

# Spearman Lynx Gridders Report August 3!

It's almost that time of year again....

Summer vacation time is winding down fast and within a few days--next Tuesday to be exact--the Spearman Lynx football candidates will report for physicals.

The coaching staff will issue shoes and socks to boys going out for the Lynx teams on Aug. 3-4-5. And on Aug. 12, the Lynx gridgers will get after it in two-a-day workouts as the Angry Purple Football Machine cranks up for the upcoming 1983 gridiron season.

On Aug. 19, Spearman High School fans will get their first sample of Lynx football '83, as the Purple hosts the Guymon Tigers in a scrimmage here beginning at 7:30 in the evening.

On Aug. 26, the Lynx play a second scrimmage game against White Deer on the Bucks home turf, again at 7:30, before opening regulation play against the Stratford Elks here on Sept. 2 with kickoff set for 8 p.m.

On page 4 of this issue, civic minded, dyed-in-the-Purple fans show their support of the Lynx in a full-page advertisement. These businesses--White House Lumber, Baker & Taylor Drilling Co., Dairy Queen, The General Store, Nursanickel Motel, Gordon's Drug Store, J.G.'s, Wardrobe Cleaners, Speartex Grain, Gebos, Arien's Small Engine Repair Service, First National Bank of Perryton, The Desk Set and Cinderella Beauty Salon--urge everyone to come out and support the Lynx every game, from the first scrimmage all the way through a successful season.

These 14 businesses form the vanguard of support for the Lynx. They are participating in the annual Lynx promotion program of The Spearman Reporter-Hansford Plainnsman, which includes (1) a package deal that offers card bearing the full season schedules of the Lynx varsity, junior varsity and 7th and 8th grade teams, and the names of the sponsoring firms to be placed in the sponsors businesses for fans to pick up and to be sent to Spearman High School for the students to pick up for their use; (2) Ads such as the one in this issue boosting the Lynx Win! Win! Win! (3) The only complete game coverage of each and every Lynx game--stories with all the color and excitement of Angry Purple football '83.

For the next couple of weeks, the Reporter staffers will be making the rounds of local merchants and firms, offering each the opportunity to show their support of the Lynx and to "Pull for the Purple" to win all the way.

## City Council To Provide Fire Protection

In a series of moves, Spearman City Councilmen agreed to help provide fire protection services for rural Hansford County and Ochiltree and Hutchinson counties, during a regular session of the council at temporary City Hall Tuesday night.

The council also voted to rezone 12 lots in Sparks subdivision from single family residential to mobile home residential, amended the city code to change the definition of mobile homes, elected officers for Spearman Volunteer Fire Department, and denied a request to extend a water main to a business outside the city limits.

On a motion by Councilman Ed Garner and second by Councilman Bob Pearson, unanimously voted for the city to enter into an agreement with Hansford County for the city to provide fire protection and rescue services for \$225 per fire call and \$125 per rescue call, and to authorize the City Manager to approach the county commissioners court about the possibility of the city selling a 1954 pumper truck to the county for \$3,000.

Garner made the motion, Councilman Burl Buchanan the second, and the councilmen all voted to enter into an agreement with Ochiltree county and Hutchinson County for Spearman to provide these counties with fire protection service at \$300 per call.

The aldermen were also voted--on motion by Pearson, second by Garner--to honor a request by Craig Hutchinson by amending the zoning code, changing the designation of Lots 1-12, Block 1, Outlot 24, Sparks Subdivision from single family residential to mobile home residential.

The council then voted to change the definition of mobile home in the city code which limited the width of the house trailers to 16 feet, to make allowance for double-wide mobile-homes. The date of passage was also designated as the effective date.

Elected as fire department officers were Steven Slater as Fire Chief; Ronnie Antalek as first assistant chief, and Ed Williamson as second assistant chief.

Elected as fire department captains were Scott Bullard and Ronnie Bullard and Galen Coates.

Andy Watley appeared before the council and asked that the city extend a two-inch water main from the

corner of Avenue D and a county road to approximately 2,635 feet north of Avenue D, some 1,035 feet of it inside the city limits and approximately 1,500 feet outside the city limits to a business building he is having constructed there.

Garner made the motion to deny whatley's request with the stipulation that an ordinance of statement be brought before next council session, stating the city cannot in the future extend water or utilities outside the city. Councilman Jim Nicholson seconded and the council voted 4-1 in favor of the motion, with Councilman McClellan casting the dissenting vote.

