Modern Math Trains Students To Produce Computer Problems

mathematics trains children to think mathematically, says Roy E. Dawson, retired college mathematics instructor and consultant for Addison-Wesley Publishing Co., of Dallas.

Dawson conducted a workshop

for math teachers in the Spear-man elementary grades Thurs-day afternoon and Friday morn-

ing.
He said many parents have been worried about the "new mathematics", but once they see and understand the system, they

will have no worries,

The man who has spent his life teaching mathematics said old math and the new math old math and the new math come out at the same place. However, a student learning the new math will understand why he gets the right answer to 2 plus 2 instead of just memoriz-

ing the answer.

This is the first change in teaching math since the eighth century.

Dawson said in the century. Dawson said in the eighth century our system of numbers was brought from the Hindu nations to Arabia, then to Spain and finally to Rome. At that time, teachers decided it would be impossible for people to understand the new math. Therefore, they decided it would be taught by memoriz-ing the rules with no explana-The method of teaching had not changed until the present "new math" was introduced.

In the new syste, math is taught by discovery experien-ces. A student learns by exper-ience and not by memorizing

many rules.

What a student discovers for himself will be retained much

himself will be retained much longer, Dawson said.

By making math more meaningful and understandable, Dawson said, higher mathematics will be easier for students. In modern math a student never leaves an idea, It keeps coming back and each time it returns, it is more advanced.

With the new math, the instructor said, a student now in the fourth grade can be through with calculus when he finishes high school. He will be two years ahead of the students completing high school now.

He has a Great Plains Conservation Program; the practices include 6, 560 feet of pipeline, 120 acres of land leveling, 397 acres, irrigation water management, 21 acres of pasture planting, nine acres dead litter cover, 54 acres deferred grazing. cover, 54 acres deferred grazing, 54 acres proper range use, 556 acres of conservation cropping system and crop residue use while maintaining more than a 50 bushel wheat yield.

In the future he plans to install 2, 000 more feet of pipe, 180 additional acres of irrigation water management, nine acres range seeding, 155 rods of fencing and one livestock storage facility.

foundation, no matter what you are building," he commented.

Dawson believes children must be trained to think mathematically. There is no longer a need for people to do mathematical computation. Machines can do it faster and more accurately.

Students learning math today must be trained to provide the problems to be put into the computers.


