

Citizens Against Poisionous Pollutants!

To our Senators and Representa-

Hansford County, Texas residents and Texas County, Oklahoma residents are very concerned about the proposed E.G. Hill toxic waste

The citizens are rallying together and we have formed an organization we call CAPP (Citizens against Poisonous Pollutants). The people have many questions. Among them are:

1. How well were the plastic

liners of the proposed dump tested? We have very little faith in a plastic. The weather we believe, will dry it out and crack it, the prairie dogs will use it for dessert, and many other considerations have come to our minds.

2. When this hazardous material leaks into the surface sand and water, 20-80 feet down, how long until many windmills and then cattle are contaminated? Also, how long until it flows to Coldwater Creek and then on to Optima

Lake, only to ruin many peoples drinking water, not only local water, recreation, and the wildlife. Water is so precious here.

3. We are worried about our Ogallala Aquifer. That is something that should not be trifled with, it would affect so many people so many dangerous ways.

4. It is planned to haul dry dirt in by truck. The dirt will then be dumped and using a front end loader moved into the toxic dome. Of course, driv-

ing on the bottom plastic layers as they put this in the dome. With our constant winds, the unloading and loading plus any spills these 800 truck loads of toxic waste will have, we are troubled about all the material that will be in our air. Were one of our 70 mile an hour winds come up at an unopportune time some would be very scared of possible consequen-

5. Texas and Hansford County are prime agriculture areas.

Texas County, Oklahoma is situated half a mile north of the proposed dump site. Texas County is ranked first in the State of Oklahoma for production in grain sorghum, corn, and cattle number, their wheat production is ranked in the top 5. In fact, Texas County produces more corn than the rest of the state combined.

Hansford County, Texas had \$111,285,000 estimate cash receipts for 1985 in agriculture. They are ranked 1st in state of Texas in wheat production.

6. Since ANR, those who have filed for the permit for this toxic waste dump, with the EPA has never owned or operated a facility of this kind we are distressed. Are they the ones who monitor and test all this PCB (polychlorinated biphenyls) that is coming into our community and later years also.

Lots of politics this year ...

April 5, 1986 is election time!

A series of city and school elections, county elections, and perhans a bond vote to build the Palo Duro River Authority reservoir, will lead off the 1986 election year for Hansford county voters.

The local elections will serve as a prelude to the county and state elections which Hansford residents will name a slate of county officials and vote with Texans on a governor and other state officeholders.

The elections will be held on April 5th. In contacting officials at the Palo Duro River Authority, we understand that a revenue bond election probably will not be called on April 5th. Board members stated that they need to work out a conservation plan for the lake, as well as some other projects. The Palo Duro reservoir would serve Dumas, Cactus, and Sunray in Moore County; Stinnett in Hutchinson county and Gruver and Spearman in Hansford County.

The major city election will be as follows: Mayor Blodgett's office will be up for election; and we have not contacted the Mayor to see if he is running for re-election. Two Aldermen will be up for election; they are Ed Garner, and Jim Nicholson.

In the school board race, 3 positions will be filled this year; they are Tom Latta, Dennis Nelson, and Charles Shieldknight.

The county will have several positions to fill this year; the county Norman Roman Roman

McClellan will be up for election; County and District clerk Amelia Johnson's office will be up for election; County Treasurer Verna Gail Keim will also be up for election; and two commissioners, Val Winger in precinct 4 and Joe T. Venneman in precinct 2 will be up for election; also, the Justice of the Peace office, held by J.P. Vernon will be up for election