## Suspect Held Here

Sheriff R. L. McFarlin said Friday that a suspect wanted on a Hansford County warrant for alleged probation violation is being held in Wilson, Kansas, and will be returned here.

McFarlin said Joseph Vernon Long, 26, was arrested in Wilson on auto theft charges filed from Houston, but that Long will be returned to Spearman first for a probation revocation hearing. He had received probated sentence on another auto theft charge, McFarlin said.

Luis Matahuala Ariaza, 35, of Spearman has been released from county jail after paying fines, the sheriff revealed. Ariaza was arrested early last Saturday morning on charges of DWI and driving while drivers license was suspended for DWI after the vehicle he was allegedly driving slid 576 feet, bowled over a utility pole, and burst into flames.

Ariaza walked away from the wreck and was picked up about three-and-a-half hours later walking, dazed, cut and bruised, along a highway, taken to Hansford Hospital for treatment, then transported to jail and charged.

## Spearman Police Dept Extra Busy During July

On Tuesday, July 19, 1982 a citation was issued to a Spearman resident for having a vehicle exceeding maximum weight limit parked in a residential district.

On Wednesday, July 20, 1983, a Hansford SO unit was dispatched to a Spearman residence to speak to a subject in reference to a domestic disturbance. A Spearman Police Officer was dispatched to the residence as a back up. Upon arrival, subject advised that her ex-boyfriend was driving up and down the street shooting at her and another subject. Officers then went to the residence of subject accused of shooting and spoke with him and another subject. Both subjects related that they had been driving down the street and their pickup backed fired. Later on in the evening Hansford SO unit received another

call of shots being fired at the same resident. Two Spearman Police Officers responded as a back up. Subject told officers that the same two subjects that were shooting earlier, were shooting at her and another subject again. Officers located the subject and advised him that if another call was received, that all parties involved would go to jail. No further action deemed necessary at this time.

On Wednesday, July 20, 1983, a subject was arrested on a warrant charge and transported to the Spearman Police Dept. Subject was later taken to Hansford County Jail. Subject was released after making payoff. No further at this time.

On Friday, July 22, 1983, a Spearman Police Officer received a call in reference to a fight in progress at a Spearman residence.

The officer arrived and observed three subjects at that residence. The female subject advised the officer that she did not wish to speak to an officer. After leaving the residence, officers along with a Hansford SO unit were met by two subjects that had been having a dispute involving weapons. One subject was then taken to his residence where the weapon that had been involved earlier was taken into custody. Subject had been drinking. Due to the fact that the subject had been drinking and was in a state of mind that could endanger his safety or others, he was placed under arrest and transported to the Spearman Police Dept., where he was properly processed. Subject was then released into the custody of the Hansford County SO.

**Spearman Police**

On Friday, July 22, 1983, a Spearman resident entered the Police Dept. and advised that she had found the front door open to her business when she went to open up. Officer met with subject and she advised the officer that her husband was at the business taking inventory to determine if anything was missing. Officer advised that he had checked the business earlier that morning and everything appeared OK. Subject then stated that nothing was missing. Officer accompanied the subject to the business for further investigation. Nothing was found missing. No further at this time.

On Friday, July 22, 1983 an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to a threat to a persons life. Officer arrived and met with the subjects mother. The officer then spoke with the subject and was advised that another subject had threatened him and had taken his pickup through force. Subject advised that he knew the location of the vehicle and that the subject who threatened him no longer had possession of the vehicle. Subject did advise that he saw the accused subject going south. At this time subject was taken to the Spearman Police Dept. where he gave a statement. This case still under investigation at this time.

On Friday, July 22, 1983 a Spearman businessman reported to the Chief of Police in person that two of his employees had observed a subject drive onto the complainant's property and proceeded to the parking lot. At which time the subject proceeded to drive his vehicle in circles, cutting donuts in the crushed rock parking lot. Subject was contacted and he admitted that he was guilty of the offense. Subject was transported to the place where the offense took place and it was decided and agreeable by all parties that the subject would make restitution by repairing the damage. Subject was issued a citation and was told to appear before the judge. Case is closed.

On July 22, 1983, A subject was arrested for shooting firearms inside the city limits. This same subject was involved earlier in the week with shooting firearms in a residential district. Subject was transported to

the Hansford County Sheriff's Office where he was booked.

On July 22, 1983 An Officer was dispatched to the dog pound to release a dog from the pound. Upon arrival the officer noticed that the bottom on the gate on the far east per was pulled out. Upon further checking the officer discovered that the two female dogs that were in the pound were missing. Case still under investigation.

