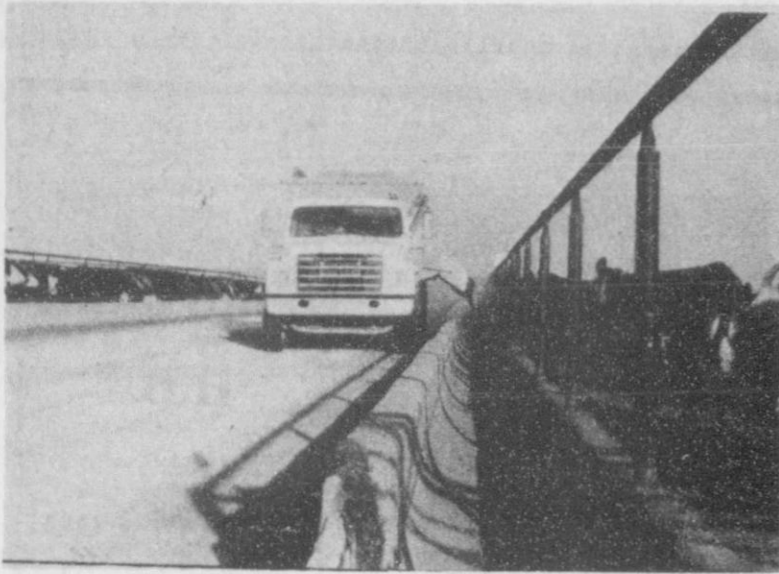

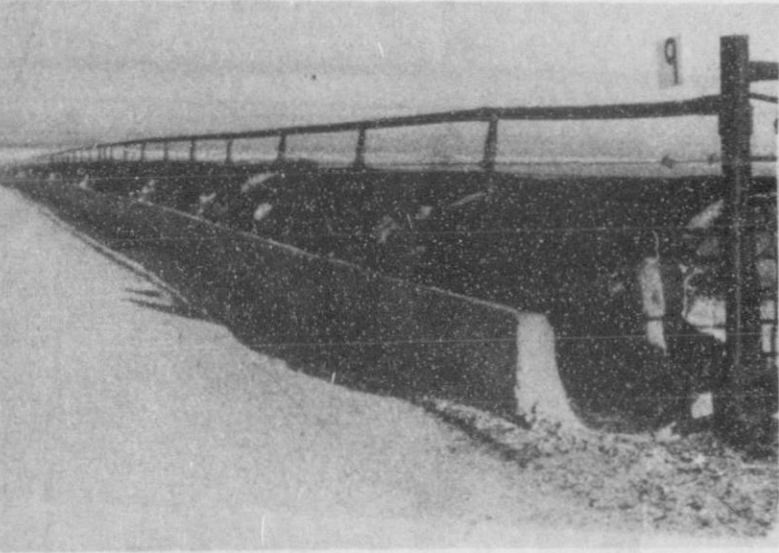

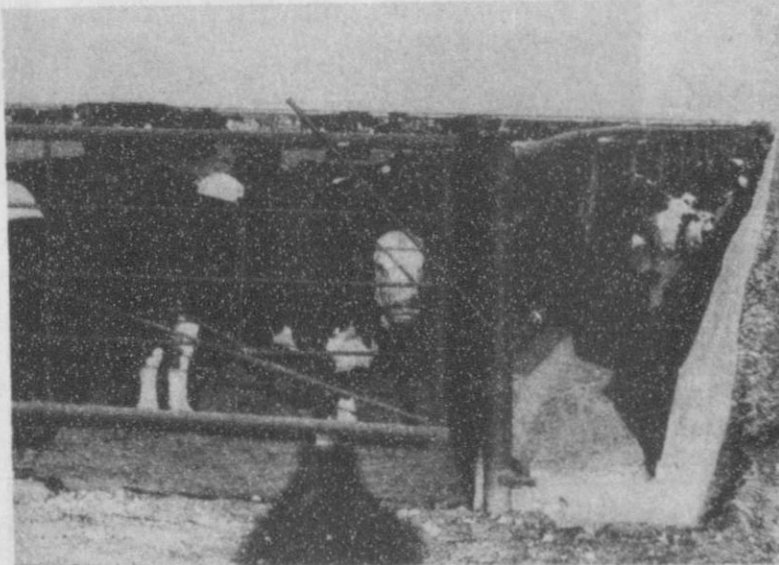
## Population increased by 40,000

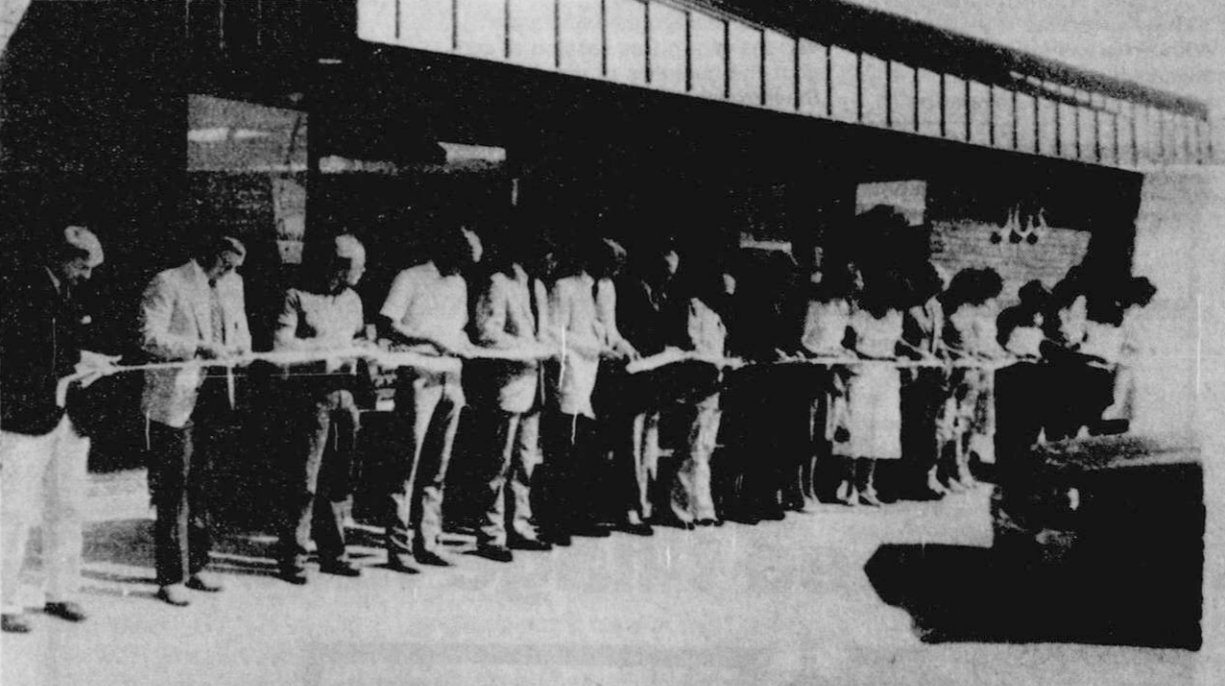

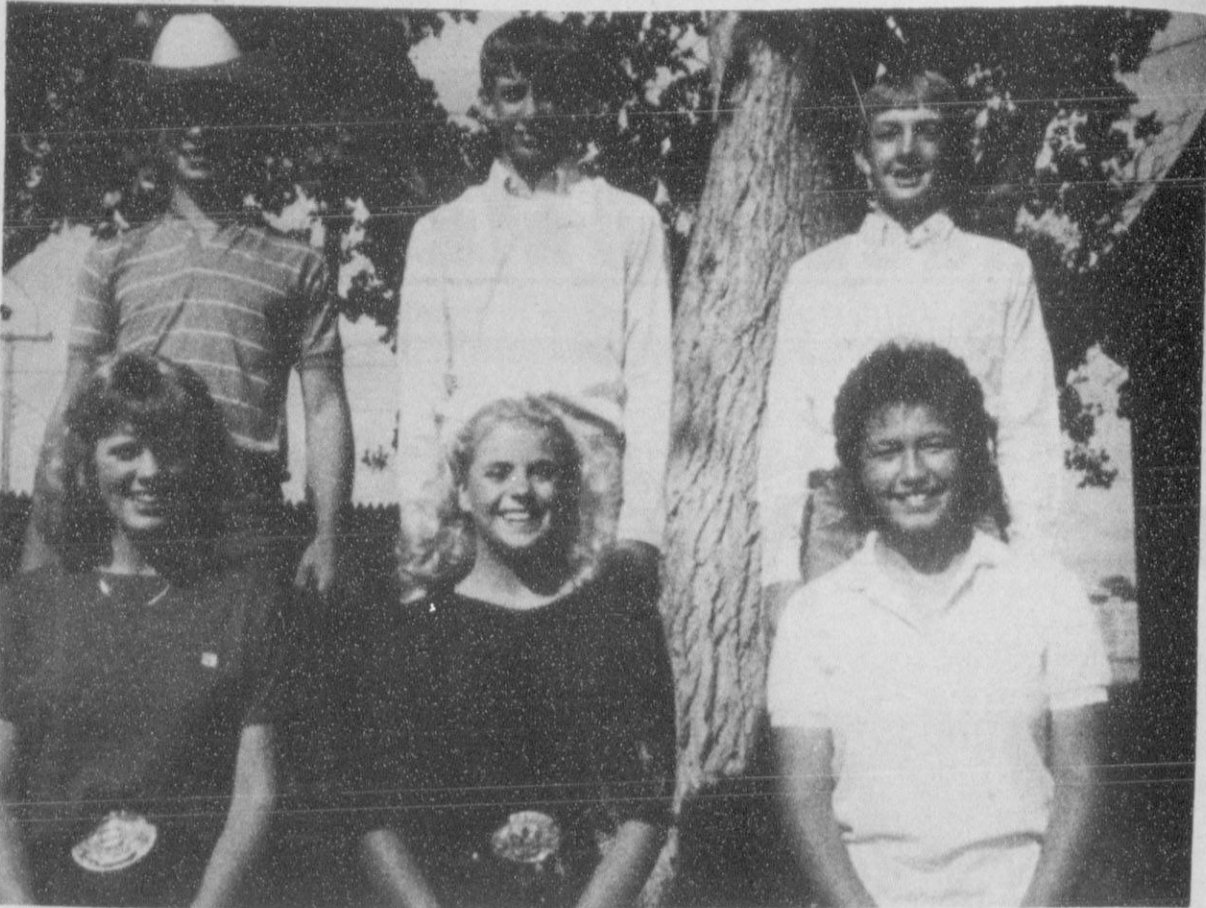

Several Spearman youth will be competing at the 13th Annual American Junior Quarter Horse Association World Championship Show and Convention in Tulsa, Oklahoma, August 4th - 11th. Andrea Archer will be competing in Pole Bending and Stake Race at the show. She is an alternate in Barrel Racing. Anne Marie Jarvis will be competing in Western Riding and