

## Lynxettes In Irish Finals

Spearman's Lynxettes rolled into the finals of the Shamrock tournament Saturday night by taking wins over Wheeler and Samnorwood Thursday and Friday.

Spearman had to come from behind in the second half of both games to take the victories.

Friday afternoon Barbara Wilde hit 17 of 22 field goal attempts for a 77 percent average. She added six free shots to make her total 40 points for the game. She had 21 points Thursday for a two-game total of 61 points.

Thursday Spearman was trailing Wheeler 18-16 at the half but in the second half, Donnell, Ownbey and Pattison held Wheeler to 14 points while Spearman was putting in 23.

Friday Wilde really gave a demonstration of how effective the hook shot can be. Coach Dean Weese said she would go the right for a few buckets, then when the defenders blocked that side, she would go to the left.

Clarendon ganged their defense on her, but still could not keep her from getting her shots.

The defensive unit held Samnorwood to 10 points in the second half. Samnorwood was one of the favorites in the tournament along with Spearman and Briscoe. Spearman was to meet Briscoe Saturday night.

## Lynx Fall

Spearman Lynx basketballers knocked off one of the favorites in the Shamrock tournament Thursday, then fell Friday to another favorite, Clarendon.

Thursday the Lynx walloped Samnorwood 54-30 behind the 24 point effort of Larry Butts. Friday, Butts again led the Lynx with 20 points, but Clarendon won 52-41.

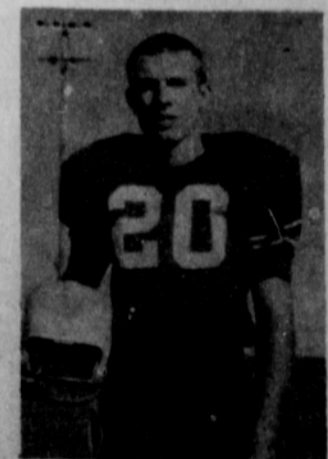
Thursday Spearman led all the way over Samnorwood as Butts hit 11 field goals and two free throws. He was the only Lynx to get in the double figures, but seven others got on the scoreboard.

Friday the Clarendon Broncos had too much jump for the Lynx and Spearman was too cold at the foul line. Clarendon had only a one field goal edge in the game, but they made 18 of 29 free shots and Spearman could hit only nine of 20.

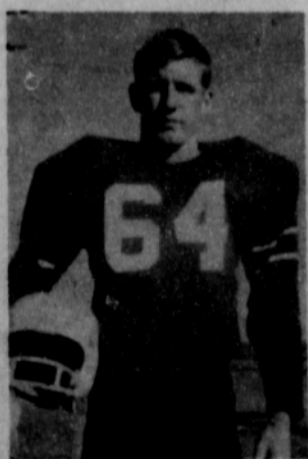
## Two Make All-District Team

## Modern Math Trains Students To Produce Computer Problems

Modern mathematics trains children to think mathematically, says Roy E. Dawson, retired college mathematics instructor and consultant for Addison-Wesley Publishing Co., of Dallas.

Dawson conducted a workshop

for math teachers in the Spearman elementary grades Thursday afternoon and Friday morning.

He said many parents have been worried about the "new mathematics", but once they see and understand the system, they

will have no worries.

The man who has spent his life teaching mathematics said old math and the new math come out at the same place. However, a student learning the new math will understand why he gets the right answer to 2 plus 2 instead of just memorizing the answer.

This is the first change in teaching math since the eighth century. Dawson said in the eighth century our system of numbers was brought from the Hindu nations to Arabia, then to Spain and finally to Rome. At that time, teachers decided it would be impossible for people to understand the new math. Therefore, they decided it would be taught by memorizing the rules with no explanation of why the rules were true. The method of teaching had not changed until the present "new math" was introduced.

In the new system, math is taught by discovery experiences. A student learns by experience and not by memorizing many rules.

What a student discovers for himself will be retained much longer, Dawson said.

By making math more meaningful and understandable, Dawson said, higher mathematics will be easier for students. In modern math a student never leaves an idea. It keeps coming back and each time it returns, it is more advanced.

With the new math, the instructor said, a student now in the fourth grade can be through with calculus when he finishes high school. He will be two years ahead of the students completing high school now.

Great civilizations have migrated and have also perished because of a lack of water, Tom McFarland told the audience at the Hansford Bankers' Award banquet Tuesday night.

McFarland, Manager of the High Plains Water District and a long time disciple of water conservation, spoke to some 200 persons attending the banquet given each year by the Gruver State Bank and the First State Bank of Spearman.

He pointed out that water is becoming so important that it may replace the atom as the balance of power in the world.

To illustrate his point, McFarland said near Bagdad wells are being drilled 2,000 ft. deep to get five gallons of water per minute. By 1980, Americans will be using 600 billion gallons of water per day, twice our present consumption. We are having troubles meeting our current demands, he commented.

People have little concern about the current water problems. They are complacently letting a giant problem creep up on them. The public cannot see the water problem, so they are not concerned.

Irrigation water has turned the High Plains into one of the major food producing areas of the world. By 1968 there will be no surpluses in some foods and by the year 2,000 our food demands will be doubled.

McFarland said the amount of water on the High Plains is declining, but as the demand for food increases, the nation and world will expect us to continue to produce more and more food. It cannot be produced without water.

He said some people expect to get water from areas that have a surplus. People in the areas of surplus water are going to let their water go to areas that have the best records of utilizing the water they have.

McFarland stressed that local areas will be able to retain

control of their water supplies only as long as they meet and solve their problems and use the water to the best advantage.

Two farmers who have been strong advocates of water and soil conservation received awards at the banquet.

Wesley Garnett was named the outstanding conservation farmer and W. L. (Bill) Johnson of Oslo was named the outstanding soil conservation district supervisor.

Garnett farms 640 acres three miles south of Spearman. He has 556 acres under irrigation, 63 acres of native rangeland, and 21 acres of irrigated pasture. He has two wells.

He has a Great Plains Conservation Program; the practices include 6,560 feet of pipeline, 120 acres of land leveling, 397 acres, irrigation water management, 21 acres of pasture planting, nine acres dead litter cover, 54 acres deferred grazing, 54 acres proper range use, 556 acres of conservation cropping system and crop residue use while maintaining more than a 50 bushel wheat yield.

In the future he plans to install 2,000 more feet of pipe, 180 additional acres of irrigation water management, nine acres range seeding, 155 rods of fencing and one livestock storage facility.

Johnson was elected to the board of supervisors in 1951 when the district was organized. Besides serving his district, he is a leader in conservation. He attends many state and area conservation meetings.

Clay Gibner of the First State Bank presented the award to Johnson and J. C. Harris of Gruver presented the award to Garnett.

Rudie Tate of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association briefly told the group about the organization and its effort in promoting sales, research and

(Continued from page 1) said, five years ago, when educators tried to introduce modern math in the high schools first. It has to begin in the grades. "You have to start with a foundation, no matter what you are building," he commented. Dawson believes children must be trained to think mathematically. There is no longer a need for people to do mathematical computation. Machines can do it faster and more accurately. Students learning math today must be trained to provide the problems to be put into the computers.
