LETTER FROM McCAULEY.

July 8th.

Lynn County News,

Mrs. Ed., we have just had a good time at McCauley, the occasion being a two days barbecue on the 4 and 5. We entertained 7500 people, used nine beeves the 4th, and six on the 5th. McCauley is situated on the Kansas City & Orient R. R. It will be one of the largest railroads in Texas when it is finished. The bridge across the south Canadian river cost \$800,000 They are at work on the road south of Sweetwater now. There are just two gaps to finish, one from Knox City to I. T., one from Sweetwater to the line of Mexico, it will be 1600 miles long. McCauley is a good town with a country to back it. We have a Baptist church finished and the Methodists are building, so you see we are well fixed. Land is worth from \$7.50 to \$25 per acre in Fisher county. We have come here from Lynn county to make our home. We will come back in November to be at court, and to get some cats to catch the mice, for if I don't I will not have any toe nails, the mice will eat them off. When I get the cats it will be war on the rats in this part of town. Come down and we will go fishing in clear fork and have a good time generally.

Thirty Six Hour Bill.

On Friday of last week President Roosevelt signed the bill known as the thirty-six hour bill. This measure is of especial interesting to the cattlemen of Texas, since, under its provisions, cattle destined for the market will be allowed to remain in transit thirty-six hours without unloading to feed, instead of twenty-eight hours under the old law governing the shipment of live stock.

The new regulation will be a great saving to the cattlemen of the southern part of the state as they will not be required to unload more than one time to the Kansas City market.—The Coming West.

Let's All Go To New Mexico?

What is the use of stopping on the Plains of Texas, paying from \$4 to \$10 per acre for land that raised 3000 bushels of Indian corn on 100 acres last year and will raise over 4000 bushels on the same land this year; land where an entire patch of watermelons averaged over 50 pounds; land that produced sweetpotatoes that weigh nine and ten pounds each and so plentyful last year that they could be bought for 50 cents per bushel for four months after harvest; land that produces good crops without irrigation; land that you have to pay \$1.18 taxes on the \$100 valuation.

Yes, Why! When we can go on into New Mexico and get 160 acres given to us if we can only manage to exist until we prove up on it 160 acres of nice dry sand hills and after we have spent one to two thousand dollars and have a nice flowing well, we will be ready to dig the ditches, put in our farm and if we apply the water right we will raise as good crops as they do on the Texas Plains with half the labor. How about the taxes you say. Well, in order that you may compare the difference between New Mexico and Lynn county we quote from the Carlsbad Argus of July 6th. Subscription \$2 a year.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Levy of a Tax to Pay Jurors.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation to pay jurors.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas, That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

SECTION 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridges; and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1885, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year; and except as in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

SEC. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1906, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "For the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors." The voters opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors."

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing Salaries and Per Diem of Legislators.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amendment of Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others, by members of the Legislature of free passes, franks, rebates, privileges or advantages from certain persons and corporations.

SECTION 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas, That at the next general election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had or ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their approval or disapproval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

SEC. 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive, from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law not exceeding one thousand dollars for the year succeeding their election; payable in equal installments, on the first days of January, February, March and April of the year succeeding their election; and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed three cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session. It shall be unlawful for any member of the Legislature during his term of office to accept any free transportation over any railway line or lines in this State, and any member of the Legislature violating the provisions of this Act prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded the general public from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons firm or corporation acting as a common carrier in this State. Any member of the Legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of this Article.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Certain Exemptions from Taxation.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 24, Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to certain exemptions from taxation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 24 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same shall read as follows, to wit:

"All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax, but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial; not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages; that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer; and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

SECTION 2. The Governor of the State shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and County officers.

SECTION 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas shall vote upon this amendment on the day of _____ at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to Section 24, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 24, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes."

SECTION 4. The sum of \$25,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation, and election.