Working Cowhorse. Will Jarvis will be competing in Showmanship at the show. J. Garnett will be competing in Jumping. Mark Garnett is an alternate in Working Hunter and Jumping.

Deana Turner is an alternate in Western Horsemanship and Showmanship. The top ten youth in the nation in each of the 28 events as well as two entries per event from each of the state junior associations will compete for awards valued at almost \$40,000. Winners of the 28 classes will receive a trophy belt buckle bearing the inscription "World Champion". State delegates will meet in various committee session to conduct the business of the AJQHA, the largest youth horse association in the world, during the AJQHA Convention slated for Sunday. Additionally, the 1984-85

AJQHA national officers will be elected to represent the 10,000 plus members of AJQHA. Approximately 40 teams are expected to participate in Friday's judging contest open to 4-H, FFA and AJQHA judging teams. A variety of social activities are scheduled for the eight days, including a clinic, barbecue and dance, and an evening at a water recreation park. 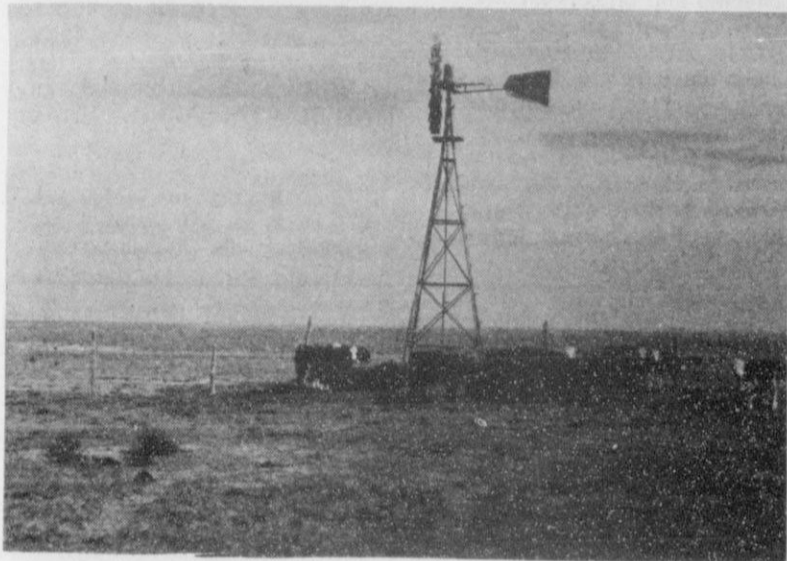
# Fire & rescue calls with counties approved