On July 22, 1983 an officer received a call to go to a Spearman business. The officer arrived and was met by a subject, who advised the officer that on this date between 12 noon and 7 p.m., someone had taken the left side t-top from his vehicle. Subject advised the officer to unsecure this item, a person would have to reach inside the vehicle. The complainant advised that he had knowledge of another subject that had lost one or both of the tops of their vehicle and he felt that the subject may have taken his t-tops. Subject advised that he thought he would have to buy a complete set to replace the one that had been taken. subject advised that he would file charges regardless of who the person may be. Investigation still continuing at this time.

On July 23, 1983, Officers set up an surveillance of a vehicle. The subject of the vehicle was suspected to the theft of t-tops from another vehicle. The suspect and another subject were observed getting into the suspects vehicle. These subjects entered the vehicle and the driver was identified as the one complainant described earlier of theft from his vehicle. The vehicle was stopped

and upon questioning, subject gave two different stories about the property in question. Subject was then taken to the Police Dept. for further questioning. At this time, subject admitted taking the property from the vehicle. Subject did refuse to give a written statement but did give a verbal statement after signing a statement form advising subject of

her rights. Subject stated that she had taken the the t-top from the complainants vehicle while it was parked at a Spearman business. Subject stated that she took the property to her house, cleaned it and changed the trim from the original

color of blue to black using an old t-top that she had originally. When complainant was called in for positive identification on the property, this was the only discrepancy that existed other than the color of the trim. positive identification was made. Case cleared.

On July 23, 1983, While on patrol, the Chief of Police and an officer discovered that someone had tossed from a vehicle an unknown amount of bread on the following streets: Main street, East Hwy 15, South Hwy 207 and West Kenneth. The Chief of Police and the officer proceeded to pick up the bread. The bread was placed in a bag and stored at the Spearman Polic Dept.

On July 23, 1983, while the Police officers were taking inventory of the vehicle involved in the theft of a t-top earlier. 28 loaves of bread were found in the trunk and the back seat of the vehicle. Subject who was arrested earlier advised that she and another subject had taken the bread from a grocery store in Borger and that they had thrown some bread from Main street, down East Hwy 15, S. Hwy 207 and West Kenneth. Subject is also being charged with littering along with the other subject. It is unknown at this time how much bread was taken or whether charges will be file. Later on this date both subjects were brought before Municipal Court Judge Paul Jones and charges were filed. The subjects were properly arraigned and pleaded guilty to charges. Case closed.

On Wednesday July 27, 1983. The Spearman Police department received a call from a Spearman resident in reference to a dirtbike being found. The dirtbike was picked up and transported to the Spearman Police Department for storage. It was later learned that the same dirtbike was reported to he Hansford County Sheriff's Office as being stolen. The owner claimed the dirtbike and it was taken to the Hansford County Sheriff's office so the owner could pickit up.

# Lunker rainbows stocked in Red River

The Red River, New Mexico, Chamber of Commerce has announced that weekly stocking of 2 to 2½ pound Rainbow Trout will begin this weekend in the Red River. The Lunker Trout, measuring up to 18 inches, will be placed in the river at various spots both above and within the resort town. These fish are stocked in addition to pan-size rainbows which are regularly stocked in quantity by the State.

The stocking program is funded by the Chamber and by donations from local businesses and property owners as a special attraction to fishermen who visit the community during the summer. About 1,000 of the big rainbows will be placed in the river during the season which continues through September.

Although the Red River is still running a bit high for this time of year from heavy snow run-off and recent rains, visitors report fair catches of 10 inch rainbows. Worms and fire-balls on #8 hooks fished with 4-6 pound leader are currently producing the best catches. The river is clearing, however, and the spin and fly fishermen will be coming into their own any day.

Spin fishermen will have good luck using 4-6 pound monofilament with an assortment of spinners. 1/8 oz. Panther Martins and #2 Mepps are usually productive. Fly fishermen can do well with the Renegade or Mosquito fished dry, or the old standby Woolly Worm and the Hard-shell Black Ant fished below the surface. A 3 pound tippet on a tapered leader does the

job nicely but some skill will be required to hand on to one of those feisty 2-pounders.

