

The Cooperative Rangeland Grasshopper Control Program has been started in Hansford County as a result of the meeting held Tuesday, June 17. Approximately 60,000 acres were signed up at the meeting.

The grasshopper control committee is as follows: Chairman - Gus Renner; Vice-Chairman -Joel Lackey; Secretary-Treasurer - Billy Logsdon. These gentlemen will be coordinating the signing up, mapping of the areas to be sprayed, and collection of money along with USDA and TDA officials.

To sign up for the program, rangeland operators or owners need to come to the County Extension Agent's office located in the basement of the Courthouse in Spearman. Rangeland operators must draw their acres on a map and pay 70 cents per acre for the spraying. The cost of spraying is figured at \$2.10 per acre with 1/3 by the State, and 1/3 by the Federal government. This program is for rangeland only.

All interested parties are encouraged to contact the committee members or County Extension office for more information.
