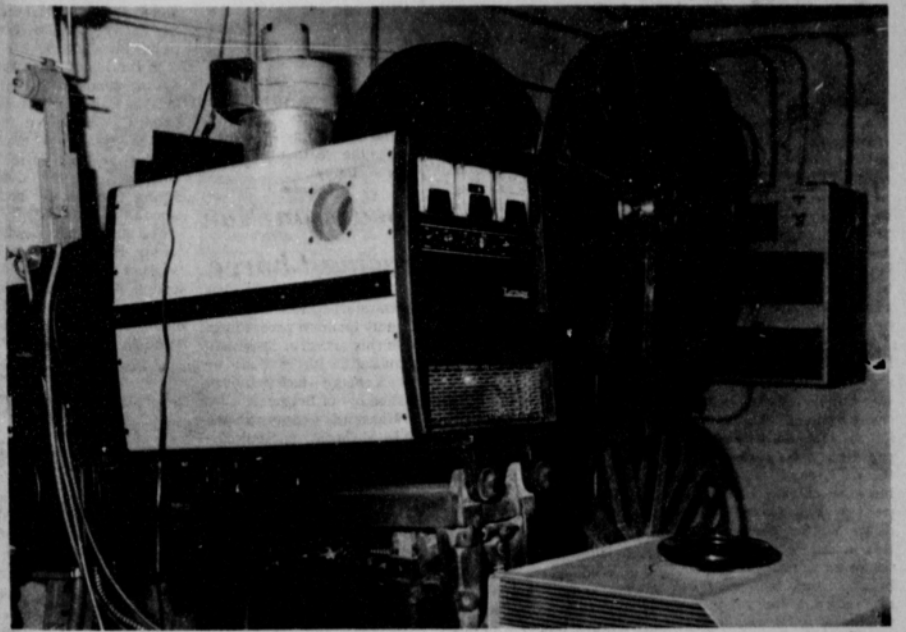

New owners at Lyric

Many years ago there was a popular movie about the affairs of a very hardy family and the affairs of that family kept many of the nation's off-screen families so interested that it was a family affair to see the latest in that series.

Perhaps that's why the new owners of the Lyric Theater in Spearman, when other movie houses are falling victim to minus attendance and attendant financial losses, have launched an effort, based on a continuing supply of family or general audience films, to make movie-going a family affair. Or maybe it was the sights and sounds, the laughter and the crowd noise when the villain was about to ambush the hero. Maybe it was just the lure of big stars in the movie business and the extravaganza they were starring in at the moment.

It could have been the aroma of the hot, buttered popcorn and the other delicacies available at the concession booth to go along with a soft drink.

Whatever that mysterious fascination was, Alton Ellsworth and his wife, Peggy, of Spearman will try to revive some of that old mystique about "the magic of the silver screen" through operations at the Lyric Theater in Spearman which he and his wife recently purchased from Wright Hale.

Ellsworth is not forsaking the Gulf Oil Wholesale business he has built in the Spearman area, he is just directing his efforts in an additional activity in today's diversified interests climate. He has relinquished his interest in a service station which he owned and operated for 25 years so he can concentrate on his wholesale transactions and his movie house.

Adjusting the lens on the projector when required to get the picture right on the screen (and quiet any attendant catcalls and hoots and hollers from the attendees), turning on the popcorn-machine in time for the first customers, overseeing the cleaning and maintenance of the floors, carpets and seats and all the other things necessary to owning and operating a profitable movie theater in addition to being ticket taker as well as ticket seller when necessary is not new to Ellsworth.

As a boy growing up in Spearman around the time the City was beginning to grow through various incorporation procedures, Ellsworth was one of the lucky lads of the community; he was employed at the old movie theater when it was located elsewhere in the City.

That other theater was next door to the drug stores and Ellsworth and his sister were two of the many kids in

town who got to see the show because they worked in the movie theater or managed an extra dip of ice cream from time to time because they worked in the drug store.

