





BAKED ALASKA AND DEM-ITASSE: SWEETHEART OF A TREAT

If a picture is worth a thousand words, then a beautiful dessert, accompanied by cups of your very best coffee must surely be worth five thousand, At least, we think this luscious Baked Alaska is as sweet a Valentine as you could find. It seems to call for those beautiful, dainty cups that once graced the coffee table at grandmother's home.

Looking pretty as a pic-ture card, our baked billetdoux is one of the most sensationally delicious desserts ever concocted. The forerunner of Baked Alaska dates back many years. Thomas Jefferson, who was among other notable accomplishments, a discerning gourmet, may well have been the originator of this dessert, During Jefferson's presidency he served many new delicacies at White House dinners. One was an ice cream specialty in which ice cream balls were encased in warm pastry shells.

COFFEE AT ITS BEST In keeping with the St. Valentine's Day motif, our

Valentine Baked Alaska has a layer of strawberries, then a layer of strawberry ice cream. The meringue topping is baked just long enough for the peaks to be tipped with brown and served immediately. Happily, if you're planning a St. Valen tine's Day dinner, party you can make the dessert ahead, leaving only the baking until the last minute.

Your coffee, of course, should never, never be made ahead, nor kept on a warming stand more than an hour. Once allowed to cool, coffee loses much of its delicious flavor and fragrance so it should not be reheated. Make your coffee just before refreshment time, then serve it up delectably fresh and aromatic, the way it should be to accompany so lavish a dessert.
