Absentee voting for the November 2 General Election will continue through October 29 at the office of the County and District Clerk in the Courthouse here.

Voters living in Hansford County must go to the Clerk's office to mark absentee ballots, but residents living temporarily outside the county and servicemen may ballot by mail. Letters requesting absentee ballots will be honored as soon as they are received. To vote by absentee, including college students away from Hansford County, one must write the Clerk's office, giving their permanent address here, plus the temporary address and enclosing a voter registration card. Those who have lost their voter registration card

1 t. cider vinegar 3 T. butter or oleo

Pick over popped corn, discarding all hard kernels. Combine sugar, syrup, water, salt and vinegar in saucepan. Cook slowly, stirring constantly to 260 degrees, or until a few drops form a hard ball in cold water. Remove from heat; add butter and vanilla, and stir only enough to mix. Slowly pour syrup over popped corn in a large bowl, stirring constantly to coat every kernel. Butter hands and shape lightly and quickly into balls-using as little pressure as possible. Cool. Wrap in waxed paper. Yield: 12 balls.

### POPCORN BALLS (Quick)

4 quarts popped corn

2 c. sugar 1 c. white Karo syrup 1 T. butter Pinch of salt

Heat sugar, syrup, butter, salt, and peanut butter until well melted and blended. Pour over popped corn in large pan. Mix well and shape into balls with greased hands. Yield: 18-20.

2-1/2 quarts popped corn 1 lb. light brown sugar 1/2 c. light corn syrup 1/2 c. water 1/2 c. butter or oleo (1 stick)

1 c. salted peanuts

Keep corn hot and crisp in 300 degree oven. In large saucepan combine sugar, syrup, water, butter and salt. Cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until syrup reaches hard crack stage. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla. In large buttered bowl or pan, mix nuts and popcorn. Pour syrup in a fine stream over mixture. Working quickly, mix well until kernels are completely covered and coated evenly.\(^1\) Spread out thin on buttered cookie sheets. Quickly separate into bite-sized clusters with 2 buttered forks. Cool. Yield: 3 quarts.

The homemakers were wel-omed by Mayor Pro Tem,




