Hansford County wheat harvesters beginning to 'crank up'

Reports of high quality grain and good yields per acre have been filtering in as Hansford County farmers gear up for the 1983 summer wheat harvest.

Hansford County Agent Jim Smith said Thursday that a few farmers have already begun harvesting in scattered points throughout the county, but Smith also revealed of grain elevators in the county have indicated they don't expect the harvest to "get into full swing" and the wheat trucks to come rolling in steadily "until Monday or Tuesday next week.

Wheat harvest is a little later than usual getting under way. Smith said. because of the exceptionally wet spring. However the heavier than usual spring rains coupled with melt of from the winter's snowfall that was the greatest in several decades

As a result, the wheat he has seen in the fields "looks awful good." Smith said, and he expects the yield per acre to be good.

"Cutting down south" is just getting under way, according to Smith. He said reports from Holt elevator indicated most of the harvesting to date has been on dryland acreage, that farmers are reporting the yield generally good. and tests weights have been running around 62 pounds.

Smith said that as of late morning Thursday, reports from Hitchland Grain Co. near Bernstein-Hitchland indicated no grain had been in to the north end of the county elevator, but Bernstein manager Lecil Lanning told him Bob Gillespie was expected to bring in a load Thursday evening.

resulted excellent soil moisture he Estimates of the yield per acre on the north county dryland wheat harvest was running from 35 to 40 bushels per acre, Smith said.

> Kermit McKee, manager of Continental Grain Co., in Gruver said early loads of wheat brought in to his elevator tested at about 62 test weight, and yields of better than 30 bushels to the acre were being reported by Gruver area farmers.

Smith said some 91 percent of the county's wheat farmers had signed up to participate in the federal governments new Payment In Kind (PIK) program and as a result only about half the usual acreage will be harvested.

Yet because of the good moisture and much better yields per acre, county farmers are "liable to make almost as much grain as they usually do." despite PIK, he said.

Quick reacting Sheriff nabs suspect in Ruby Banks' theft

Within one hour after theft of a dining room suite belonging to Mrs. Ruby Banks was reported, Sheriff R.L. McFarlin and deputies had recovered the stolen items and arrested a suspect.

Max Banks, owner of Baker & Taylor Drilling Co., notified the sheriff Monday that someone had stolen an antique mahogony dining room table with a large centerpeice, 10 chairs and a cover from a storage area on Baker & Taylor property.

Banks offered a \$10,000 reward for the apprehension of the thief and the recovery of the stolen items. McFarlin said a 31-year-old man now residing in Spearman was arrested on charges of theft over \$200 and a mahogony dining room suite identified as the one belonging suspects home.

McFarlin said the suspect's residence had been searched after a search warrant had been issued by

Justice of the Peace Pete Vernon. The suspect was arraigned before

Vernon Wednesday and bond was set by the justice of the peace at \$10,000.

Banks presented a check for the \$10,000 reward to McFarlin Tuesday. McFarlin said he would not accept the reward for himself as he was "just doing the job I'm paid to do." Instead he accepted the award as a donation to Texas Sheriff's Association to set up a scholarship

McFarlin said the \$10,000 would go into an interest drawing account of the Sheriff's association set up especially as a scholarship fund for some boy or girl who wants to pursue a career in law enforcement."

Children of active or associate members of the Texas Sheriff's Association will be eligible to apply for the scholarship, which will be given annually, Sheriff McFarlin

said. A board of four directors will screen the applications each year and decide to whom that year's scholarship should go, the sheriff

McFarlin said the scholarship will be named the Greg McFarlin and Max Banks Scholarship Award in honor of son Greg who died in a tragic accident at age nine.

McFarlin said Greg as a small boy had expressed a desire to follow in his father's footsteps and become a law officer.

"I'd like to thank Max Banks for making it possible for me to do something I'd always wanted to do (set up the scholarship in memory of Greg) but would never have been able to do--would never have the money to do it--if this hadn't happened," McFarlin commented.

"Mr. Banks is like that -- he has been most generous over the years in his support of worthwhile projects in the Spearman community."

Jewelry store robbery-beating suspects snared

The sheriff said Wheeler County Deputy Sheriff Lonnie Miller and Texas Ranger Bill Baten came to Spearman Thursday night and transported Williams to Wheeler.

There the suspect will face charges in the robbery of a reported \$50,000 to \$60,000 in jewelry from a Wheeler jewelry and the alleged beating of Mrs. Roxie Hanks.





plant is potted, the entire plant which is having problems. The Specimens should not be completely dead, however, as diagnosis of the problem is then next to impossible.



If you are in the market for a car, advertisements offering low-rate financing have probably caught you eye. Before buying on the basis of an ad, however, make sure you fully understand what they offer.

Read the ads carefully, shop around, and check with the dealer about any limitations or conditions on attractive offers. Take steps to determine whether a dealer's special offer provides genuine savings and gives you the car and financing you want.

If you intend to buy a car and use any financing, try to answer the following questions in comparing and evaluating

1. Are you required to pay a higher price for the price for the car to qualify for the low-rate financing?

if you paid cash, or supplied your own finan cing from a bank or credit

Does the financing require a larger-thanusual down payment in the range of 25 to 30 percent? Are there limits on the

duration of the loan offered? In other words, are you required to repay the loan in 12 or 24 months? Do you have to buy extra merchandise or services,

extended warranty or a service contract to qualify for the loan? 5. Is the financing available for a limited time only? Some merchants limit

IRS granting tax extension

DALLAS, TX--The Internal Revenue Service today said that it is granting to all payors of interest and dividend income an automatic 1-month extension of the requirement to withhold tax scheduled to begin July 1, 1983. The automatic 1-month extension is being granted to alleviate any

undue hardship to payors. Today's action is being taken in light of the June 16, 1983, Senate action to repeal the withholding provisions which were enacted by the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982. The IRS noted that there has been no final action concerning repeal.