As if that wasn't enough, he and his sister did a little newspapering back then, a weekly by the name of the Spearman Press which had one page of news on Page 1, or the front page, and the other page or pages contained motion picture advertising if there was more than one page printed back to back. He recalls having good times doing this, afternoons and on Saturdays when he wasn't in school or doing something with the family.

Things won't be the same as the old days because surroundings, times and other circumstances are different, he opined, but he expressed the belief that a comparable effort through obtaining and showing G or family-type movies can lead to a family theater atmosphere.

Realizing that there is a pretty good trade area for the Lyric Theater to draw from with the theater in Gruver closed and the one in Stratford also out of business, Ellsworth and his crew have redone the lobby and enlarged the concession stand and thoroughly cleaned the theater floors, aisles, carpets and seats. Additional improvements will be installed from time to time as finances permit.

The future billings will include predominantly G or the family-type movies since he can acquire them from his sources rather than being required to take just any film under a contract.

Along the lines of the family theater concept he envisions, Ellsworth is hopeful that youth and adult attendees will also assist in that effort by not doing anything destructive or detrimental to the theater and its operations.

In pointing out how he will book his films based on what is available he mentioned the

requirements of film companies as to the conditions under which their films can be shown provides a time lapse of several weeks before it is anywhere near profitable to bring the film to the theater here.

Noting that there are four independents making most the G or family-type films now (Pacific International, Doty-Dayton, Sunn International and Walt Disney Productions), Ellsworth is drawing down on that supply for such ones as "Pony Express Rider", "The Shaggy DA", "The Amazing Dobermans", "Baker's Hawk", "The Little Horse Thieves", "Freaky Friday", "Never A Dull Moment", and "Wilderness Family".

He continued by pointing out that in 1975, 117 new pictures were made and Wright used 52 of them in Spearman and the rest were unuseable for the local area.

A native of Blackwell, Oklahoma, and veteran of World War II, Ellsworth and his wife acquired the Lyric Theater, the drive-in south of town and other lots from Hale who was wanting to make some changes because bad health was becoming an impairment. The transaction was completed last October.

The Lyric Theater has been at its present address at 113 Main about 30 years, having been moved there from its previous location on Main Street where Santaland is situated.

The present address is part of the original town of Spearman.

Pictures will be shown every night of the week as usual. While he is studying a return to the old routine of a Saturday afternoon show he is not ready to include that in his operating schedule right now. If and when such a matinee operation would not prove a liability to the business, he reported he might be willing to consider it.

Ellsworth and his wife are Baptists, attending the First Baptist Church.

Two members of the Board of City Development who also serve as directors of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce, George Young and Dick Hudson, have been appointed by Council.

Hudson was appointed to a three-year term which ends

in 1979. Young is to serve a two-year term which ends in 1978.

In other action: All bids on Lot 9, Block 2, and Lot 7, Block 38, which had been offered for sale were rejected by Council.

The 1975-76 audit as presented by Mason and Henton, with privilege to review the audit from time to time, was accepted.

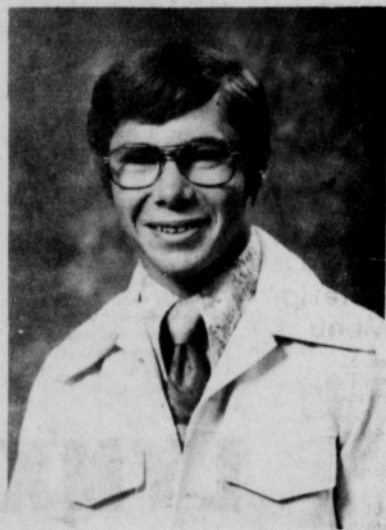
Mayor Blodgett read a letter on the law enforcement commission resolution.

Lions Told More Boys Learning Home Economics

Spearman Lions Club members and guests Tuesday were treated to an unusual program presented by Mrs. Frances Hudson, Vocational Home Economics teacher at Spearman High School, and two of her students, Gregg Price and Tammy Rook.

In relating some facts and figures about home economics for her audience at Martin's Steak Garden, Mrs. Hudson pointed out that today 28 percent of all students enrolled in home economics classes in high schools in the nation are males.

