Gruver's New

Telephone Directories

The 1981-82 Gruver telephone directory, scheduled for mail beginning February 17, will feature cover artwork by well-known Western artist Charles Marion Russell.

The Russell watercolor, entitled "Come Out of There," is from the C.R. Smith Collection of Western American Art at the University of Texas and will appear on the covers of all the 1981-82 Southwestern Bell directories in Texas.

The painting depicts a cowboy attempting to pull a cow out of a ravine. The work is part of the permanent collection of the UT-Austin Art Museum and is on display at UT's Michener Gallery.

Russell's painting will be reproduced on the 186 Bell directories statewide, with total distribution of more than 12.4 million.

David Ortiz, Southwestern Bell manager, said one copy of the directory will be mailed to each residential phone customer. Additional copies may be obtained by telephoning the Southwestern Bell business office.

Ortiz said a total of 5,400 books are being printed. Of that number, 1,560 will be mailed to area residents.

"The extra directories are for new customers moving to the Gruver area throughout the year. Also, subscribers sometimes wear out their books and need replacements," Ortiz added.

Russell (1846-1926) was considered one of the greatest artists of the American West. Some of his works, along with those of other outstanding interpreters of the American West, are included in the Smith Collection. Dr. Eric McCready, director of University art collections, says the collection is an important one and the largest Western art collection in any American university museum.

J.A. Thomason Obituary

Lodi's Joseph Austin "Tommy" Thomason, a long-time California educator, died Sunday in a local hospital following a brief illness. He was 79.

Born and raised in Oklahoma Territory in Oklahoma, he received his Master's Degree from the University of Idaho in Moscow, Idaho.

He married Mary Diel in 1941 in Las Vegas, Nev. and taught school in Grants Pass, Ore., Prescott, Ariz., and North Fork, Cal.

He retired from public school teaching in 1962 and then moved to Lodi.

He was appointed Director of Placement of Educators at the University of the Pacific in Stockton, a position he held from 1962 to 1968, when he retired.

An active and dedicated member of the California and National Retired Teachers Associations, at the time of his death he held the office of national treasurer and was also a trustee of the National Retired Teachers Association.

Gruver Entries Place at El Paso

Trevor Williams, a Gruver grade school student and ardent 4-H'er, is considerably richer and somewhat famous-sharing a bit of both with brothers Ty and Tod.

At the prestigious Southwestern International Livestock Show and Rodeo Inc. recently conducted at El Paso, a cross-bred steer that was a project of Trevor Williams with a bit of an assist from his brothers, copped second place in the heavyweight crossbred steer competition; reserve champion of the cross-bred steer category and reserve grand champion of the entire steer show!

The prize animal brought \$5,100.

It was the fifty-second annual southwestern livestock show and the first time three places have gone to one city of any size.

EMS Director Paramedic

"Local boy makes good!" has always been a proud cry but when an "un-native" son dedicates his life to his adopted community, it is time for great pride, too.

Such a man is Ed Williamson. Ed came to Spearman from his native California via Guyton as his parents moved. Then, he settled in, joined the Spearman Volunteer Fire Department--which operated the ambulance service at that time--and then when emergency medical service became a separate entity of city government, Ed Williamson became its director.

This was not an executive position. It meant that, in an emergency, he had to "roll" whether anyone else did or not. All of his administrative energy was exerted in getting emergency medical training and certification for those who worked with EMS in the same spirit of dedication Ed displayed.

Emergency situations lost the aura of the frantic and became occasions of needed speed and skill--and a quiet confidence in Spearman's Emergency Medical Service settled over the community.

--But the state that had given the world Ed Williamson had also given the land the concept of the "paramedic" emergency medical attendant. This was

further re-enforced by the action in Viet Nam. Until that conflict, paramedic practice lay mostly in the realm of emergency cardiac care. With Viet Nam, it was discovered the men and women with this peculiar training and the deep-grained dedication that made them take it, were able to handle traumas (injuries), too.

In January, 1980--soon after EMS became a separate department in November, 1979--Ed Williamson enrolled in the long, arduous courses of paramedic training.

A year later, just days after completing the training, Ed was notified that he was a certified paramedic.

