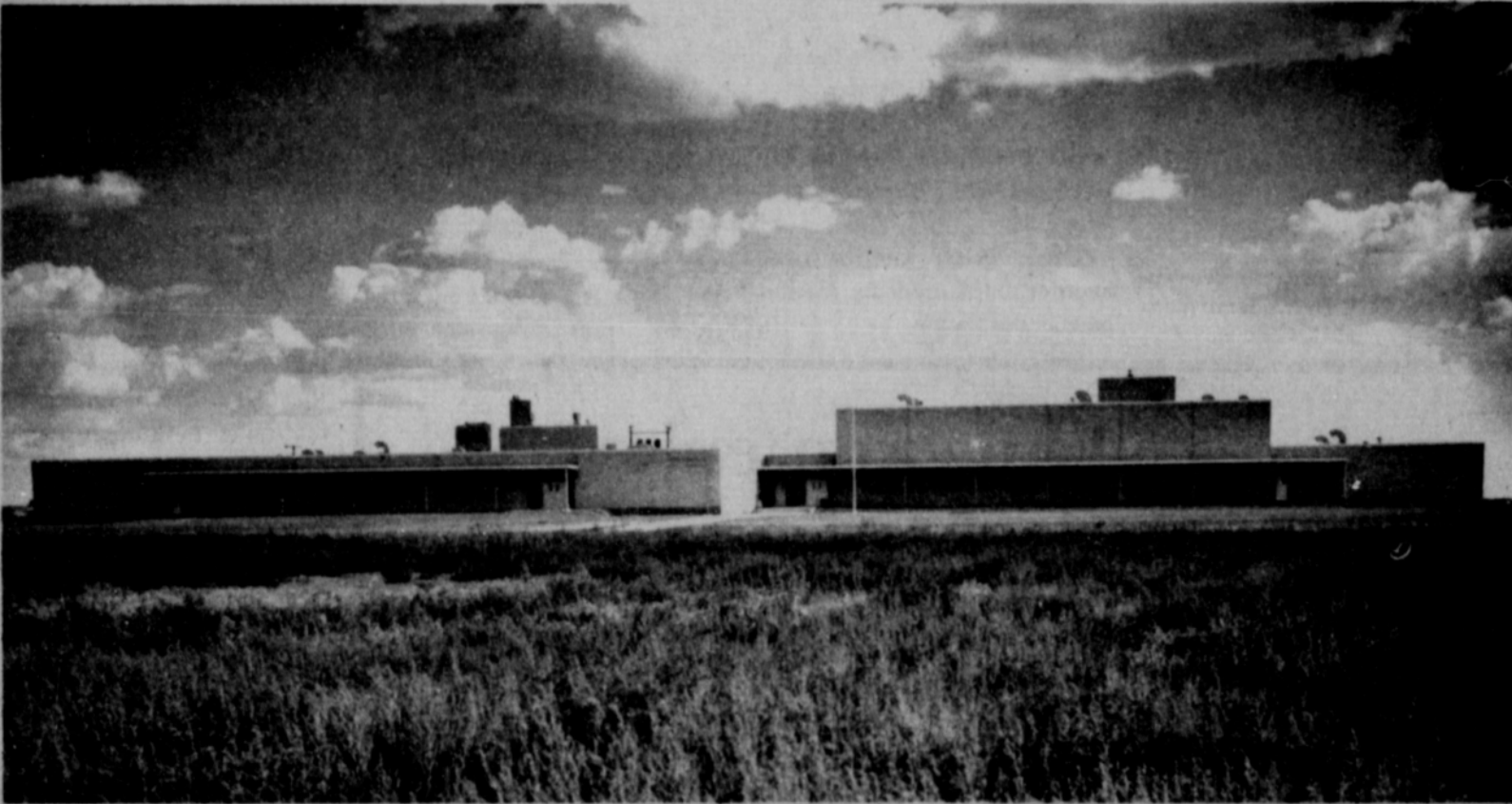

## School Dedication Set Sunday



THE FIRST-- Texas' first windowless high school building will be dedicated here in Spearman Sunday. A program and open house is planned for the afternoon and the public is cordially invited to attend. PLAINSMAN PHOTO

Texas' first windowless senior high school building will be dedicated here Sunday at 2 p. m. in a special program with Dr. J. W. Edgar, State Commissioner of Education as the principal speaker.

