A Terrific Hail.

One of the most terrific hail storms ever known in the history of the Plains fell in the west part of this county Tuesday afternoon. The path of the storm was several miles long extending West and South of town.

In trying to save his head and face from the force of the down-pour, the skin was nearly all bruised and torn from his hands. Stock were considerably battered and several places we have heard of horses going through the wire and getting cut up. Let us hope our fair county will not be visited again by such a storm.