--And there are some High Plains folk out there saying, "...Well, what is it?"

Simply put, a paramedic is a highly trained person who is the eyes, ears and hands of your doctor in administering pre-hospital attention in moments of medical emergency.

Under doctors' orders, a paramedic can administer "IVs" and drugs and handle intubation and defibrillation among other advanced phases of emergency care until the patient can be brought to the hospital and direct contact with the physician.

There are periods, too, when paramedics--and emergency medical technicians--are per-

mitted play with their children, close moments with their wives (or husbands) and a warm meal uninterrupted by the clangor that says a neighbor or a visitor passing through has become a medical emergency.

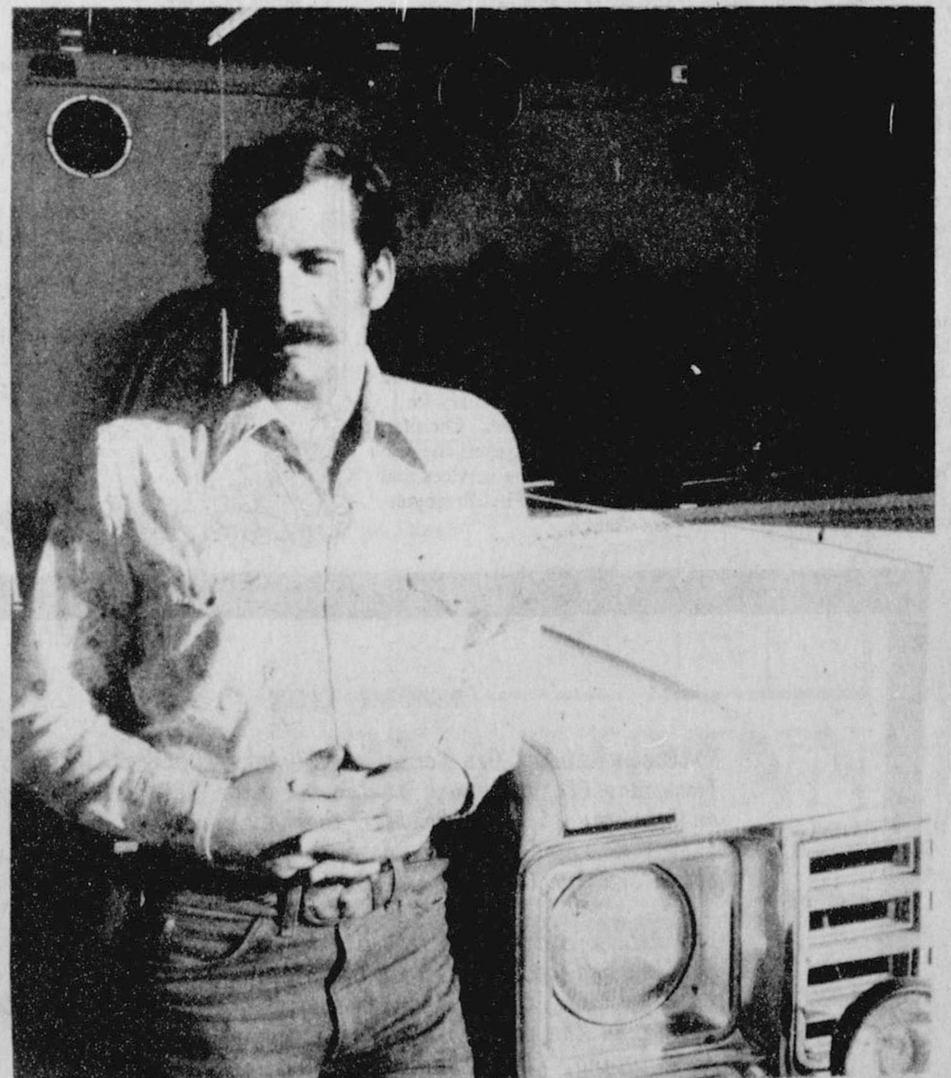
Nor is it just a matter of practice for Ed Williamson from now on out. The Texas Department of Health that directs the training, certification and practice of paramedics has a rule that they must be recertified every two years only after 80 hours of further training and study so that they can keep abreast new findings and new techniques.