The dedication program will begin at 2 p. m. in front of the building with a flag raising ceremony by the Lynx Band and Scout Troop 78.

The Rev. Luther Berry of the Baptist Church will give the invocation and the ribbon on the new building will be cut by Dr. Edgar.

After a 20 minute band concert in the auditorium, Spearman Mayor R. E. Vaughn will extend a welcome to all the visitors.

Supt. James Bramlett will introduce the platform guest and then State Board of Education Member Herbert O. Wilborn of Amarillo will introduce Dr. Edgar.

School Board President Dr. D. E. Hackley will make the closing remarks. The Rev. Graham Pugh of the First Christian Church will give the benediction.

Open house will be held in the building until 6 p. m.

Workmen are putting the finishing touches on the building this week and faculty members and students have been working for two weeks moving equipment in the building and cleaning.

The completely air-conditioned plant features everything from a home economics sewing room to a vocational agriculture welding shop all

under one roof.

Designed by architect Fred Buford and Associates of Dallas, the million dollar building was constructed by H. A. Padgett Contractor of Lubbock. The major sub-contractors were Amco Electric Contractors of Amarillo and Anthony Plumbing, Heating and Air Conditioning of Lubbock.

The 75,000 sq. feet of floor space is divided into three units separated by corridors. The main east-west corridor is a reinforced concrete tornado proof passageway large enough to provide protection for approximately 500 persons.

Should electrical power be disrupted, there is an emergency electrical generating unit large enough to provide electric energy for the building until power can be restored.

Because of the lack of windows classrooms are grouped close together and teachers may arrange the seating in each room to his or her satisfaction.

In Unit A there are 13 classrooms, the home economics department with a clothing laboratory, fitting room, living-dining room combination, teacher's office, a food laboratory with pantry and five kitchen units.

This unit also contains the library large enough for more than 12,000 volumes of books. There are eight classrooms surrounding the library and each room has a door into the reading room to give students quicker use of research material.

### Army Burns City Powder

A two-man team of Army demolition experts were flown to Spearman this week to dispose of some old dynamite and blasting caps.

Army SP6 Edwinn Steimling and SP5 Jerry L. Loux of the 61st Ordnance District Explosive Disposal unit, burned 69 sticks of dynamite and destroyed 100 blasting caps. The dynamite burned without problems, but the team had to ignite some of the blasting caps to get rid of them.

The men were flown here from Fort Sill, Okla.

### Registration Started In All Area Schools

Registration has started for the school children of Hansford County and classes will begin Tuesday. At Waka the classes begin tomorrow, Friday.

Seniors and Juniors registered yesterday in Spearman and Sophomores and Freshmen are registering today. Sophomores in the morning and Freshmen in the afternoon. First grade students start signing up at 9 a. m. this morning.

All beginners must have a

birth certificate and smallpox and diphtheria vaccinations.

At Gruver high school students will complete registration today. There will be a faculty meeting Friday and classes start Tuesday.

Students in Morse grades 7-12 register Friday and classes will begin Tuesday. First graders will not pre-register at Morse, but must have a birth certificate and smallpox vac-

### No Change On Tax Rate

The county tax rate will remain the same for the coming year, according to action taken this week by the County Commissioners Court.

The rate for the entire county is \$1 per \$100 valuation. Road Districts three and four, which are the same as precincts three and four have an additional 70 cent road tax.

