

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



Lester D. Langley, a Distinguished Alumnus, now lives in Farmington GA and is professor of history at the University of Georgia. As a teacher and writer, he has devoted most of his time to Caribbean and Latin American history and American diplomatic history. But in recent years he has become a nationally recognized expert in US/Central America relationships.

The Alumni Association's other Distinguished Alumna, Mary Ellen Morgan Lazenby, was selected for her service as a school teacher and a leader in her church and community. Lazenby taught general science and home economics at the junior high and high

school levels in Shawnee, OK, and directed a work activity center for mentally retarded adults. Dr. E.R. Worthington, a resi-

dent of Canyon, was chosen for the University Excellence Award on the basis of his contributions to the university over the years. Worthington is an associate professor in management at WTSU's School of Business and also director of the Small Business Center, founder of the WTSU chapter of the Association of Collegiate Entrepreneurs, and founder and faculty sponsor of the WTSU Flying Club.

Sergio Velasquez, a junior from Dimmitt, won the Weldon Trice Scholarship. Saundra Meek Scholarships were awarded to Beth Brondyke, a sophomore from Canyon; Shane Smith, a junior from Friona; and Melody Cruse, a junior from Turkey.

Superintendents' survey details education reforms' financial impact

By KARI FLUEGEL Globe-News Staff Writer

No-pass, no-play and the Texas Examination of Current Administrators and Teachers are the most well known of the education reforms from House Bill 72, but funding the mandate hit the hardest.

Superintendents of Panhandle school districts Wednesday released the results of a survey of 30 school districts, 4A and below, detailing the financial impact of House Bill 72 and its many mandates on small rural school districts.

'It's been detrimental to all of us," said Jack Shanks, superintendent of the Sunray Independent School District.

The survey is an attempt to make the public aware of what the reforms have done to the district's bank accounts.

Some researchers say it will take \$2,100 per Average Daily Atten-

dance to fully fund House Bill 72, Shanks said. School districts now get \$1,300 per ADA, he said.

Money is definitely a problem. said Larry Butler, superintendent of the Spearman Independent School District.

According to the report, the 30 districts included will contribute an estimated \$8,969,258 for operating costs in 1988-89, a 119 percent in-crease from 1983-84. The state will pay to the 30 districts an estimated \$6,546,148 for operating costs, a 40 percent increase, in 1988-89.

The actual operating costs for the districts in 1988-89 is an estimated \$18,214,637, a 33 percent increase. At the same time taxable values are expected to decrease 23 percent to \$744,952,801

The report also estimated that the 1988-89 tax rate to cover the cost of the operating expenses increase in rise to an average of 94 cents per

\$100 evaluation, from 65 cents in 1983-84 **New Fitness**

\$157,689.

The report estimates that the ADA will drop from 16,299 in 1983-84 to \$15,955 in 1988-89, but as the number of students drops, the cost of educating them increases.

The actual cost per student in 1983-84 was \$3,418, but in 1988-89, the report estimates the cost to be \$4,633 per student.

The actual cost per student in 1983-84 was \$3,418, with \$985 provided by state funds and \$2,433 provided by local funds. The taxable value per student is \$200,067.

In 1988-89, it will take about \$4,633 to educated each student, with \$1,057 provided by the state and \$3,576 provided by local funds. Taxable value is estimated at

The figures do not include the cost of debt re-payment or new construction. .

State Sen Bill Sarpalius, D-Canyon; State Rep. Buck Buchanan, D-Dumas; and Dick Waterfield of Canadian. Buchanan's republican opponent in the November election. were at the meeting to respond to questions and comments from superintendents.

Sarpalius said that according to the latest figures from the Texas Education Agency, 48 of the 89 school districts in his legislative district received more money as a result of House Bill 72, while 41 received less money.

'Yes, we are getting a lot more money, but we're expending more

too," said one superintendent. About 26 of the 30 school districts expect to lower the amount paid to teachers above state minimum salary, and career ladder costs for 1988-89 alone will be \$533,822 more than state funds provide, according to the report.

One superintendent referred to the career ladder as a thorn in his side because local school districts cannot afford funding the program for all those eligible

"I've never seen morale so low," he said.

Education once was a cooperative effort, but now teacher is pitted against teacher in competition for the limited career ladder funds, he said.

'Please put no more regulations on us that you can't fund." said he said.

"We get so tired of being overregulated that we can't run school.

another said. Sarpalius said he feels the bill will undergo some changes in the next legislative session.

Buchanan encouraged the group to increase public awareness re-

garding the impact of the bill. Waterfield said the group should come up with some alternate plans to present to the legislature.

"Fitness Revolution" American Cancer Society

The American Cancer Society (ACS) has some words of warning for Texans looking forward to spending time outdoors during the long days of summer.

If you fry now, you may pay later, the Society cautions, because every exposure to the sun ages and damages skin. Skin cancer is the most serious form of 'payment'' for sun worshipers. More than 400,000 new cases of skin cancer will be diagnosed this year. While the vast majority are highly curable, the problem itself is largely preventable by exercising good sense and taking simple prrecautions.

"Young people, especially, are unaware of the cumulative amount of damage they are getting when they get too much sun,' said Linda N. White, R.N., Houston, Chairman of the ACS Texas Division skin cancer program development committee. "They think because nothing happens this year, or in five years, that everything's okay."

"Also, a lot of people are unaware of the damage done other than skin cancer...wrinkles, drying out, the aging process," White added.

"Geographically, skin cancer is more prevalent in the Sun Belt, and because we are in the Sun Belt, people are at higher risk," White said.

Stephanie Crossland has recently started a 45 minute noon Fitness Plus class at 12:05. This is ideal for working women who do not want to spend evenings away from their families. Wanda Archer presently teaches Fitness Plus classes on Monday. Wednesday. and Friday from 4:15 to 5:00 for women and Tuesday and Thurs. from 6:30 to 7:30 and Saturday morning from 9:30 to 10:30 (coed). In all these classes the heart rate is monitored carefully and very closely to make sure it is high enough for a good cardio-vascular workout but not dangerously high. Judy Davis, Christy Brock,



lightly-pigmented skin, people who work or spend a gread deal of recreational time outdoors and workers exposed to coal tar, pitch, creosote, arsenic conpounds or radium. As with many other cancers, risk increases with age.

Because skin cancer occurs more frequently than any other type of cancer, it is important to recognize its warning signals: a sore that does not heal; any unusual skin condition, especially a change in the size or color of a mole or other darkly pigmented growth or spot.

To reduce the risk of damage from too much sun, the Society advises Texans to:

*Cover up - wear hats and clothing: protective *use sunscreens - apply sunscreen at least an hour before going into the sun and again after swimming or perspiring heavily;

avoid the midday sun - between 10:00 am and 3:00 pm the sun's ultraviolet rays (the ones that do the damage) are strongest;

*don't use indoor sun lamps, tanning palors or tanning pills




