Merchants Seminar On Hot Checks To Be Held

John L. Hutchison, Hansford County attorney, R. L. McFarlin, Hansford County Sheriff, and Spearman Police Chief Jimmy Jackson, in cooperation with the Spearman Chamber of Commerce Retail Merchants, will co-ordinate a seminar on crime prevention which will include handling hot checks, shoplifting and building security. This seminar will be held on October 9, 1979, at 7:00 P.M. at First State Bank. The program is free and a free booklet covering some of the subjects presented at the program will be given to those in attendance.

The purpose of the program is to familiarize local merchants with the technicalities of theft by check laws and wavs of preventing choplifting, burglaries and thefts. The theft by check laws require that a specific type of notice be given to those giving worthless checks. as well as certain requirements concerning identification of the accused and of the merchandise for which the check is given. Sheriff McFarlin will present a segement of the program which will set out the many ways shoplifters use to steal goods. Spearman Police Chief Jimmy Jackson will also discuss some of the precautions merchants can take regarding building security to prevent nighttime thefts and burglaries.



Donald E. Green, who grew up on a Texas Panhandle ranch and received the Ph.D. from the University of Oklahoma, is professor of History and Director of the Southwestern Studies Program in Central State University, Edmond, Oklahoma. He is the author of several books and articles on the Panhandle-Plains region of Texas and Oklahoma

"Panhandle Pioneer" is the story of Henry C. Hitch, his ranch and his family. In the history of the tristate Panhandle region--the three corners of Oklahoma, Texas and Kansas-the saga of Henry C. Hitch and social, cultural and economic fortunes of the region.

Late in the ninteenth century young James Kerrick Hitch left his home in Tennessee for the High Plains and a hoped-for fortune. After ten years spent working and learning as a maker Series of the University of Oklahoma Press. It was published in August.







National Fire Prevention Week

Prevention Week, but this observance shouldn't be necessary. Common sense dictates that fire prevention should be a year-round custom.

Unfortunately, sense about fire hazards appears none too common, so one week is set aside each year as a

Fire Prevention Week originated because of a fire that shouldn't have happened. On October 9, 1871, carelessness sparked a fire in a modest midwest home. It didn't seem threatening or uncontrollable, but by the next day, more than 2,100 acres of Chicago were burned, claiming more than 200 lives and direct losses in excess of \$168 million.

On the same day, the worst forest fire in U.S. history broke in Peshtigo, Wisc., claiming 1.152 lives and burning more than 1.28 million acres.

As a reminder, Fire Prevention Week is observed annually on the anniversary of the Chicago and Peshtigo tragedies. In 1922, it became a national observance by presidential proclamation. The proclamation stated: "Fires are not deplorable accidents, but the consequences of neglect and carelessness.'
