## Weather trading snowdrifts for twisters

the High Plains, parts of East Texas and neighboring states to the east!

Taking its cue from tornadostricken Los Angeles and California generally, area weather here went from snow drifts to storm cellars in a matter of hours.

Falling barometers, leaden skies and television tornado warnings just minutes apart for most of the evening, Thursday, reminded Hansford County folks it was just a year ago this month that a devastating twister roared through the county west to east wreaking \$1.5-million in damages without loss of life human or

Thursday night, storm cells blanketed the Panhandle with the first actual tornado warning coming for Donley County. Twisters were sighted on the ground both southwest and due north of Clarendon with the latter damaging one structure at Howardwick, a small lakeside community north of

Then, to the northeast a tad from Donley County, funnel clouds were seen on the ground near Gage, Okla.

After a brief respite during which storm cells moved eastward out of the top tier of Texas Panhandle Counties, a tornado warning was posted for Grav County with a funnel sighted soon after at Alanreed. south of Pampa.

Finally, all turbulence moved eastward but left skies grey and barometers low.

The only structural damage known was at Howardwick and no human or livestock injury or loss had been reported at press time.

Last year about this time it was a different story for Hansford County. A twister moved on the ground from a point just east of Diamond Shamrock in Moore County to a point just west of the city of Spearman -- a distance of some 50 miles on the ground -then touched down again in Beaver County Oklahoma injuring eight people.

The path through Hansford County missed both Gruver and Spearman proper but Gruver was left without electric power on the eve of the annual stock show.

Except for minor cuts and scratches, livestock lay quietly in a state of shock covered with a plaster of hardened mud evidently carried by the twis-

-- But a record standing as long as weather records have been kept officially still stands: Neither Spearman nor Gruver has suffered a direct hit from a tornado. However. in June, last year, Spearman did suffer a wind and hail storm that set a national record for glass damage.

Oddly enough, Hansford folks and neighbors on the High Plains are not much for "fraidy holes." Almost all live here in the Panhandle specifically for the wide open spaces and a storm cellar is real confining to most.

If a storm cellar is not there or not used, there are still the usual precautions to take. In the open, refuge in the lowest land depression available is advised. In a house, a room with no outside walls is the best refuge -- reinforced by mattresses and other cover to protect from flying debris.

Along with these precautions, it is most wise to draw plenty of water and "stash" it safely and to have tools in your refuge with you . . . saws, pry bars, a sharp hatchet -- any useful implement to free you and your family if your shelter collapses about you.



Mobile/Manufactured Homes Capture 36% Of 1981 Single-Family Home Market!

According to recently released U.S. Department of Commerce figures, 666,000 new single family homes were sold during 1981. Of these, 240,000, or fully 36%, were mobile/manufactured homes - built inside factories, then transported to the home sites.

The average price of a new mobile/manufactured home was \$19,400, according to the Manufactured Housing Institute (MHI), based in Washington, DC. By contrast, the average "site-built" house sold last year for more than \$86,000, according to Commerce Department statistics. MHI President Walter L.

Benning sees mobile/manufactured homes capturing an even greater share of the new home market this year.

"We expect sales of about 265,000 mobile/manufactured homes in 1982," he said. "At current site-built house

You know the old saying, you learn something new everyday. Well, today, I learned how you take Alka-Seltzer Plus. Those qualities belong, in this case, to a remarkable woman named Emma who, in her final days, brought much inspiration to those with whom she came in contact.

"Her name was Emma; an elderlay black lady unencumbered with life's material possessions. No one knew how she travelled from New York City to Washington, D.C.; only that one morning in the bitter chill of February, she was there.

"Dr. Veronica Maz, founder of the House of Ruth, a hostel for women in need of help, was told of Emma's arrival by some of the men who made their homes in abandoned autos in a former parking lot behind the hostel. They didn't think it right or proper that a woman of Emma's age and condition should be living in the rusted hulk of an automobile. Neither did Veronica. She offered Emma the hospitality of the House of Ruth, but Emma said, no thank you. And that was all she had to say.

She settled down in a vehicle whose interior had been stripped. The men brought cardboard from packing crates and fashioned a floor of sorts. They filled in the empty window spaces and did what they could do to make the car's shell a dwelling. Emma's only warmth was a thin overcoat. Yet with that and little else she managed. She decorated the interior with faded family photographs and old newspaper clippings. What little food she ate was supplied by the men around her who were worried about her frailty. Daily, Veronica brought her a cup of soup and a jac of water.

"It was the water that made them friends. A board member for the House of Ruth complained about the waste of a dripping outdoor faucet and announced she would have the water supply cut off. Emma overheard Veronica's spirited defense of the need for the water. It was basic, she argued, to those living in the area, not only for drinking but washing as well. When Veronica turned away she saw Emma smiling a toothless grin of approval through the open window of her

"After that Veronica visited Emma several times a day just to sit and talk. Emma had nothing to say about herself. Mostly she talked about God as a personal friend who was with her always. Veronica found that Emma's personality exuded a special kind of warmth that refreshed her in her own endeavor. She had never known anyone quite like her.

