## Ugly Knee Is Popular With Town Grid Fans

It is not very pretty and it will never be displayed in a full page color picture in "Playboy", but right now there is a very popular knee in Spearman.

The knee belongs to Mike Morris. The interest in the knee is if it is strong enough for the all-around athlete and leader to play his senior year of eligibility.

With the opening football practice session just about a week away, Morris thinks the knee is ready. He has been preparing the knee for its test since last December. Now, he thinks it will pass with flying colors.

There has been a long and strenuous rebuilding program for the knee. The devoted athlete has driven himself to complete the program. He has been ahead of schedule all the way.

Morris injured the knee in a freak accident in the sixth game last season. He was in pursuit of a runner when he turned and the knee gave way. There was no one near him when he fell.

"I don't know what happened, unless I stepped in a small hole as I was turning. I was running, suddenly it seemed like all my weight was on the leg and I was falling. I have looked at the film of the game several times and cannot tell what I did," Morris said.

The boy who had been a starting halfback since he was a freshman, tried to come back before the season was over, but the leg refused to cooperate and in December he underwent an operation in Oklahoma City.

Mrs. Morris said his first question to the doctor after the operation was: "Can I play football?"

The doctor said, "No, not right now, but if you work hard enough you can probably play next fall."

Morris started working before the cast was removed. He would raise the leg with just the weight

of the cast several times a day. Then on Feb. 28, the doctor examined the leg and said the cast could come off. It was removed two weeks ahead of time.

After the cast was removed Morris began lifting a foot weight. He started with a 10 pound weight raising it slowly at least 30 times. From 10 pounds he worked the weight on the foot up to 20 pounds raising it slowly at least 30 times.

His mother said he would sit on the kitchen bar and do this exercises lots of times. "It was not too good on the bar, but I decided what he was trying to do meant much more to him than

## Morse To Appeal Transfer Decision

The Morse Independent School District Board will appeal to the State Commissioner of Education the Hansford County School Boards decision to allow 10 students to transfer from the Morse school district.

Morse Supt. John Brumley

said this week that a notice of appeal has been filed with the County Board and a request for a hearing will be made to the State Commissioner of Education.

The Commissioner will set the date for the hearing in Austin.

In the June 16 meeting the County Board approved the transfer of 10 students from the Morse district to the Gruver and Spearman districts.

The Morse board appealed the transfers and requested a hearing before the county board. In the hearing the board reaffirmed its earlier action. Now, Morse is appealing to the state commissioner.

Eight of the students transferred to the Gruver district and two came to the Spearman district. Nine of the 10 students have been transferring to Spearman and Gruver in previous years.

Brumley said Morse has approximately 40 students pre-enrolled for high school this fall. The transfers will not effect this enrollment.

## City Employs New Officer

Routine business took up most of the time of the City Council Monday night at its regular meeting in the Spearman City Hall.

Police Chief Wayne Pierce reported his department had issued 50 traffic violation tickets during July. Two persons were injured in traffic accidents and there were \$1450 in property damage in the accidents. Four traffic violations were filed as the result of the accidents.

A new city employee was approved by the council. Coy Thompson, 26, was hired as a relief policeman and animal control officer. He has been with the Amarillo police department for four years.

A new policy of handling pets that are allowed to run loose will be started. Animal control officers now cannot go on private property and get a pet that was in the street when they started chasing it.

Now, the owner of the animal will be issued a citation to appear in corporation court for allowing the dog to run loose.

City employees were granted a cost of living wage increase that will become effective Oct. 1.

A yield sign will be installed on First street at the corner of First and Endicott. Several near accidents have occurred at the corner.

## School Needing Two Instructors

Supt. James Bramlett is still seeking two teachers to fill his faculty for the new school year which opens Aug. 31.

The school still needs a math teacher and a speech correction instructor. The superintendent said both positions are hard to fill.

The faculty has been increased by three teachers over last year. Increased enrollment made it necessary to add another first grade teacher, a fourth grade teacher and a combination English-Social Studies teacher in High School. If a speech-correction teacher can be found, there will be a total of four more teachers in the system.

a kitchen bar." she added.

After the foot weights he advanced to a weight device he and football coach Don Seymour rigged up. This consisted of a bar bell in a frame that Morris could raise with his feet by lying on the floor and pushing up. He worked up to 200 pounds with the device.

Near the end of school the doctor told him he could start running in a straight line. He has been running ever since and has been able to add the cuts and turns.

He still works on the weights and tries to run at least four or five miles each day. He runs during the hottest part of the day.

"It is going to be hot when we start wearing pads and I am not going to get sick," he explains as the reason for selecting the hottest part of the day for training.