Outlining activities of Future Homemakers of America at SHS, Miss Rook told of such projects as the annual Sweetheart Banquet, the Secret Grandparent and the annual Achievement-Banquet which is to be held in May. She also mentioned that the annual election of high school chapter officers will be held in April.

Home family living was the main idea of Price's remarks. He touched on subjects pertaining to home family life which boys are participating in such as discussions on marriage and role partners play in a marriage, the abuse of drugs, the civil aspects of marriage, cooking, as part of the home family life, and sewing.

As part of the current home economics program, field trips are included to such places as a courtroom with proceedings in progress, a funeral home and visits to the maternity ward at the hospital. He mentioned that on this latter trip, one of the boys in the class fainted.

A current project for the boys is sewing down-filled ski jackets. As a portion of her presentation, Mrs. Hudson related the "cycle" stages directly related to marriage which can be initiated with the acquisition of a sports car (or an older car if funding for the sports vehicle is not available) for dating purposes and then then leads to marriage which then leads to the babybuggy state, then to the tricycle period, from there to the bicycle category and in many instances, the motorcycle status before winding up in the stationwagon category which later evolves into a smaller car before the necessity of a wheelchair to wind up what she humorously termed the cycle of wheels.

Losers in the boys pairings Thursday were Boys Ranch, Guymon, Sunray and Dalhart.