A break-down on the tax rate shows 39 cents for the general fund, 10 cents for the courthouse and jail sinking fund, three cents for the hospital,

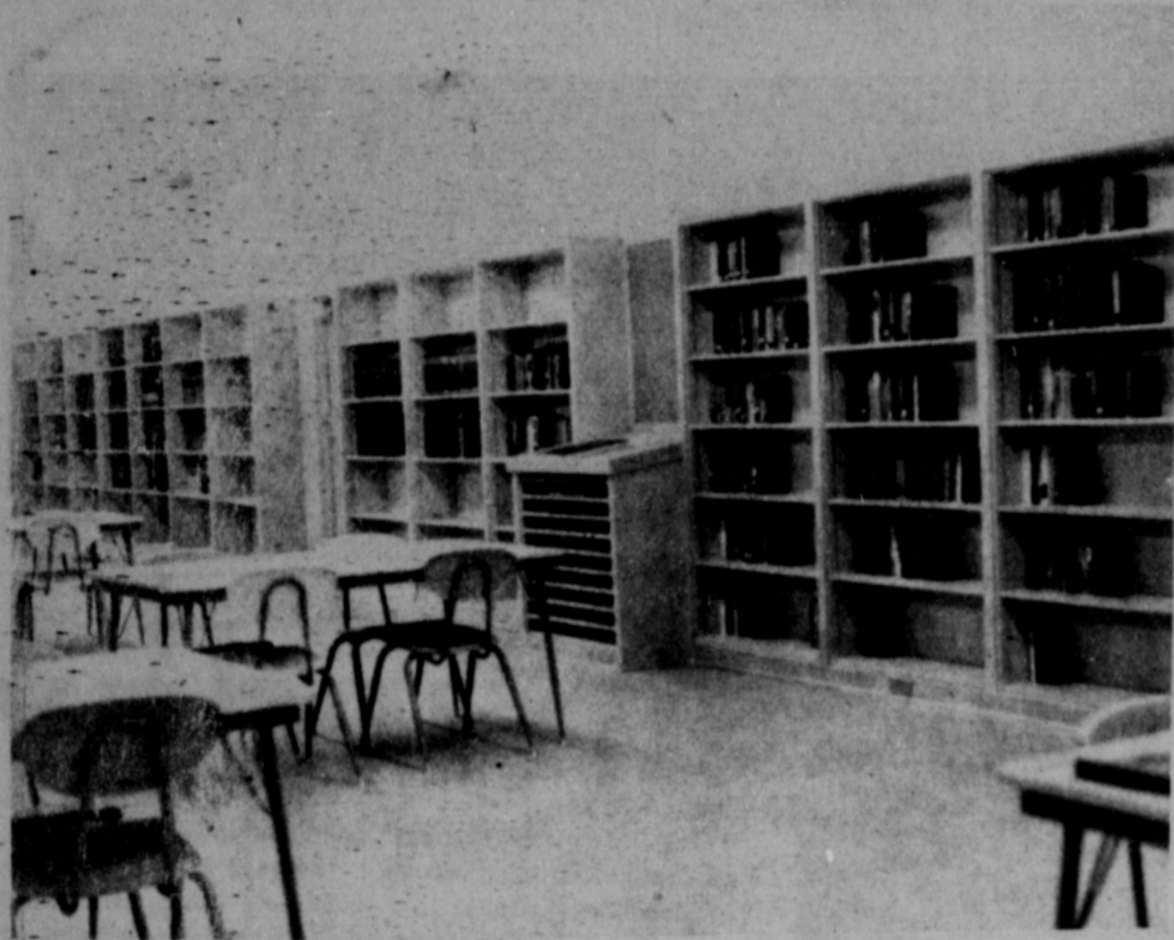

Unit B contains the science and vocational departments along with the administrative offices. There are three science laboratories, chemistry, biology and general science and physics combination. Also, there is a science lecture room, plus storage and work

rooms.

The vocational agriculture department has two shops and a classroom, plus an instructor's office and storage. There are offices for the Superintendent, business manager, Principal, Counselor, a vault, teachers lounge, publication room, work rooms, conference rooms, and offices for two secretaries.