Non-residents of New Mexico may buy 1 day (\$8.50), 5 day (\$15.00) or season (\$25.50) licenses from local merchants who are also happy to provide information on where to fish and what to use for the best luck. Access to the river is

good throughout most of the mountain community where property owners routinely permit visitors to get to the river. Several lodges, in fact, offer well-stocked private lakes for the use of their guests. In addition to the river, many easily reached (and some not so easily reached) National Forest lakes provide

exciting variety to the dedicated fisherman. In fact, the historic mining community located at 8700 feet in the beautiful Sangre de Cristo Mountains in Northern New Mexico, is fully geared to provide everything needed for an outdoorsman's summer vacation. Rental 4-wheel drive vehicles, dirt-bikes and horses

are readily available and detailed information on where to go and how to get there will gladly be provided by the townsfolk. And there's plenty to do for the non-outdoor element of the family too. Red River is located in New Mexico's Enchanted Circle on New Mexico Highway 38 about 12 miles east of Questa, 17

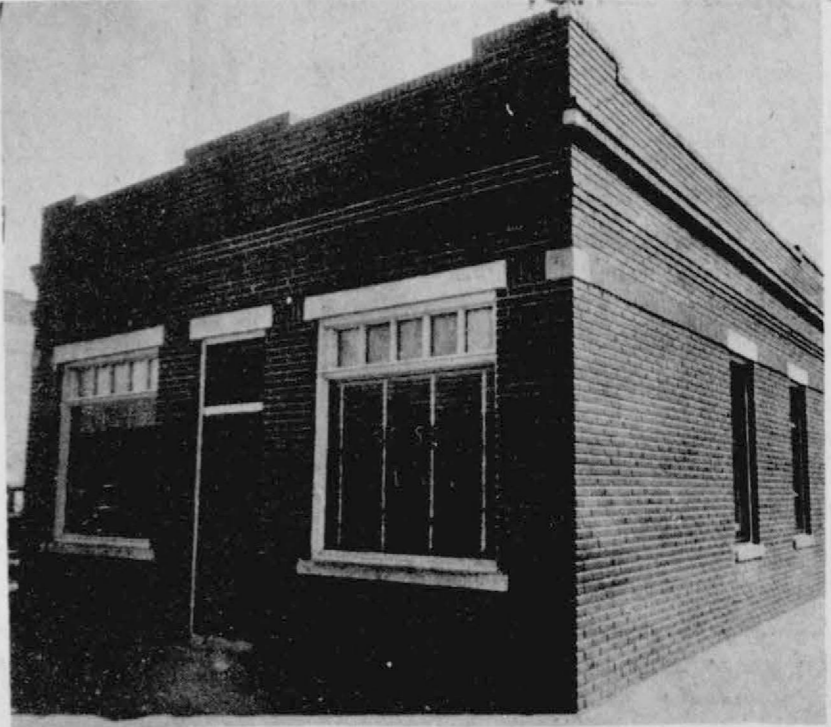

### Rural appraisal course

HUNTSVILLE--Basic skills needed for appraising rural property will be taught during a weeklong course Aug. 14-20 at Sam Houston State University here.

The comprehensive introductory course, "Basic Principles of Rural Appraising," is a cooperative venture between Sam Houston State and Texas A&M University, with participants eligible for continuing education units from Texas A&M explained Dr. James Ahrenholz. A management economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, Ahrenholz is course coordinator.

"The course is designed not only for appraisers, but also for tax assessors, real estate brokers and sales persons, and land developers," noted Dr. Gary Condra, Extension management economist at Lubbock, who is lead instructor.

"It is approved by the Texas Real Estate Commission for educational requirements toward professional accreditation," Condra said. "It also is approved for credit toward the Accredited Rural Appraiser (ARA) designation."