The cold months went by, and in early April one of the men came to Dr. Maz and said that Emma would like to borrow \$80.00. Veronica able to obtain that amount, but the request puzzled her; it was so out of character. She planned to query Emma the next day. But the next day Emma was gone. She had wanted to say good-bye, had waited until the last minute, the men told Veronica, but the bus she was taking would not wait. Emma's car-dwelling neighbors had taken her to the station and bid her farewell.

"Veronica though she might receive a card from Emma, but there was nothing-nothing until the following October when Ezekiel arrived. He was 18 years old and one of Emma's great grandsons. He had come to repay the borrowed money for the bus fare to the town in Alabama to which Emma had returned. She had been away from home for more than 30 years, had gone north to New York to earn money to send to her family. She had finally come back because she knew she was dying, and she wished to be among her people. Ezekiel said she was 92 when she passed peacefully away.

"He had volunteered to bring back the money and had done so, working his way job-by-job to Washington. At Veronica's insistence he remained with her for three days but only on the condition that he work for her at the House of Ruth. He had a fine manner and a look in his eye that reminded Veronica of Emma. He said he wanted to be a preacher, but now he had to leave so he could get home to help his father and brothers with the crops. When he left Veronica presented him with a striking religious banner that had been sewn by the Catholic Order of the Poor Clares. She asked that it be presented to the family's church in memory of Emma, a remarkable little lady who had stopped to rest awhile on her long journey home."



The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute's Cancer Information Service (CIS), the statewide telephone line that answers Texans' questions about cancer, now has a phone number that spells its pur-

This easily recalled number will help make the CIS more accessible to the general public, according to Jo Ann Ward, director of the M.D. Anderson CIS.

"The CIS will still be providing the same kind of current, factual cancer information, but it is our hope that now we will be able to serve even more people who have questions about cancer -- a disease which in some way affects two of every three families," said Ward.

"The M.D. Anderson CIS will share this phone number with 20 other CIS offices

across the country, allowing Texans to pass it on to out-of-state friends and relatives who automatically will be connected to the CIS office serving their area."

Only people calling 1-800-4-CANCER from within Texas will be connected directly to the M.D. Anderson office. Established in 1975 as a

public education program of UT M.D. Anderson Hospital, the CIS's goal is to enable people to have immediate access to the latest information about cancer. In addition to providing assistance over the telephone, the CIS also mails free, printed materials about cancer to callers who request it, serves as a source of referral to community services for cancer patients and their families and is a contact point for the latest information about cancer research.

Over the years, the CIS staff of trained volunteers has assisted more than 50,000 Texans with their cancer concerns.

The M.D. Anderson CIS is just one part of a nationwide network of offices, based at major cancer centers and funded by the National Cancer Institute. Included in this network are 21 regional offices serving 65 percent of the nation's population. The rest of the nation is served by an office operated at the National Cancer Institute, which also handles late-night calls until midnight (Eastern time), and weekend calls. Since the program began these offices have fielded more than a million

#### Good news for Texas livestock producers

Progress in eradicating screwworms in Mexico is good news for Texas livestock producers, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said today.

"We had only six confirmed cases of screwworms in Texas during all of 1982, and that, too, is good news. But as we move in 1983, livestock producers should continue to be on the lookout for possible screwworm infestations, especially those producers along the Texas-Mexico border," Dr. Holcombe said.

He said sample submission of screwworms to the fly laboratory at Mission is only about 30 percent of the 1982 figures. "That means we may be a bit complacent about the screwworm situation, and there is a need to be on our guard," he said.

The overall goal of the screwworm program is to have a barrier zone along the Isthmus of Tehuantepec in

Mexico during 1984. That area would be seeded with sterile screwworm flies to prevent migrations northward. The Isthmus of Tehuantepec is about 1,200 miles out of the Texas-Mexico border.

Three states in Mexico--Baja California, Chihuahua, and Sonora--have been declared screwworm free.


However, there were isolated outbreaks of screwworms in 1982 in Mexico within 150 miles of the Texas border. "This is why it is important for Texas' livestock producers to check livestock regularly for possible screwworm infestations." Dr. Holcombe said.

## Program begun in inform property owners of rights, etc.

AUSTIN--Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today announced the beginning of a statewide program for 1983 to inform property owners in Texas of their rights, remedies and respon-

sibilities as taxpayers. In conducting the mulitifaceted program, Graeber said, SPTB will be working with appraisal districts, local tax offices and the state's news media to help make Texans aware of property rendition requirements, available tax relief measures and of what property owners do to obtain any tax relief to which they are entitled.

"It is important that taxpayers file renditions and applications for tax relief by May 2 this year," Graeber said.

"Major changes in the state's tax laws were effective last year with implementation of the Texas Property Code

and the new central appraisal districts," he noted.