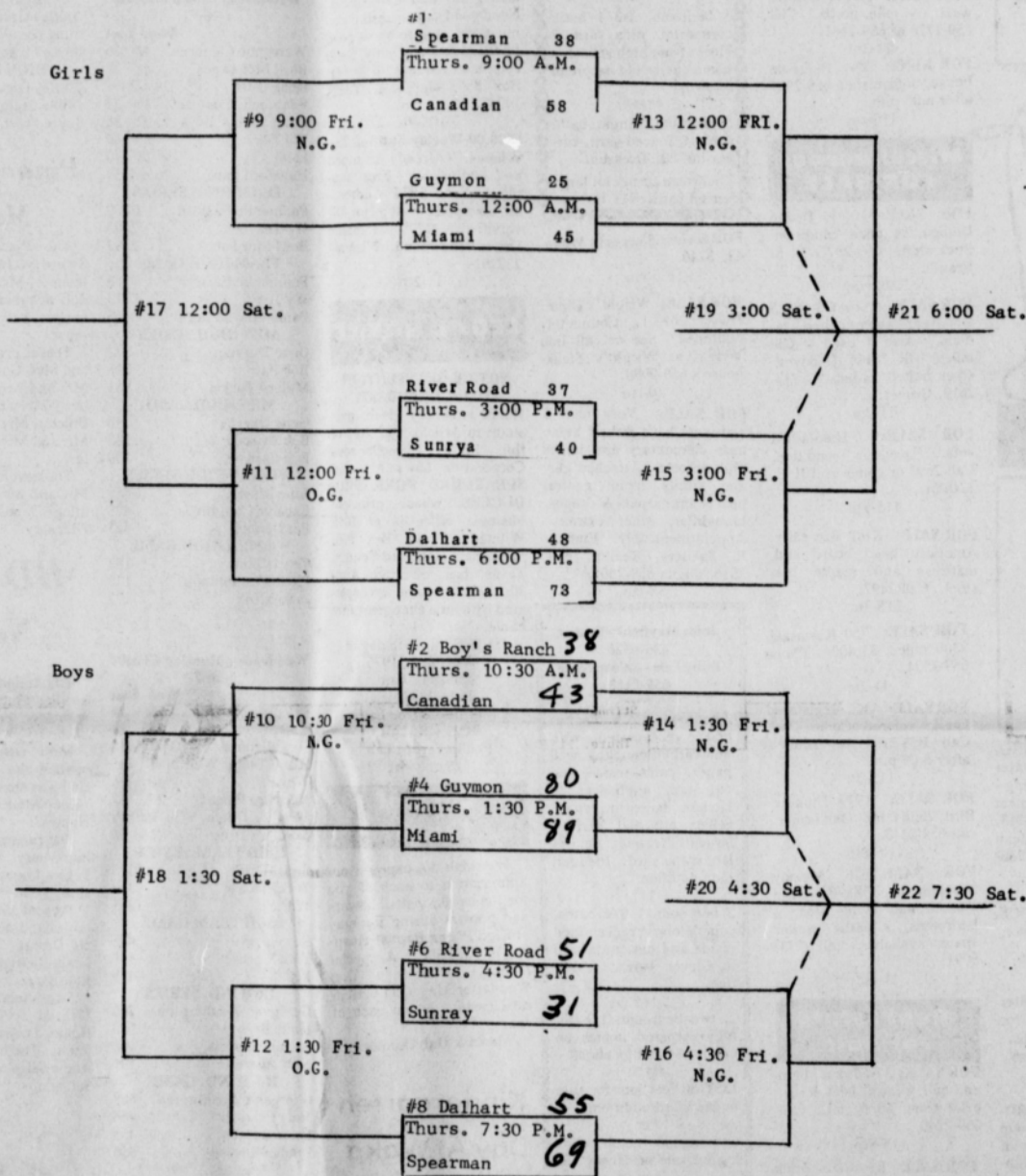

PROTRUDING OBJECT PERIL

Most protruding objects around the house or at work are not potential dangers. But then there are those that are just begging for the human form to strike. Such as protruding pipes, hooks, towel racks, branches, shelf corners or open cabinet doors.

A photo in a medical journal provided gruesome evidence of how serious such an accident can be. It depicted an eye nearly torn from the socket by the projecting hook of a peg board.

The "run into" accident usually occurs unexpectedly. Your best defense is to get rid of the things that lie in wait for the unwary. Inspect your home for projecting men-

aces. A glass shelf over a sink is a sure trap for anyone bending over to rinse his face. Check your work bench and make sure that there is nothing you could strike as you bend over it. Also make sure that the lighting is adequate to give the potential victim an even shake.

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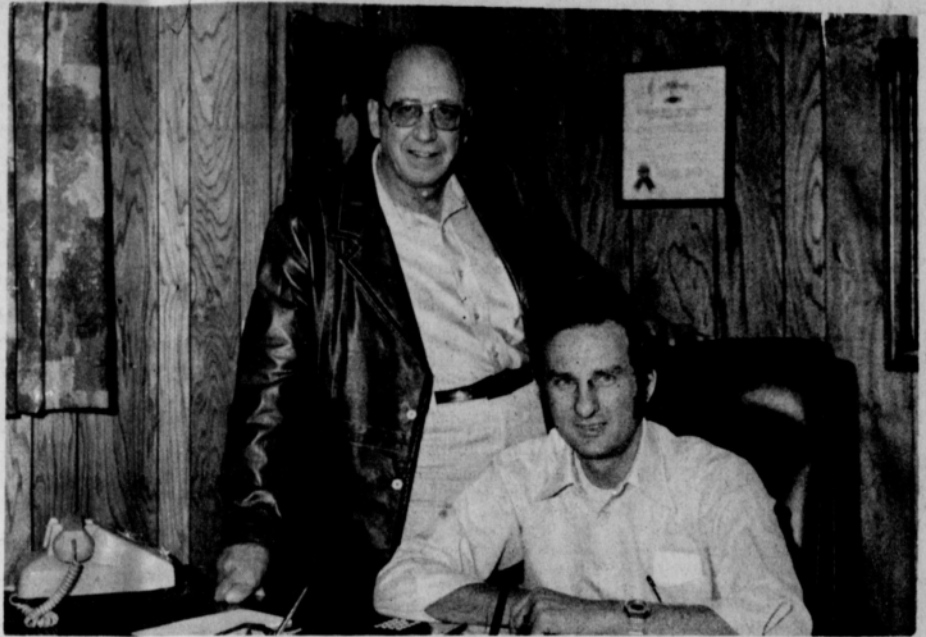