Although Mrs. Morris is scared when Mike is playing and has been every since he started. She says she wants him to

try to play again. "It just took too much out of him when he thought his athletic career was over last year. Now, if he finds he cannot play because of the knee, he can say he did everything he could," she added.

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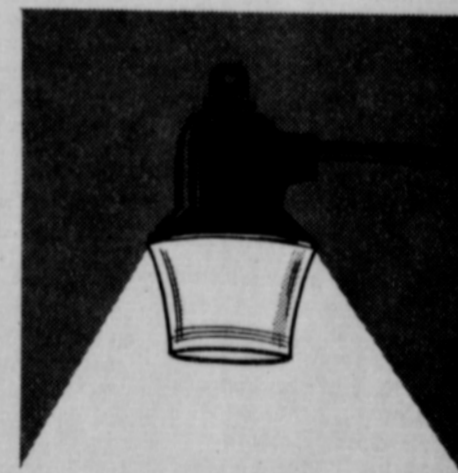
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# THE MORSE CODE

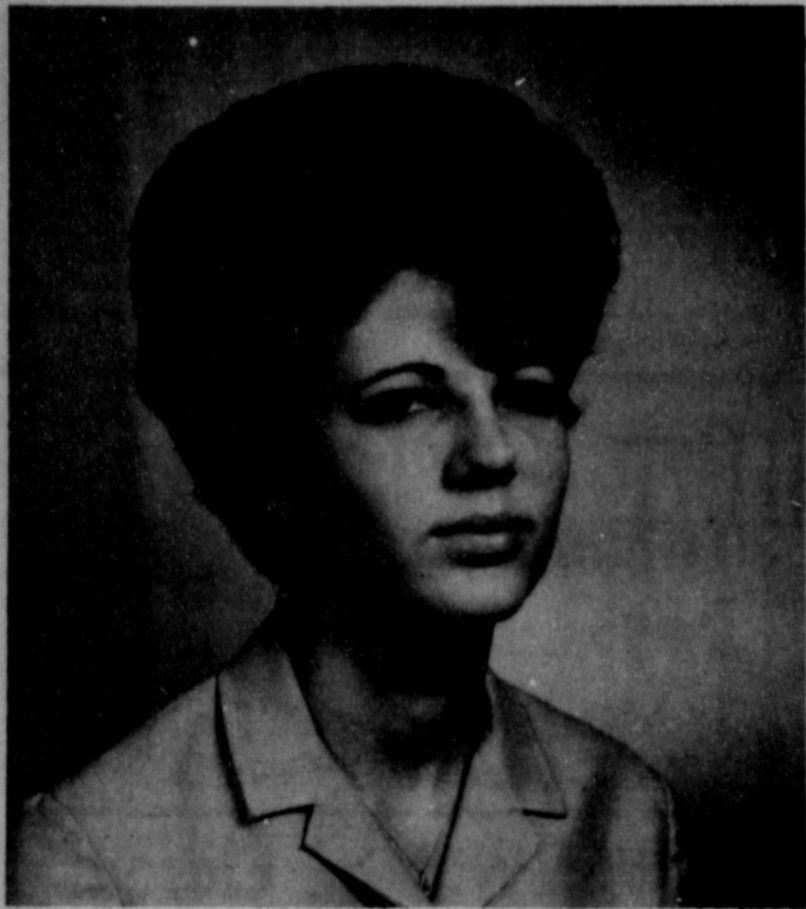

The pageant, with a changed repertoire every season, that evening portrayed the works of Pablo Picasso, Norman Rockwell, Edgar Degas, Francisco de Goya, Salvadore Dali, Michelangelo, Leonardo da Vinci and many other famous artists.

To close the program, The Lord's Prayer was sung as da Vinci's "The Last Supper" was unveiled. Sitting out under the stars and seeing such an unbelievable sight, it honestly felt like you were watching Christ and His Disciples. There were several moments of complete silence before the crowd of several thousand realized the Pageant of the Masters was over.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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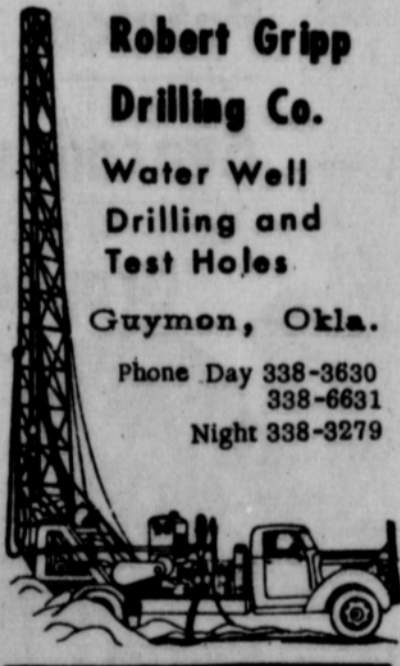

## Check Spring Planted Crop

With spring-planted crops reaching their peak development, now is an excellent time for farmers to spot-check plants for abnormalities, defects, discolorations or indications of stunted growth.

