Guymon jumped into an early lead on a field goal, which was set up by a fumble The Tigers came back in the second qtr. to run 96 yards for a Touchdown, and make it look like a "run away" for the fine Okla.

However, down 10-0, the Lynx took to the air, and won the game. Their first touchdown came on a 68 yard effort with 6:08 left in the first half. 55 of these yards came on a pass from Edwards to Newton. Edwards then hit Whitaker from the 10 for the TD. Edwards completed 4 of 9 passes for 90 yards the first half. Oklahoma rules on interference were so different from Texas rules we aren't sure really how many passes were completed.

In the second half Spearman took control of the game notching 8 first downs to only 3 for Guymon. And, all 3 of Guymons were set up on penalties.

Trailing 10 - 6, Zane Newton fired a 39 yard option pass to Scott Martin to win the ball game 12-10. The Lynx scored another TD that was called back, and Martinez and Newton misses two trys for extra points, and one field goal. In the last minute of play, the Lynx had pushed the Tigers back to the 7 yard line, and had recovered the ball on a fumble, giving them another scoring opportunity. All in all it was the best team performance for the Lynx in years. The entire team was "different" from any game they have played this year. Coach Smith and his Lynx have "jelled" just in time for the district action. The Lynx will host River Road this Friday at Spearman!



NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING CONCERNING THE ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE CITY OF SPEARMAN, TEXAS

An ordinance establishing zoning regulations an creating zoning or use districts in accordance with a comprehensive plan; and regulating the height of buildings, size of yards and density of population; adopting a zoning map showing the location and boundaries of the various districts and use areas; setting forth regulations governing buildings and uses within such areas, defining terms; providing for enforcement and penalties for violations, for appeals and exceptions for future changes and amendments; requiring building permits and certificates of occupancy; authorizing revocation of building permits; defining and authorizing non-conforming uses; creating a board of adjustment and providing for its powers, procedure, etc; providing a savings clause and repealing conflicting ordinances; providing minimum housing requirements; defining architectural control, nuisances and temporary structures.

SECTION 803.1 VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES, FINES

A violation of this Ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by fine. Any person, firm or corporation who violates or refuses to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than Twentyfive Dollars (\$25.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each offense. 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