Unit C is the largest with the auditorium that will seat 750 and can be enlarged to seat 900. In the unit here is also the band hall with two practice rooms, an office, instrument and uniform storage and two dressing rooms that will also be used by the auditorium.

The physical education room is 98 x 67 feet with no spectator seating. This room also changes into a cafeteria by pulling tables and benches down from the wall. There is also the cafeteria kitchen, snack bar, dry storage and walk-in refrigerator.

Just off the physical education room there is dressing rooms for physical education classes.

## Water Meter Available For Hansford Farmers

A water meter is the latest piece of equipment being made available to farmers in the Hansford Soil Conservation District. Irrigation water must be measured if it is to be used efficiently. Just as it is necessary for the farmer to know how much seed he plants, how much fertilizer he applies, and how much crop he harvests, proper management of his water supply required a knowledge of how much water is applied on each field, at each irrigation, and over the season.

For purposes of managing irrigation water, the irrigator needs to know how many acre

feet or acre-inches of water have been or will be applied to a field. This conversion can easily be made by remembering that 1 cubic foot per second or 450 g. p. m. flowing for 1 hour will very nearly cover an acre with an inch of water. An acre inch of water also represents approximately 27,000 gallons.

An accurate measurement of the capacity of your well is a must. Estimating your 700 GPM well at 1000 GPM may be good real estate business, but does not help water your crop.

Research has measured the peak water use of a sorghum or wheat plant at approximately .3 of an inch per day. Thus

a 3 inch application will last about 10 days. Therefore you should plan to irrigate the only acres on which you can apply a 3 inch net application each 10 days.

Evaporation, non-uniformity of application, tail water loss, etc. will reduce irrigation efficiency to around 80%. It is necessary to apply 3.75 inches of water to get a new application of 3 inches.

Technicians of the Soil Conservation Services assisting your Hansford Soil Conservation District are available to help you design and analyze your irrigation system.