--Nor is all this accrued to one man. Ed has already enriched the knowledge and the skills of the EMTs that work with him by sharing what he has learned. They cannot become paramedics that way. They will have to endure the year of round trips to Amarillo's Northwest Texas Medical Center, the hours in class and labs.

But Ed Williamson has one assurance for them:

"--It was worth it!" So, a glow of pride suffuses Spearman beginning with Ed's wife and two children the EMT's he works with, members of city and county government and just folks in general.

Y'see, we have a paramedic.

TIPS ON TRIPS

CANADA BY CAR

Canada is such a good neighbor—and an attractive one—that it's easy to forget that it has rules and regulations about how you may cross the border—and with what.

When you enter Canada, you'll need something more formal than a driving license. If you were born in the U.S., your birth or baptismal certificate will do. Otherwise, bring your naturalization certificate or alien registration card.

Youngsters under 18 not accompanied by an adult should take a letter from a parent or guardian giving them permission to travel in Canada.

If, like the majority of U.S. visitors, you arrive in Canada by car or camper, you'll find your current license valid in Canada. When you drive in Canada you must always carry the motor vehicle registration permit and proof of insurance. When you're in Canada, you should be the one to drive your car. If a Canadian resident is caught for a short while, but they must be taken with you hicle and is not accompanied by the U.S. owner, Camper trucks or trailers the Canadian can be in a lot more than nine feet wide of trouble.

Your own insurance company or automobile club may help you obtain auto insurance to cover you in Canada. Otherwise, contact American tourists.



Geared up for a drive in Canada? Don't forget your license, registration and international insurance.

If you're driving a rented vehicle, you'll need to carry a copy of the rental contract. If the car was rented outside of Canada, be sure that the contract specifies that the car may be driven in Canada.

If your vehicle is borrowed, carry a letter from the registered owner authorizing your use of the vehicle. Trailers are allowed into Canada tax- and duty-free for a short while, but they must be taken with you when your vacation is over. Camper trucks or trailers are not allowed duty-free entry into Canada for ordinary tourist purposes. By and large, Canada insurance to cover you in drives an easy bargain for Canada. Otherwise, contact American tourists.

Winning is nothing new to the Spearman Lynxettes in girls basketball.

The Spearman Lynxettes were in the play-offs every year from 1961 to 1973. They won three State Championships during that time.

The Lynxettes won their Fourth State Title in 1977.

Winning is a tradition for the Lynxettes.

"Communities thrive on that kind of thing (winning)," says Coach Ralph Newton, Head Coach of the Lynxettes for his eighth season.

"The administration of a school tries to see a program is carried forth that way. Spearman began it's long reign of championship clubs back in the late 1950's. Now it's just accepted they will be contenders."

The Lynxettes have just clinched their fifth CONSECUTIVE District 1-3A Title!! A first-time District Tournament stands between the Lynxettes and their 21st trip to the playoffs in the last 26 YEARS!

The tradition is continuing.

A tough Non-District schedule left the Lynxettes at 8-10 going into the District Season, but 7 victories in its last 8 games has boosted the Lady Lynx' season mark to 15-11 and 5-0 in District play. Tuesday's game between the Dalhart Wolverines was postponed for this Saturday, February 14, because of the bad blizzard. The game will be played at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday and will be the LAST District game before the District 1-3A Tournament which will be held in Spearman Lynx Varsity Gym.

"Every year we play a tough Non-District schedule," says Coach Newton. "It pays when we get to District. Nine of our losses came from Sanford-Fritch, Gruver, Miami and Follett, who are all good teams."

"It doesn't hurt our confidence to lose to those teams. It's well-known they're good."

The victory over Follett came in the Sanford-Fritch Tournament which was held in December 11-13 and is the only "mark" on the Pantherettes' Season Record. Sanford-Fritch was 24-1 going into Tuesday night's action; Gruver was 16-12; Miami was 22-4; and of course, Follett was 23-1 going

into Tuesday night's action.

Leading the way for the Lynxettes is 5-9 Senior **Kenda Burke**. An All-District performer from last year, Kenda leads the Lynxettes in scoring, averaging close to 21 points a game—since District Play began.

