A watch one of the girls was wearing was stopped at 12:30 and the smashed car was not found until 7:30 Wednesday

morning by a passer-by.

The girls were brought to Spearman, then Miss Willoughby whose condition was said to be critical, was transferred to an Amarillo hospital, Miss Reeves is in Hansford Hospital. Her condition is reported to be

Police said the girls were going south on state highway 136 from Gruver. The accident happened six miles south of Gruver where the highway crosses Palo Duro Creek.

Judge Boyer Denies New Trial Motion

After a day and a half of Refer a day and a hair of testimony and arguments in 84th District Court, Judge Max Boyer Wednesday denied a motion for a new trial for John Lincoln Grissiam.

Grissiam was convicted last

fall of the murder of Mickey Westerfield, Gruver business

man, and sentenced to die in the electric chair.

His court-appointed attorneys, Dick Reavis of Perryton and Charles Ballman of Borger, immediately filed notice with immediately filed notice with the court that they will appeal the decision.

In the day and one-half ses-sion several of the jurors were questioned by defense lawyers about the jury considering evi-dence not introduced in court

dence not introduced in court in reaching its verdict.

The defense also brought up that Mrs. J.B. Cooke, who was not an appointed bailiff, talked with members of the jury and was in the women juror's dormitory.

It was also pointed out that in prior cases where jury bailiffs were police officers who testified in the case, it was grounds for a new trial. Also, the defense pointed out that it had asked that the court ap-

point bailiffs who would not be testifying, but the motion was turned down.

Other points brought out by the defense was that Grissiam did not have legal counsel un-til after he was indicted, then after he was indicted he was not entitled to an examining

District Attorney Bob Galloway in his arguments pointed out that no evidence was presented that the jury considered any evidence not presented

Galloway said that under the Texas Criminal law of last year that the court could not appoint legal council for a person until after he was indicted.

dicted.

He also pointed out that in many cases the courts found no grounds for a new trial just because an unauthorized person had talked to the jurors about things other than the case in question, It was a reversible error when harm could be proved and no harm had been proved in this case.

Galloway also pointed out that the defense had been told in open court during the trial that Mrs. Cooke had been used at times as a bailiff and the defense did not object.

After the court instructed that

After the court instructed that only officers be used, she did not return to the jury dorm.

Galloway also pointed out that under the new criminal code a bailiff does not have to be an officer. be an officer.

The District Attorney also pointed out that the two officers who were bailiffs most of the time, Deputy Leland Wood and Miss Judith Creacy, did not testify in the case.

Hearing Set On Herbicides





The smallest team in the three-day tournament in Aus-

tin, the Lynxettes overcame a big height advantage held by the two opponents, with precision play and hustle.

While most teams in the tournament ran a fast, high scoring offense, the Lynxettes defense stifled the opponents, took the ball away from the offense numerous times and set offense numerous times and set the stage for the precision of-fense of the forwards.

With little experience on the bench, the Lynxettes had to play with a minimum of fouls and mistakes. The start-ing six of forwards Karen Gibson, Barbara Wilde and Marcia Shieldknight and guards of Su-san Hutchison, Robbie Ownbey and Nancy McCullough went all the way, except for the closing minute of the first game.

Linn Robinson went in as a forward and Catherine Lyon and Judy Jones got in as guards. Ownbey fouled out in the last seconds.

After the tournament Coach Dean Weese said he had never seen a team make as few mistakes as the six did on their

way to the championship.

The rare mistakes did not disturb them. Many times the Lynxettes corrected the rare mistake by forcing the opposition to give up the ball before scoring or getting a shot.

The defense from one end of the court to the other was so strong that Rivercrest got only 26 shots. They turned the ball over to the Spearman forwards or guards the rest of the time. Both Rivercrest and Little

Cypress had one or two girls on each end of the court that were close to six feet tall, but the Lynxettes out-rebounded both

Against Rivercrest the Lynxettes got 22 to the oppositions 20 and in the final game the Lynxettes got 20 to Little Cy-

Spearman took the opening ame from Rivercrest of Talco 56-44. The Lynxettes jumped off to a big 12-3 lead as Gibson, Wilde and Shieldknight trapped and intercepted the ball from Rivercrest guards for

some quick points.
Rivercrest cut the lead to 20-18 in the second quarter, but Spearman moved out to a 30-23 halftime lead.