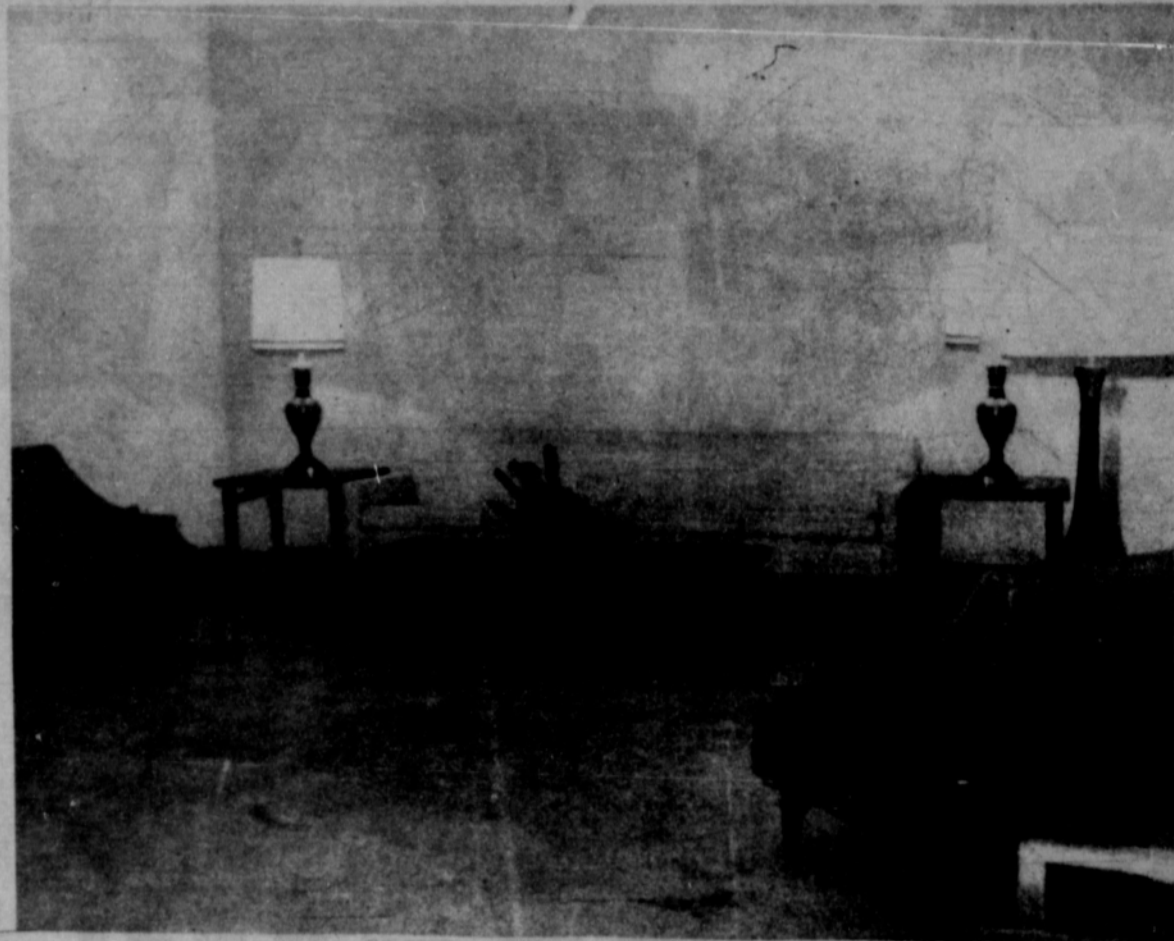

who spoke Sunday at the luncheon for the District 2T-1 Cabinet members and Spearman Lions and Ladies.