The City Council of the City of Spearman held their regular meeting July 24 at 8 p.m. in temporary city hall, 514 Collard with Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett presiding. Aldermen present were Wilson McClellan, Jim Nicholson, Ed Garner, Burl Buchanan. Alderman Bob Pearson was absent. Also present were Jim Murray, city manager, and city secretary, Charlotte Sheets. Minutes of the July 10 meeting were approved.

The charge for calls in Hansford County is \$225.00 per fire and \$125 per rescue call. The charge for fire calls to Ochiltree and Hutchison County is \$300.00. The council approved the grass lease with Ron Clark for 86.3 acres of land at \$10.00 per acre. The land owned by the city located adjacent to the Hansford Golf Course. The consideration of allowing the Golden Spread Senior Citizens Association to be covered by the city's group hospitalization and insurance plan for their director, was tabled until more information from the Texas Municipal League

can be obtained. They approved a resolution implementing a plan to increase the utilization of business concerns located within the target area as designated by the Texas Department of Community Affairs. City manager Jim Murray reported on a preconstruction conference on the water line replacement project. The council instructed Murray to hire a spray plane to spray the city for mosquitoes within ten days. Meeting dates for the month of August were set for the 14th and 28th.

## Drought conditions prevail on rangeland



As everyone is well aware, drought conditions are persisting in the area. There have been some thundershowers around the area, but they have been spotted, and adequate rains to break the drought have not been received. Due to the lack of rainfall and a very cold winter many of the warm season plants on rangeland did not produce well this year. This means that livestock grazing on rangeland do not have so much vegetation from which to select their diets. therefore, animal performance may be down. Livestock producers should take a good look at their pastures. Will it be sufficient? Producers should manage their livestock so that the forage in the pastures is

protected from overgrazing. Livestock numbers may need to be reduced, or feeding may be necessary. This will be the case if drought conditions continue on into winter. Wheat fields will prove some grazing during the winter months but it is still a long time between now and then. Therefore, evaluate current range conditions and livestock conditions to see if herd performance will be up to production objectives without destroying the vegetation which is being grazed.

## Texas graduates, licenses record number of doctors

AUSTIN--Texas medical schools graduated more doctors than ever last year, and the State Board of Medical Examiners licensed a record number of physicians, says a Texas Medical Association official. TMA Executive Director C. Lincoln Williston said the state's seven MD schools graduated 1,049 doctors last year, the first time the figure has topped 1,000. "It is anticipated that those schools will be graduating 1,100 physicians each year by 1985," he said. "In addition, physicians in great numbers continue to move to Texas from other states and from foreign countries," Williston continued. He noted that the State Board of Medical Examiners licensed a record 3,167 doctors last year and 10,300 in the past four years. Estimates are that the state board will license more than 20,000 additional physicians in the next 10 years, he said.

primary-care specialties--family practice, obstetrics-gynecology, pediatrics, and internal medicine. "Fifty-five percent of Texas medical school graduates in the past five years have chosen post-graduate training in the primary-care fields," said Williston, citing a need for more primary-care physicians. But he said Texas medical schools now are graduating more doctors than there are available first-year positions in post-graduate training in the state. "In the 1970's the need for additional residency positions became--and remains--a critical issue, particularly residencies in primary-care specialties," he said. He noted that the Texas Legislature had funded additional residency positions in 1977 and 1983, but that more funding is needed to permit young physicians to train and remain in the state.

