How can we expect to promote world peace and brotherhood if we many elect to ignore their responsibilities at home?

What is the answer to all this? With a firm hand, we need to reach upon the self and gently dust off the cover of the Good Book, reviewing the life pattern set forth for mankind. Faith in

## City Elections Held At Tahoka, Wilson, New Home

City voters went to the polls Saturday to elect three candidates from those seeking terms on the Tahoka Council. 322 total votes were cast with incumbent Alton Cain retaining his position with 239 votes. Others winning council seats were Austin E. (Bob) Haney, Jr., tallying 235 votes and Edward T. Cloe, receiving 170.

Candidates failing in their election bids were D. M. Lockaby and Tommy Chandler. Lockaby received 153 votes and Chandler tallied 125.

Swearing in ceremonies for new councilmen were held Monday evening at the city hall, with Mayor Meldon Leslie presiding. Certificates of election were presented to new members and outgoing councilmen, W. T. Kidwell and Wayne Waters.

**Three at New Home**  
Three new councilmen were awarded seats on the New Home council in voting there Saturday. Total votes cast was 24, with Stanley Elliott receiving 23, W. C. Ewing tallied 22 and J. W. Edwards received 19.

Three incumbent councilmen did not seek re-election and incumbent Mayor O. R. Phifer was unopposed.

**Wilson Elects Two**  
A two vote margin separated the three top candidates for the two council positions at Wilson. J. W. Morton and Carl Gryder were elected, each tallying 41 votes. Jerry D. Ross was in the running, grabbing off 39 votes. Jackie Bishop, fourth place candidate was close in the running, trailing Ross by six votes. His total was 33.

## County Red Cross Chapter Closes Out Fifty Years

"Fifty Years of Humanitarian Service" by the Lynn County Chapter of the American Red Cross were cited today by Ken Intfeld when he presented a certificate marking the golden anniversary of the chapter to W. B. Griffin and Judge V. F. Jones.

Lynn County News office, was signed by E. Roland Harriman, Chairman of the American National Red Cross since 1950, and Gen. James E. Collins (Ret.), the organization's President.

The Lynn County Chapter was chartered on November 28, 1917 and received its baptism of fire during World War I. Intfeld said World War II saw rapid expansion of career staff and volunteers, and during the peak war years 10 Red Cross volunteers were giving service to the armed forces and their families in Tahoka.

Fifty years after its founding, the Lynn County Chapter is again reaching out to families of military personnel stationed in Vietnam and around the world, Intfeld stated.

In addition, the Lynn County Chapter contributes directly to the community in a variety of ways, Intfeld said.

## Hospital Vote Held Saturday

Incumbent directors of the Lynn County Hospital District were returned to office in the county-wide election held Saturday. These men were originally court appointed until the official election date.

Directors given the nod were Borden Davis of Tahoka, Johnnie Ellis of O'Donnell, and E. L. Blankenship of Wilson. Total votes cast for Davis were 743 with Ellis receiving 735. Blankenship tallied 726.

Voting in Tahoka gave Davis 316, Ellis 298, and Blankenship 297. Several candidates received write-in votes with none tallying more than seven.

## Weather Stays On Mild Note

Tahoka has experienced normal weather conditions the past week with very gusty winds and dust. Usually this type of weather is current for March, but was not so for 1968.

Nights have been cool staying in the 40's, with temperatures rising during the day into the lower 60's and upper 70's.

Light to moderate rain began falling Tuesday morning lasting into the mid-afternoon. Skies began clearing, remaining partly cloudy during the rest of the day. Total rainfall from 7:30 Tuesday morning was .50.

## City And Area School Patrons Hold Elections

Tahoka school patrons marked ballots Saturday to elect board members from a field of five. 355 total votes were cast in the election at the Tahoka City Hall.

Edward Bartley, vice-president received top votes, tallying 284. President J. T. Miller received 255 with secretary Elmer Owens not far behind with 253. Others seeking board positions were Robert Warren and Joe Harvick. Warren received 132 votes and Harvick tallied 85.

**Three at Wilson**  
Wilson school patrons gave incumbent Reuben Sander and James Savell 115 votes each. Curtis Wilke was next in line with 95.

Incumbent Roy L. Kahlich ran fourth with 91 votes, while Alfred Clary receiving 45 and Loyd Anders 42.

**New Home Elects Three**  
Votes were spread among six school board candidates at the New Home election Saturday. Three positions were filled.

B. L. Ernst received 68 votes with Bill R. Smith, incumbent not far behind with 60. George Sealy, incumbent, tallied 58 votes. Next in the running was Leonard Nettles with 48; Luke Halford, 45 and Willie Nieman, 39.

The convention was educational as well as entertaining and the delegates agree that the Hemisfair is a must for everyone.

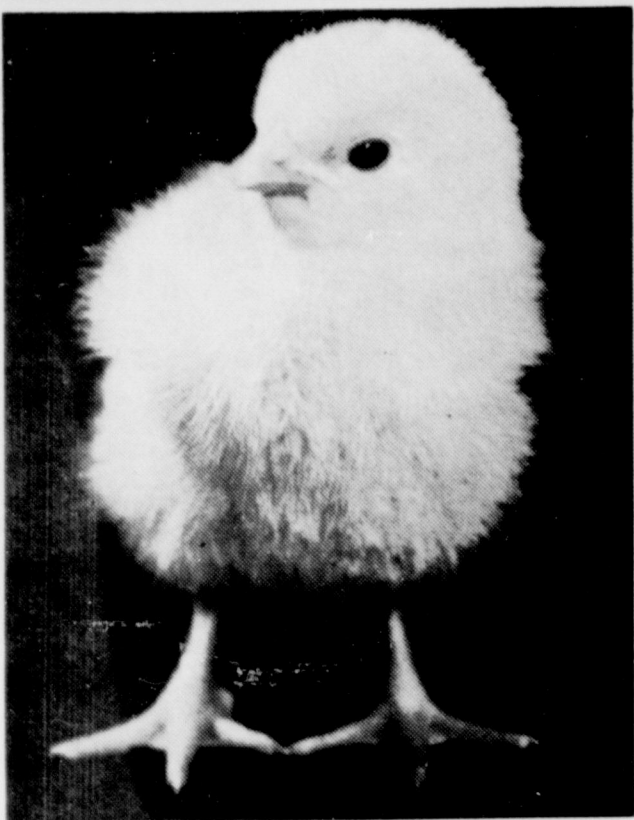
## Heart Fund Drive