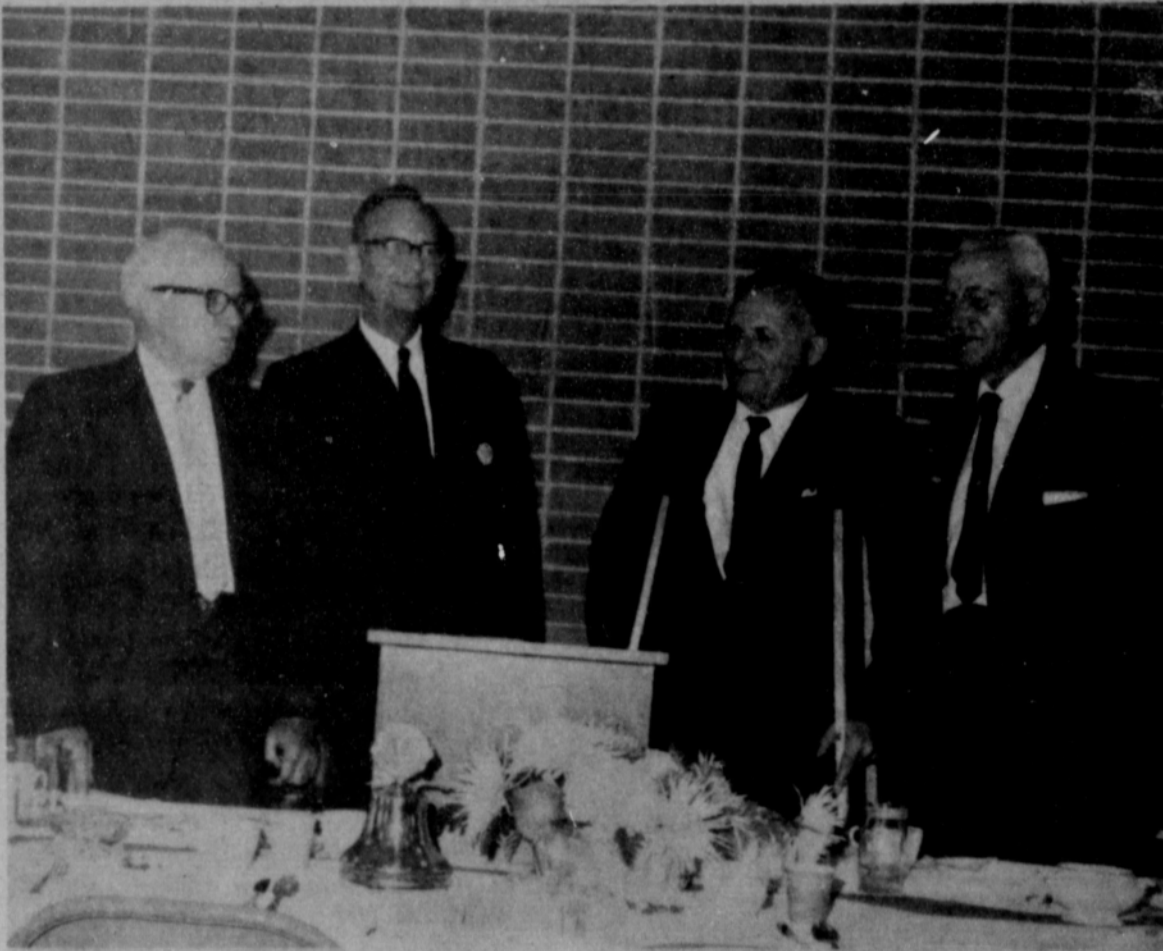

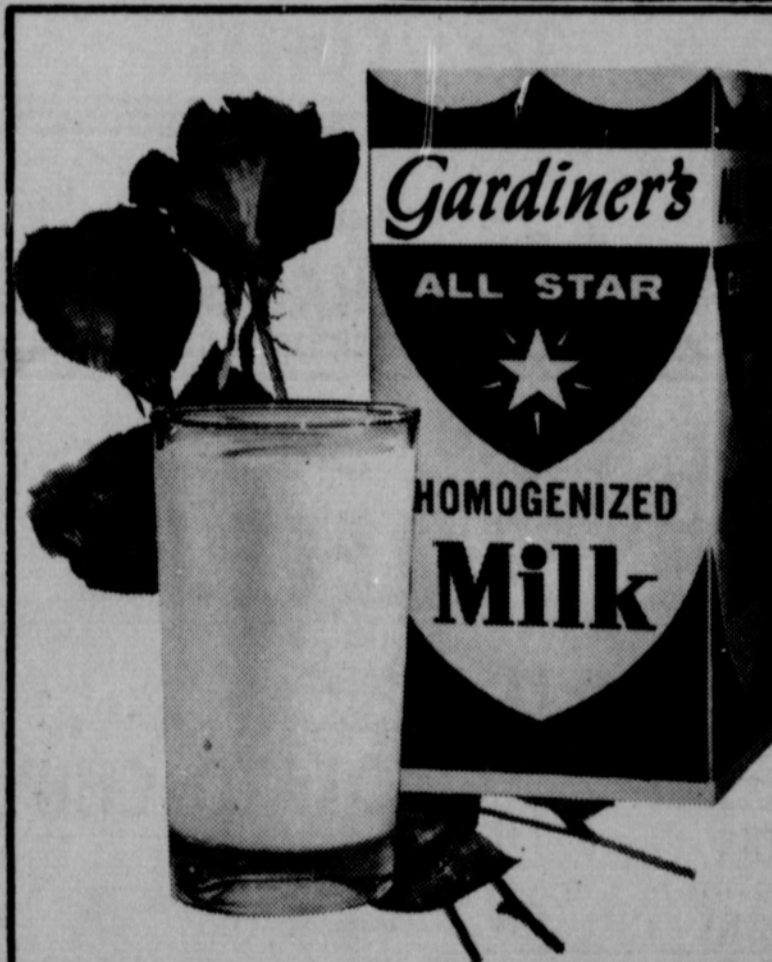