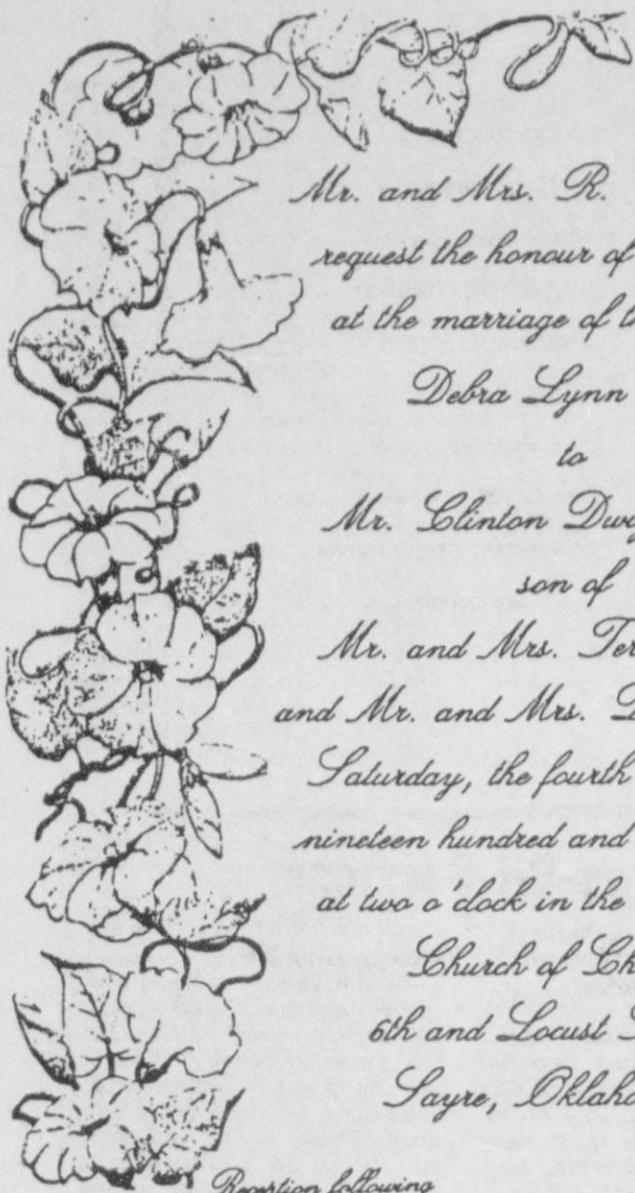

## Police report light week

On Friday, July 20, 1984 at approximately 2:30 p.m., an officer was advised by the ACO officer that a gas meter had been struck with a vehicle at East Kenneth and North Snider. Upon arrival, the officer was met by a city employee who advised the person or persons unknown had run over a gas meter and guide wire. The vehicle appeared to make a left turn from East Kenneth onto North Snider, when making this turn the vehicle jumped the curb, striking a frame made of 2" pipe that was around the gas meter, knocking it approximately 50' into a vacant lot. Officers were dispatched to the scene where they interviewed the complainant and observed the damage on the left quarter panel of her vehicle. A photograph of the damage was taken by the officers. The complainant stated that she did not notice whether or not a vehicle was parked in the space next to her vehicle. Further observation of the damage showed that there was no paint left from the other vehicle.

On Saturday, July 21, 1984 at approximately 1:00 p.m., a white male came into the Spearman Police Department and identified himself. He advised the officer that he had rented the house at 603 Evans to a subject. He also advised that the subject notified him that he was moving and when the complainant went to the house to collect the rent, he also noticed that a 20 foot aluminum ladder and a hammer was missing. He also advised that he thought the subject had moved to another town. All he knew was that the

subject left owing rent and taking a ladder and a hammer with him. On Wednesday, July 25, 1984 at approximately 10:00 a.m., a complainant advised the Chief of Police in person that an unknown person had removed a blue seat approximately 4 ft. long from the bow of his cabin cruiser, which he had parked outside of a Spearman business. Pictures of the remaining seat in the bow were taken. Investigation continuing on the case.

The vehicle jumped into reverse and went across highway 15 and ran into a guard rail at Equity. No citation was issued.
