





Does the validation sticker expire in October, 1978? If so, you have until October 31 to get a new validation sticker for your vehicle.

R.W. Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, reminded motorists today that they should have received October renewal registration applications by mail.

If you do not have the new three-part registration renewal card, you must take your most recent registration receipt, car title and the registration fee to your county tax assessor-collector to obtain a new validation sticker. Many county assessorscollectors will not accept checks and require cash or money


M-44 coyote control device. The license became a requirement with passage of the 1975 Texas Pesticide Control Act.