Katy Fry, Rivercrest's high scoring forward got the Mc-Cullough and Hutchison treatin the second half and was held to nine points. Own-bey was given the job of cov-ering the outside and at times

Gibson was redhot for the Lynxettes. She bombed the basket for eight of 11 field goals and eight of nine free throws for a 73 per cent average from the field and 89 percent from the free throw line for 24 points. for 24 points.

Shieldknight hit six of 12 field goal attempts and three of four free throws for 15 points. The freshman played like a veteran under the state tournament pressure and was a leader in rebounding on the forward end of the court.

points.



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
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
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Homemaking Notes

by Linda Webb Home Demonstration Agent

forerunner of today's popular convenience baking mixes is a product that has been on the market for over a century. It is self rising flour.

Developed in the early 19th century, self-rising flour is plain flour to which leavening and salt have been added. This formed a basic "convenience mix" to simplify the preparation of many baked foods.

More recently a companion product containing the same leavening and salt ingredients, self-rising commeal, was developed to simplify corn bread and corn muffin baking.

The three ingredients in these two products-flour or commeal leavening and salt-

cornmeal, leavening and salt-are blended by the miller in exacting proportions, deter-mined by weight. These proportions are standard, the same used in home recipes: 1 1/2 teaspoons leavening and 1/2 teaspoon salt per cup of flour or commeal.

Often homemakers don't use these products today because they don't understnad exactly what the term "self-rising" means. Those who use the self-rising product once, use them from then on They truly are timesavers, which can be used in any recipe calling for leavening and salt. All you need to do, as a user of self-rising flour, is omit the salt rising flour, is omit the said and baking powder called for

in the recipe.

Self-rising flour is not recommended for angel food
cakes, popovers, and bakedin-the-crust custard pies, for excess leavening here

Pastry, ordinarily unleavened, will be mite tender and puffy rath an flaky and crisp. Ye. cads prepared with self-rising will be very light and soft rather than firm and compact-but still quite a desirable product.

Both self-rising flour and self-rising commeal need to be stored in tightly covered containers in a cool dry place. Properly stored, self-rising flour may be kept about six months, self-rising commeal about three months after pur-

spoon self-rising flour from the container into the sifter; sift, spoon lightly into a measuring cup, and level it off evenly. Self-rising commeal should not be sifted.

While I'm on the subject of baking, you may be interested in information on a new "Coolrise Method!" of making yeast bread. It cuts in half the rising time needed for regular bread making.
COOLRISE WHITE BREAD

5 1/2 to 6 1/2 cups flour,

regular or instantized 2 pkgs. or cakes yeast 1/2 cup warm water 105-115

degrees F.

1 3/4 cup warm milk(105-115)
degrees F.

2 Tablespoons sugar

Tablespoon salt

Tablespoons margarine or shortening Cooking Oil

1. Sift and measure flour 2. Dissolve yeast. Sprinkle or crumble into water in large warm bowl. Stir until dis-solved. Add milk, sugar, salt and margarine.
3. Add flour. First add 2 cups

and beat with rotary beater.
Then add 1 cup and beat vigorously for 150 strokes.

4. Add remaining flour. Add-gradually-enough to make soft dough which leaves sides of which leaves sides of Turn out onto floured board.

5. Knead. Shape dough into ball. Fold toward you with a rolling motion. Push dough 5. Knead. rolling motion. Push dough away with heels of hands. Turn one-quarter way around. Re-peat until smooth and springy

Medicare Applications Available at Post Office

Acting Postmaster Elmon "Jake" Jacobs announced to-day application blanks for sup-plemental Medicare benefits

the Spearman Post Office.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the

Medicare law.
President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National
Medicare Month." He urged
all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in en-rolling senior citizens in the

rolling sentor citizens in the program.
Initially, some two and one-half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 main post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

as needed.

Through direct mailings and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the

supplemental program.

The supplemental program costs \$3 a month and provides doctor bill and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application

blank is displayed on the lobby bulletin board of the local Post

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are preaddressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland.
