

After several months of intensive study by the Medical Staff and the Hansford Hospital District Trustees, a decision was reached Thursday night on what is believed to be one of the largest single purchases made by the current Board.

The Trustees voted unanimously to spend just over \$29,000.00 for the purchase of new Medical monitoring equipment to replace outmoded equipment currently in use.



Hospital income rose to just over \$71,000.00 for January. With Expenses running around \$59,000.00 and with a growing patient load at the Hansford Clinic, the Hospital District had one of it's better months in a long period of time, in January. Net income was pegged at just under \$15,000.00.

The patient load at the Hospital has increased somewhat dramatically as a result of several factors, one of which has been the minor flue epidemic that occurred this past month.

At any rate, a simple effort like making a cake is getting to be quite a chore for me. The cake did turn out pretty good. Maybe I need to make a cake more often so I won't be so out of practice.

The weather forecast is for 70 degrees tomorrow, I'll believe it when I see it. It would certainly be nice to have a nice weekend for a change, weather wise.

Speaking of cooking, here is a recipe you might like to make on these cold days. The recipe came from my daughter-in-law and she calls it "Stuff."

1 lb. hamburger, 1 can Ranch Style Beans, 1 can Rotel Tomatoes, Spanish rice (Rice A Roni or Uncle Ben's), velveeta cheese and fritos.

Brown hamburger in one pan and prepare rice in another (read directions for rice - Rice-A-Roni mix requires 1 can of tomatoes). Drain grease from hamburger and mix in Rotel tomatoes and beans. When rice is done, blend hamburger mixture and rice in casserole dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 min. Blend in chunks of velveeta cheese and put fritos on top. Bake 10 more minutes.
