Farmers Ask For 100 Wells

With the rains still refusing to come to Hansford County. irrigation continued to become more important. The 100th irrigation well application of the year was made this week by Donnie Thoreson.

The number of applications for wells during the first four and one-half months of this year, more than doubles the number of applications made last year. Only 36 applications were filed in 1962.

There have been only 325 wells drilled in the county since irrigation was introduced here.

Donnie has 4 irrigation wells now and has plans for 3 more. He said he could visualize in the future an irrigation well for each 200 acres of cropland in our area.

Donnie lives and farms near Hitchland. He and his Dad, who passed away last year, have been Cooperators with the Hansford Soil Conservation District since 1952. They were among the first irrigation farmers in our District. Donnie knows the importance of Soil and Water Conservation as is evidenced by the many Conservation Practices being applied on the farms he owns and operates.

Spearman's new high school building is 87 percent complete, the school board was told Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the board.

The report to the board was made in connection with the regular presentation of the bill for the work completed on the building. The builder added that he had used only 75 percent of the time allotted for the construction, or he still has 89 working days left to finish the building.

The board, upon the architect's approval of the work completed, pays a portion of the building cost each month,

Bob Skinner Hurt In Plane Wreck

A Spearman pilot is confined to a Dallas hospital with back injuries received in a light plane accident at Wolfe City Saturday at 6:30 p. m.

Pobert V. Skinner is ! hospital being treated for an injured vertebra. He was transferred to the Dallas Hospital from the Wolfe City Hospital Monday.

His wife said Tuesday that he will be in the Dallas Hospital for approximately a week, then he will be transferred to Spearman and be in a brace for several more weeks.

Two passengers in the plane, Mrs. Burl McClellan and Jim Davis, were uninjured.

The trio were only 14 miles from their destination, Commerce, when the engine of the plane failed.

Here is Jim Davis' account of the attempted forced landing and crash:

"We were flying at about

mile south of Wolfe City when the engine apparently blew a valve. Bob started looking for a place to land and the closest place we could find was a small west of Wolfe City, surrounded by trees.

"As soon as we found the airstrip, Bob started losing altitude to land, but when we got down, there was not enough of the strip left to land on and he tried to pull back up to go around for another attempt. The motor refused to produce the power needed.

"The plane then hit the top of some trees that were at the end of the runway. The trees pulled the plane down into a dirt road and as the Piper Tri-Pacer skidded across the road it turned side ways and when it went into the other ditch it flipped on around and the tail section wrapped around a large Bois de Arc corner post in a fence.

Davis helped his sister and Skinner from the plane, He had to free Skinner from the steering wheel of the plane. It was bent down and holding the pilot in his seat.

Two men who landed in another plane right after the crash, stayed with-Skinner while a passerby, took Davis and Mrs. McClellan to town to get an ambulance for the injured pilot.

Rogers Says, "No Other Program".

A rejection of present wheat controls in the May 21 referendum would have "a very telling effect" on the economy of the Panhandle, Rep. Walter Rogers said Saturday.

He indicated that Congressmen from large cities might defeat a move for further wheat legislation if farmers reject present controls.

The Pampa Congressman flew to Amarillo en route to Borger, where he and the late A. A. Meredith were honored Saturday night for their efforts in connection with the Canadian River Dam. Mrs. Rogers accompanied her husband. They flew commercial airline to A marillo, then continued by car to Rep. Rogers' Pampa office Saturday afternoon.

"A minimum of 40 members (of Congress) have told me that if the farmers defeat the legislation they (the Congressmen) won't vote for other farm legislation this year, " Rogers said, He added the Congressmen say they couldn't explain to their constituents why they supported new farm legislation after the farmers rejected present con-

"I feel the farmers should have whatever they want (in the way of supports), but they should know all the facts before they decide, " Rep. Rogers said.

He also pointed out the continuing shift of population, and therefore the number of Congressmen, to large cities. The ratio of city representatives to rural representative has shifted since the last Congressional session from 6 to 4. to 7 to 3, Rep. Rogers said.

Asked about the effect of a "No" vote on the referendum. Rep. Rogers answered:

"Well, the next question is, what will it do to the price of wheat? It will reduce the price, of course, and will have a very telling effect on the economy.

"I would do all I could to prevent the price of wheat dropping to \$1 or \$1, 15 (per bushel), because I know what it would do to this country.

"The outcome will probably be determined by the small farmer. "