"She has kind of geared up for the District Season," says Coach Newton. "One thing Seniors have learned to do is to pace themselves."

Coach Newton says Kenda's first-half performance against the Dalhart Wolverines, January 23, was the most OUTSTANDING he has seen in his 16 years as Head Coach.

"She scored the first 13 points in the game," remembers Coach Newton.

"She finished with 27 points in the first half! Kenda made 14 of 23 from the field, most of those from outside. Kenda had 8 Rebounds, 6 Steals and 9 Assists—all in the first half!"

"I've coached some awful good players, but Kenda is on of the best."

Coach Newton has had nine All-Staters play for him dating back to the 1960's when he coached two teams in the State Title at Trent.

Nancy Wilson, the team's leading Rebounder, **Mary Ann Martin**, who is averaging 9 points and 6 Rebounds a game, **Bonnie McCloy**, **Tammi Maize**, **Susan Davis** and **Lea Ann Gibner**, all split time at the guard position all help Kenda out.

Nancy was All-District last year, leading the team in Rebounds and helping the squad to a 20-10 record. **Mary Ann** started part-time last year for the Lynxettes.

Susan and **Lea Ann** are just Sophomores, but see 15-20 minutes of action every game each.

Tammi and **Bonnie** get in and also work hard to keep the Lynxettes winning. Others that help out are **Margaret Reed**, a Senior, takes Nancy's place and does a real good job. **Kamala Ford**, **Mary McIntyre**, and **Johnnie Eaton** are all Juniors and when Coach Newton puts them in, they don't disappoint the Lynxette they replaced or Coach Newton. And another Sophomore, **Cindy Young**, does an excellent job when she is on the court for Coach Newton's team.

The District 1-AAA Tournament will be played at Lynx Varsity Gym here in Spearman. This Tournament will be February 19-21, which is, of course, after the regular season is over.

If the Lynxettes win, they will meet the winner of District 2-3A in Bi-District. But if another team wins the tournament, that team must play the Lynxettes in Lynx Varsity Gym in a 1 game palyoff, and this will determine which team will represent District 1-3A!

"We should have the advantage, if the HOME COURT means anything," says Coach Newton.

The Lynxettes had the advantage anyway, right from the start of the Basketball season!!

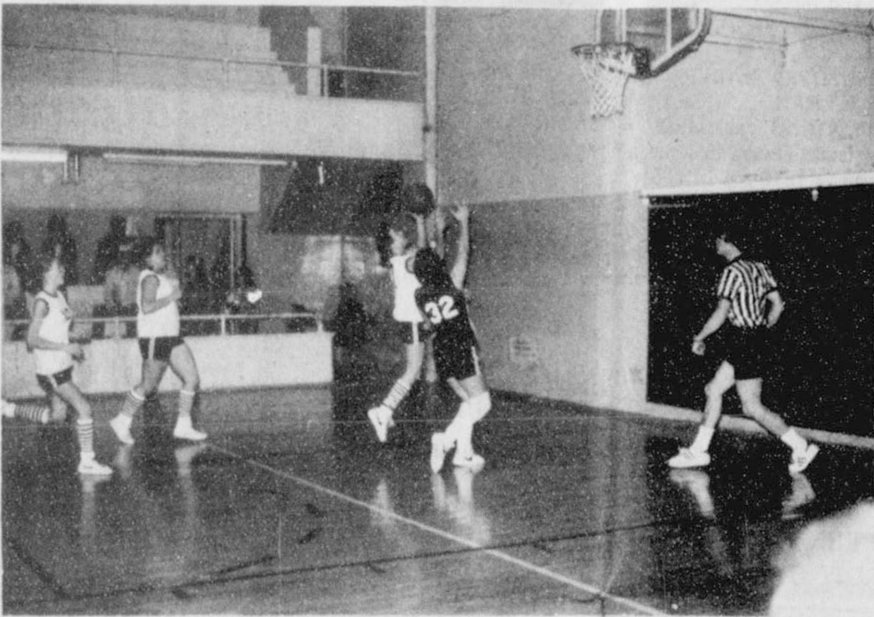
Engagement Announced
