Members of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce highcommittee will be in Austin Jan. 25 to meet with the State Highway Commission to get two highways renumbered through Spearman.

One highway will be rerouted to make a continuous highway from Tulsa.

highway from Tulsa, Okla., to Farmington, N. M. This will be Highway 15 which now goes from Spearman to Borger and on south.

After it is changed 15 will turn west at Spearman, go through Gruver, Stratford, Dalhart, Clayton and on to the west through Taos, N.M. and on to Farmington. It will go east through Perryton, Booker, Woodward, Okla., and east to Tulsa.

The second road will come from the south through Borger and on to Perryton. This highway will be numbered later. It will begin in Big Spring and join U.S. Highway 83 in Per-

Manager Don Floyd announced this week that the Chamber and Industrial Foundation has options on four plant sites for the firm, if it selects Spearman as the location of the

plant.

Floyd said the plant would be built by a new corporation, if it can secure permission from the federal government to build such a plant.

Spearman and Perryton are the Texas towns being considered and also Guymon, Woodward and Moreland, Okla.

The proposed plant will employ 20 to 25 men. It will use seven to eight million cubic feet of gas per day, 200 million gallons of water per year, and 20 million kilowatts of, electricity per year.

The fertilizer will be mar-keted all over the area from Lubbock to Garden City, Kan. and from New Mexico to Tul-

Floyd said the Chamber and Industrial Foundation has been working forseveral months se-curing options on sites for the plant. It will need 50 acres.

The possibility of getting the plant was not announced until all of the preliminary work was completed and the new firm decided upon the general 'area in which it was

This is the first big industry to be sought here as a coordinated effort between the Chamber of Commerce and the recently organized Industrial Foundation.

Floyd said the local organizations learned about the proposed plant through the industrial department of Community Public Service.

Even if you are not an officer of your club you still carry a responsibility of knowing to a certain extent, officers duties and your own duties as a member.

During part of the month of January, I will devote the space in my column to setting forth the general qualifications and responsibilities of club officers and members for your informa-

Starting at the top of the ex-ecutive offices are the organi-zation president, and vice pres-ident. The vice president does not (nor should not, as many elected to this position are prone to believe)have a "snap" job to perform. A responsible vice president should not only know the duties of the presidency, but carry out other functions as delegated to him by his club members.

In many clubs, the vice president is the program chairman. This means being in charge of the program for the meeting, seeing that the program is prepared and will be given. The program is presented to be a program of the program of program chairman, if neces-sary, arranges for guest speak-ers, gives guest speakers notice of time, place and other information.

The President is the official representative for his club. He representative for his club. He presides at the meetings, and is responsible for the parliamentary conduct of the meeting. When presiding, the best way to get through the entire meeting without forgetting something, is to make careful preparations before the meeting. List items to be on the ing. List items to be on the program with the name of the person who is responsible for each.

To get the most from the members of your organization, divide responsibilities of the group. Encourage each mem-ber to participate in some way to help them help their organi-

For getting a motion before the club, practice your club members in the use of "I move that ---" instead of "I make a motion that ---" Besides being correct and sounding much better, the phrase "I move that saves two words in the



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## Early Reading Readies Child TA For Education

school his parents may prepare him for successful learning at school-by reading to him daily for his pleasure, answering his questions kindly, explaining things to him, and enjoying conversation with him as a developing person. In similar di-rections his parents can help him indefinitely to succeed after he enters school.

When he begins to read he may enjoy showing his parents and other family members how well he can read from his school reader or other sources. He then will grow most in proportion to the ap-preciation of the family members in his reading or other school achievement. How different this experience will be from having his parents command-ing him to read to them or to work at reading as a painful

Before he receives assigned homework he may have gained the kind of success which will prepare him for effective home study later. Long before en-tering school the child, if he is going to succeed at school, will need to have learned to adapt to reasonable family routines and regulations and to continue such adaptations. Among these regulations will be such common matters as that of viewing TV, being indoors after dark during his preschool years and at home during school years on nights before school days. He will learn responsibility self-care as easily as possible and for doing some regular chores faithfully about the home. He will learn, moreover, to respect the rights of other persons in the family and bevond the family

When homework begins the school child needs to practice during a regular study period with as few interruptions as possible, going at his homework without fiddling around. Suppose at the age of 10 or 14 he ways he has no homework? He says he has no homework? He will profit then from being required for a rather definite period to read from desirable sources. This usually is preferable to assigning him to do school work, as in spelling or