Spot-chicking is a great help in preparing next season's fertilization and planting program, says Dr. Charles D. Welch, Extension soil chemist, Texas A & M University.

Often a field has areas of both good and poor or stunted growth explains Welch. In this case, a composite soil sample should be taken from each area, labeled and sent to a soil testing laboratory.

Defects or abnormalities may be due to a lack of major food elements or perhaps trace elements may be the cause, the chemist points out.

Research has found that trace elements, although needed in small amounts, are essential for healthy plant growth. Welch says those most often deficient in Texas soils are boron, iron, and zinc.

Alkaline or high-limed soils tend to render some trace elements, especially zinc, unavailable to plants, says the chemist.

## F.B. President Urges Writing Congressmen

Texas Farm Bureau President C.H. DeVaney is urging Farm Bureau members to contact their congressmen in support of legislation to reverse or nullify the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision on apportionment of state legislatures.

The Court ruled June 15 that "As a basic Constitutional standard, the Equal Protection Clause requires that the seats in both houses of a bicameral state legislature must be apportioned on a population basis."

In a message to county Farm Bureau presidents and policy execution chairmen, DeVaney pointed out that the ruling is contrary to state and national Farm Bureau policies.

"It violates our state policy on reapportionment," DeVaney said. "It sets a precedent to authorize judicial action to apportion our county boards of supervisors, city councils, and all other elected officials of political sub-divisions. It will seriously reduce our rural representation."

The TFB leader said the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment was

tended to secure the equal status of all citizens with respect to access to the courts and equal protection under existing laws.

"The Supreme Court has clearly over-stepped its authority in handing down this ruling," DeVaney said.

He noted that some 75 bills have been introduced in the House and several in the Senate designed to reverse or nullify the decision. Major approaches outlined in these bills include a Constitutional amendment reserving to each state the exclusive power to

apportion membership of its legislature and a Constitutional amendment authorizing a state with a bicameral legislature to apportion the membership of one house on factors other than population. Another approach, he said, is a proposal to limit the jurisdiction of the federal courts as provided in Article III, Section 2 of the Constitution.

## Only Oil Exceeds Value of Agriculture

Value of Texas farm and ranch production is exceeded only one other raw material, oil. The state's total agricultural production exceeds the payroll for manufacturing, the total of construction awards, or the payroll for retail trades, says G. McHaney, Extension economist, Texas A & M University.

Farm and ranch production this year has a total value of about \$2.4 billion. However, explains McHaney, agriculture is much more to our total economy than just income from the sale of products. Of the \$4 billion received by farm-

ers and ranchers, \$1.8 billion is paid to suppliers for items used in the production of agricultural commodities. About 12 percent of all Texans are engaged in supplying these production items.

Business firms which assemble, process, distribute, transport, wholesale, and retail the products of Texas' farms and ranches employ about 20 percent of the labor force of the state and add about \$3.9 billion to the agribusiness economy. Their primary concern, says McHaney, is to get the agricultural products to the final consumer in the desired form and at the right time and

place.

The sale of agricultural products plus the cost of processing and distributing them annually add about \$6.3 billion to the state's economy, notes the economist. The economic destiny of most Texas counties hinges primarily on the agribusiness economy, he adds.

The future of the Texas agricultural industry will belong to those who work to keep their agricultural economy competitive with other areas of the nation and world, McHaney emphasizes. Agriculture, he adds, is no longer a way of life but rather a big competitive business.

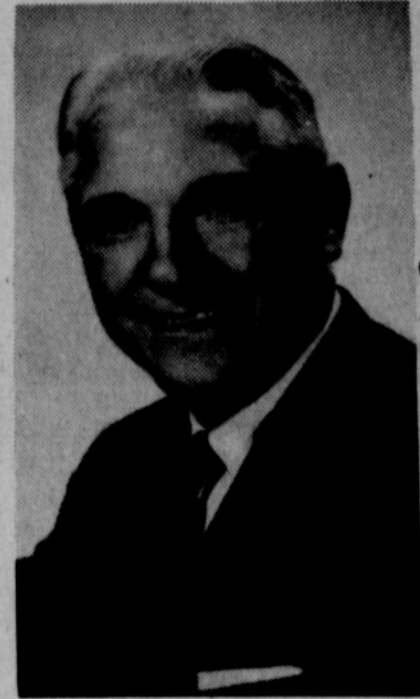

Spearman will gain the 13 students and have about 40 square miles added to the Spearman district.