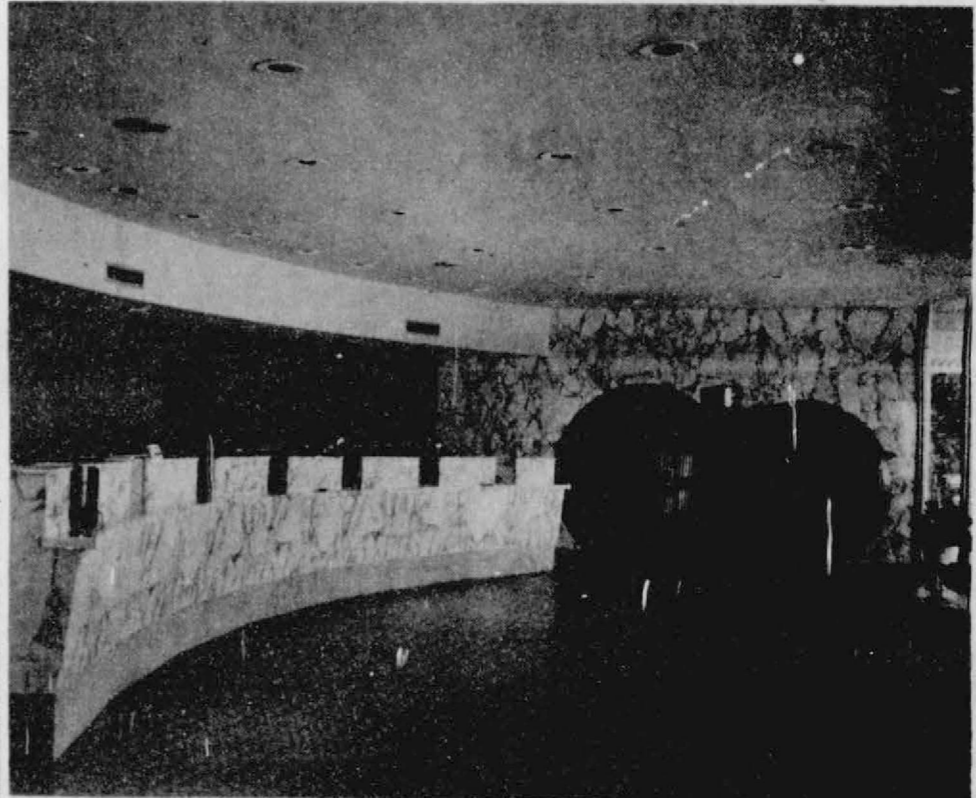
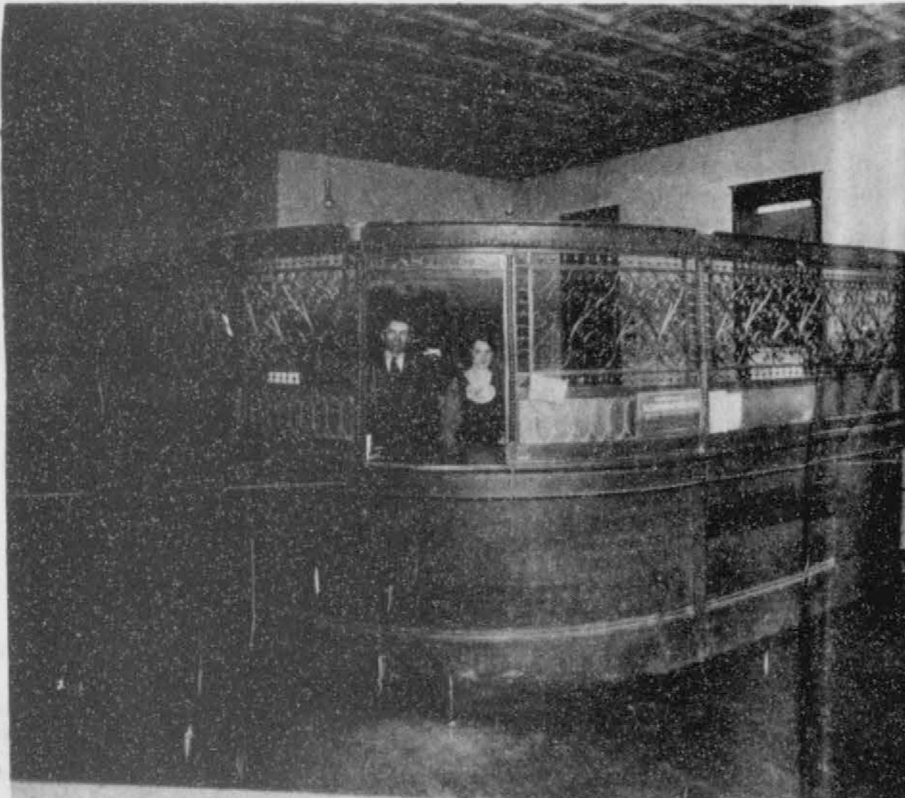
The course includes such topics as appraisal concepts, principles of real estate value, appraisal process, area and neighborhood analysis, site analysis and evaluation, soils and appraising, and market approach. It will also cover cost approach, income approach. It will also cover cost approach, income approach, correlation of approaches, field procedure, and administration, legal and ethical considerations.

The fee for the course is \$100 and includes all course materials. Registrants will check in at Sam Houston from 5-7 p.m. on Aug. 4. The first class will be held at 7:30 p.m. that day. The course concludes at noon Aug. 20.

The course is being offered annually at a college in Texas. Last year it was held on the campuses of Texas A&M and Texas Tech universities.
