URING my life I have spent considerable time in the effort to reform evil conditions, but if I were to live it over I would not give so much time to reform as to the redemption of men. IF YOU CHANGE THE SKIN OF A RATTLESNAKE YOU DO NOT CHANGE HIS NATURE, BUT ONLY MAKE HIM THE MORE DANGER-OUS. MANY CHANGES HAVE BEEN EFFECTED IN THE ADMIN-ISTRATIONS OF AMERICAN CIT-IES, BUT AFTER THE BATTLES AT THE ELECTIONS HAVE BEEN ENDED WE ARE CONFRONTED AGAIN WITH THE SAME EVILS AS BEFORE. EVENTUALLY WE SHALL FIND THAT ANY GOVERN-MENT IS A GOOD GOVERNMENT TO LIVE UNDER IF IT BE COM POSED OF GOOD MEN.

The making of character is a serious matter. It means bitterness and struggle. A man is NOT MADE AT TWENTY. More men FAIL IN THEIR FORTIES. There are more wrecks made during the middle years than at any other period. There is no quick growth in the making of a man. There is encouragement, too, for the man caught in the NET OF HEREDITY AND ENVIRON-MENT. Religion is stronger than either, and in religion he will find his salvation.

No man need be discouraged. In the making of a man there need be no special emphasis placed on thought of theological adjustment to life. I have found MORE ORTHODOXY IN THE PENI-TENTIARY THAN IN THE CHURCHES. It is quite possible for a man to be sound in his doctrines and all wrong in his life.

National Responsibility loss. In Forestry Perfectly Clear Cut

THE nation has an important stake in forestry. Some persons would leave the forests entirely to private owners. Others insist that the public phases of forestry are altogether a state function and that federal activities in this field are uncalled for. BUT NATIONAL RESPONSIBILITY IN FORESTRY IS PERFECTLY CLEAR CUT. There need be no confusion with an equally clear cut responsibility of the states. As to private forestry, little of value has so far been done that has not been an outcome of public action through state or federal agencies, or both.

By DEAN C. WORCESTER, Former Secretary of Interior In Philippines

THERE IS ONLY ONE WAY IN WHICH SLAVERY CAN BE PREVENTED IN THE PHILIP. PINES AND THAT IS BY PASSING A LAW MAKING IT A CRIME TO BUY AND SELL HUMAN FLESH.

The attempt to deny that slavery exists in the Philippines is absolutely absurd, and yet that attempt has been made repeatedly. Ameribeen imposed upon. Until recently there has been little or NO IN CLINATION TO CONCEAL THE FACT OF SLAVERY. Every one in the islands knows about it. I found the children in school writing compositions about it. The preceptress of a girls' school told me that her young ladies often discussed the prices they had paid for their maids.

The slaves are not put up on a block and sold to the highest bidder as they were in the south. If you wish TO PURCHASE A SLAVE IN A FILIPINO TOWN YOU GO TO THE MARKET PLACE AND LET YOUR ER-RAND BE KNOWN. The dealers, who always are loafing around, are immediately pointed out to you. You accost one of them, tell him what you require, and if he has not the sort of a slave you wish in stock he will assure you that the supply in the mountains is inexhaustible and that he will soon capture just what you are looking for.

IF HE HAPPEN TO HAVE WHAT YOU, WANT HE WILL LEAD YOU TO HIS HOUSE AND THERE EX-HIBIT THE SLAVES HE HAS ON HAND. YOU SELECT THE BOY OR GIRL, MAN OR WOMAN, YOU FANCY, PAY THE PRICE AND FOR-EVERMORE THAT SLAVE IS YOUR ABSOLUTE PROPERTY SO LONG AS YOU CAN KEEP HIM FROM RUNNING AWAY.

Contributory Plan Best to Pension Government Employees

By LINDLEY M. GARRISON, Secretary of War

FEEL quite sure that it is practicable to save the government money and to benefit the government service by establishing a retirement system. I do not believe, however, that there is any possibility of such a system being provided for in the near future by any measure that will CALL FOR LARGER APPROPRIATIONS can ignorance of conditions has from the federal treasury than would be required to pay the annuities for those now in the service -that is, the entire annuity of all those who are now seventy years of age or over and part of the annuity of all others now in the service who shall remain therein until THEY REACH SEVENTY YEARS OF AGE, and I think it wise that the maximum annuity of which the government pays any part should be fixed at ONE-HALF THE AN-NUAL SALARY for employees with average salary of twelve hundred dollars or less and at six hundred dollars for those whose annual salary exceeds twelve hundred dol-

> ALL PERSONS WHO ACCEPT EM-PLOYMENT UNDER THE FED. ERAL CIVIL SERVICE AFTER THE PASSAGE OF A RETIREMENT ACT SHOULD DO SO UNDER PROVI-SIONS OF LAW WHICH WOULD COMPEL THE ACCUMULATION OF A FUND DERIVED FROM MONTH-LY DEDUCTIONS FROM THEIR SALARIES THAT WOULD MAKE IT HUMANELY POSSIBLE FOR THE GOVERNMENT TO RETIRE THEM AT SEVENTY YEARS OF AGE OR BEFORE THAT AGE SHOULD SUPERANNUATION OR OTHER DISABILITY REQUIRE IT.

Under the contributory plan an employee after a considerable length of service would receive periodically from the fund accoumulated by his contributions a sum sufficient to KEEP HIM FROM ACTUAL WANT, whereas under the straight pension plan he cannot derive any benefit from the pension until he reaches the prescribed age. In other words, under the straight pension plan there would be almost the same situation that confronts us now-namely, the retention in the service, through considerations of humanity, of persons who have become incapacitated for efficient service.





Relics of Irish Parliaments. In the National Museum at Dublin are the robes worn by the Right Honcrable John Foster (Baron Oriel), the last speaker of the Irish House of Commons, the spe ker's chair and the mace, the symbol of legislative authority. These will be used by the speaker of the new House of Commons. After the British Parliament had abolished the Irish Parliament the Irish speaker was asked to hand over the mace to the authorities in Dublin Castle. He declined, saying that he would never surrender the mace to any one but the body from whom he had received it. Entrusted to the Dublin Museum for safe-keeping, it is today the property of the speaker's

descendants. John Redmond Probable Premier. Armed with the symbol of authority the new national assembly will take up the work of legislating for its own people. John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, will doubtless form the first Irish ministry. He belongs by birth and training to the landed class and all his instincts are towards modera-

IUDGES of the United States courts at the age of seventy, after having served ten years, may retire upon full pay. In the past many judges have availed themselves of this privilege. Some, however, have REMAINED UPON

Most ghosts probably do leak out. of bad flues and pipes. This contribution to demonology will commend Schneider to plumbers and owners of haunted real estate, but will never earn him membership in the Society for Psychical Research.
