Sheriff's Report

Field Day

The latest research on cotton varieties, corn, irrigation, and weed control will be featured attractions for the 69th annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for Lubbock and Halfway. The event begins at 1 p.m. Tuesday, September 12 at the research

site, 14 miles west of Plainview. Hansford County producers will find the program particularly applicable, said Garland Stewart, county Extension ag-

Research efforts at the Lubbock and Halfway station focus especially upon the needs of producers in Hansford County and throughout the High Plains of Texas.

The annual field day alternates between the TAES locations at Lubbock and Halfway, Stewart said. Field tours will be conducted throughout the afternoon, with tractor-drawn trailers shuttling visitors to key demonstrations.

The field day is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the High Plains Research Foundations, the Science Education Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and the National Weather Ser-

Principal stops on the tour of the Halfway station will feature reports on irrigation effects on corn, tests of new cotton varieties, research on weed control, effective management of farm labor, and a new mobile trickle irrigation system, Stewart said.

During the stops on the tour of the 320-acre research site, Experiment Station scientists and Extension Service specialists will answer questions and discuss problems with the visit-

The field day also will present a display of machinery and equipment by area implement

For this reason the Spearman Lions Club and the Panhandle Branch of the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness will co-sponsor a free screening for the "Sneak Thief of Sight" in the Fellowship Hall of Spearman First United Methodist Church, 407 South Haney, on Thursday, October 5, from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Glaucoma is characterized by increased fluid pressure within the eye. This pressure destroys blood vessels and nerve fibers in the eye resulting in eventual blindness. It is an insidious process which nibbles away at vision without pain or noticeable symptoms. Sights destroyed by glaucoma cannot be restored; thus early detection is imperative.

To measure pressure within the eye at the free Spearman screening, members of the Top O" Texas Medical Society will give a simple, painless with an instrument called a "tonometer." The test takes only a

minute--but "it is a minute that can mean a lifetime of sight to someone in Spearman," says R. L. Kleeberger, M. D., medical chairman of the screening, warning that an estimated 94, 000 Texans have the disease and only half of them may be

aware of it. The screenings are approved by the Top O' Texas Medical





Fall fertilization of summer grasses means applying 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre plus the phosphorus and potash requirements for next year's plete fertilizer in early fall and applying only nitrogen next spring can be effective.

Stewart stresses that the amount of phosphorus and potash applied must be based on the level of these nutrients in the soil if the practice is to be profitable. Information from soil tests will identify those soils deficient or adequate in phosphorus and potash as well as the

lime requirement.

If you have not been fertilizing summer grasses for fall production, you may want to consider this practice, says Stewart. The advantages outweigh the potential losses of these nutrients due to leaching from winter rains.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978**

"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homeproperty taxation.

The amendment quires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence home-stead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount mated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment propraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.