Graeber said that provisions of the code not only make it possible for taxpayers to file all exemption applications and property renditions with one office in a county rather than with multiple tax offices, but also permit onetime applications for homestead exemptions and special open-space land valuation, rather than annual applications as previously required.

However, the tax official said that in appraisal districts which did not implement their operations in 1982, requirements for taxpayers to file renditions and applications will differ. In all except 15 of the state's 254 counties, he said, appraisal districts were in full operation in 1982. Fourteen of the remaining districts started full operations this year, and the Harris County Appraisal District began serving a portion of that

In districts which began full operation in 1982, property owners who received homestead exemptions and openspace ("1-d-1") land valuation last year need not apply again for 1983, unless the chief appraiser requests confirmation of current qualification by sending a notice and an appropriate application form, or unless their eligibility has changed.

Graeber noted, though, that applications must be made this year for homestead exemptions and 1-d-1 valuation by taxpayers who have never received them on their present homes or land and by property owners in the 15 appraisal districts implementing for the first time this year.

Applications for disabled veterans' exemptions and agricultural ("1-d") valuation must be made annually in all

appraisal districts. The 15 districts Graeber listed as implementing this year are Bexar, Glasscock, Gray, Harris (partial implementation), Hartley, Jasper, Jeff Davis, King, Leon, Mc-Mullen, Moore, Oldham, Rockwall, Stonewall and Zapa-

ta Counties. Exemption applications should be filed with the appraisal district office, or, in the case of Harris County, with the district or appropriate local tax offices.

"State law also requires any person who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 to file a rendition statement with the appraisal district," Graeber

Special rendition procedures pertain to property on which an exemption applicable on January 1 terminates during the tax year. In such a case, the person who owns or

equires the property on the date eligibility for the exemption terminates must render the property for taxation within 30 days.

Additionally, the chief appraiser may require rendition of other taxable property upon notice to the owner or mana-

Transportation companies subject to regulation by the Railroad Commission must render the value of their intangible property to the State Property Tax Board.

Banks and railroads must file special rendition statements with the appraisal district chief appraiser. Graeber said rendition

forms are available from appraisal district offices or local tax offices in Harris County. Transportation businesses may obtain property report forms from the SPTB.

Complete information on available tax exemptions and

rendition requirements for the 'Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!", a pamphlet produced by the SPTB.

The pamphlet also includes suggestions on how to prepare and present an appeal to the appraisal review board and is available at no charge from appraisal district offices or from the SPTB in Austin.

"The property tax is the primary source of local government revenue in Texas," Graeber noted. "It will generate about \$7 billion this year to help fund operations of public schools, cities, counties and special districts."

"We urge all property owners to become familiar with the tax process, to file renditions and to apply for all exemptions or other tax relief measures to which they are entitled," Graeber concluded.

#### Recent scables outbreaks under control

Recent outbreaks of scabies among livestock in Deaf Smith and Dallam counties are now under control, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, Austin, reports.

Seven cases of scabies were reported since the first of this year. "We have periodic outbreaks of scabies from time to time, but thanks to the cooperation of livestock producers and our control measures we are able to bring them under control in a short time," Dr. Holcombe said.

There were 12 cases of scabies reported in 1982. "The seven cases we have had this year reminds us it is necessary to be on the lookout for this pest," Dr. Holcombe said.

Scabies is caused by tiny, parasitic mites that puncture the skin of cattle and feed on the body fluids released from the wounds. These fluids ooze from the wounds, dry, and become mixed with the skin to form scabs, hence the name 'scabies'

Personnel with the Texas Animal Health Commission have checked the origin of the most recent outbreaks and

found they came from out of state. "Texas has been accused of being responsible for scabies' outbreaks in years past, but now this is generally not true," Dr. Holcombe said.

Scabies is a year-round problem. Livestock producers are urged to check their cattle for possible scabies infestations. "The sooner we can attack an outbreak of scabies the better it is for everyone," Dr. Holcombe said.

Infested cattle must be dipped twice at 14-day intervals before interstate shipments are allowed.



#### Texas Litter Costs \$17 Million

AUSTIN--Texans littered their roadsides more than ever in 1981-82 and it cost more than \$17 million of their tax dollars to pick the trash up, according to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT.)

DHT Engineer-Director Mark Goode said, "The dollars spent to pick up litter, 35 percent more than a year earlier, come from the same budget that must also be used to repair potholes, mend guard rails and other necessary maintenance activities."

Statistics compiled by DHT's Safety and Maintenance Operations Division show

that Houston far outpaced other metropolitan areas in trash pick-up costs. Compared to the \$6.9 million spent by the department's Houston district, \$1.9 million was spent in the Dallas district while San Antonio and Fort Worth districts used \$1.2 and \$1.1 millions respectively.

The 1981-82 trash pick-up total is two-thirds more than was spent in 1979-80 when the statewide cost reached \$10 million for the first time. During 1980-81, DHT spent
