Area Cotton Acres Given Big Boost

The 23 High Plains member counties of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. have been assigned a total cotton allotment of 2,191,644 acres for 1969, up 13,086 acres from this year's allotment.

The weighted average of projected yields set for the counties in 1969 comes to 543 pounds per acre. This figure is also up from 1968 when the average was 529 pounds.

Weed Control Program Slated For Area Farmers

Cotton growers in the Lynn County area will have the opportunity to see, hear about and discuss the latest news in weed control on November 29 and December 2 when Diamond Chemicals' "Cotton Caravan" comes to town.

Local cotton growers will see the latest style of mixed-media movie-slide show on the problem of weed control in cotton, how they can effectively control weeds in their cotton, and how to avoid the ever-increasing risk of herbicide damage to cotton crops. This last item is an especially important area of discussion for Tahoka area farmers, since many here and in surrounding cotton-growing areas have experienced crop damage like stunting, root pruning and delayed maturity from the use of certain weed killers during the past season.

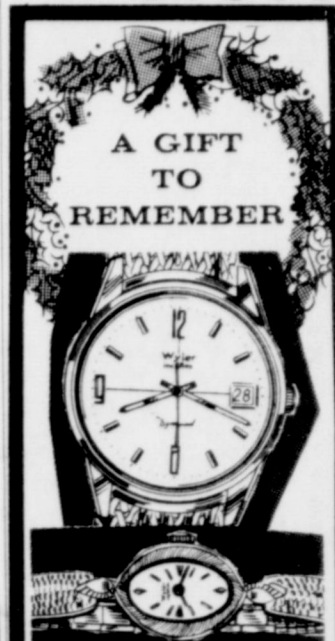

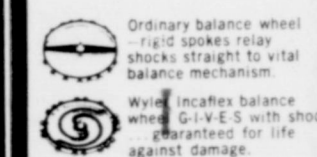

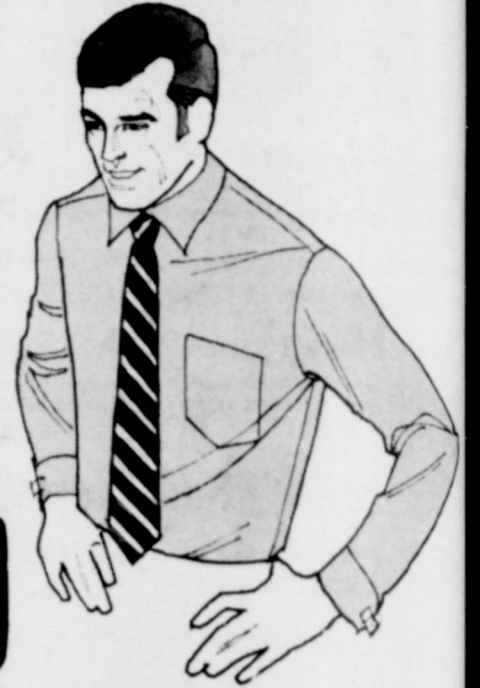

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Secondhand Bargains

Buy a secondhand lawn mower from the man next door and, generally speaking, you take your own chances. If it falls apart sooner than you expected, you would have small chance of getting your money back—at least, in a court of law.

For in the eyes of the law, one ingredient of the typical secondhand purchase is the buyer's acceptance of extra risk. You pay less not only because there is less wear left in the article but also because you don't get the implied assurances that come along with something new.

However, even in a secondhand purchase, you still have a certain degree of protection.

To begin with, you are entitled to know that the article is indeed secondhand. Consider this case:

A music dealer put a used piano, nicely polished, on display among his new pianos—and an unsuspecting woman bought it. When she discovered the instrument was secondhand, she sued the dealer for deceiving her.

"I told her no lies," he protested in court. "She just failed to ask me



whether the piano was new."

But the court ruled in the woman's favor. The judge said the dealer had an affirmative duty to clear up a misunderstanding for which he himself was to blame.

Besides information that the merchandise is used, you are entitled also to a fair description of its identity. Thus:

A man who bought a "1964 Ford," which turned out to be a 1963 Ford, won damages in court—despite the fact that he had bought the car "as is." The court decided that "as is" does not include "as isn't."

Where does the law draw the line between "new" and "used?" In one case an appliance dealer insisted that the TV set he had sold as "new" really was new, even though he had already repossessed it from an earlier purchaser.

"It was new," he explained in court, "in the sense that it was this year's model."

But the court held the second sale invalid because, to the average

customer, "new" means never-before-used.

In short, even in secondhand transactions the law fixes a basic standard of fair dealing.

"Honest men need not fear it," said one judge; "dishonest men should fear it."

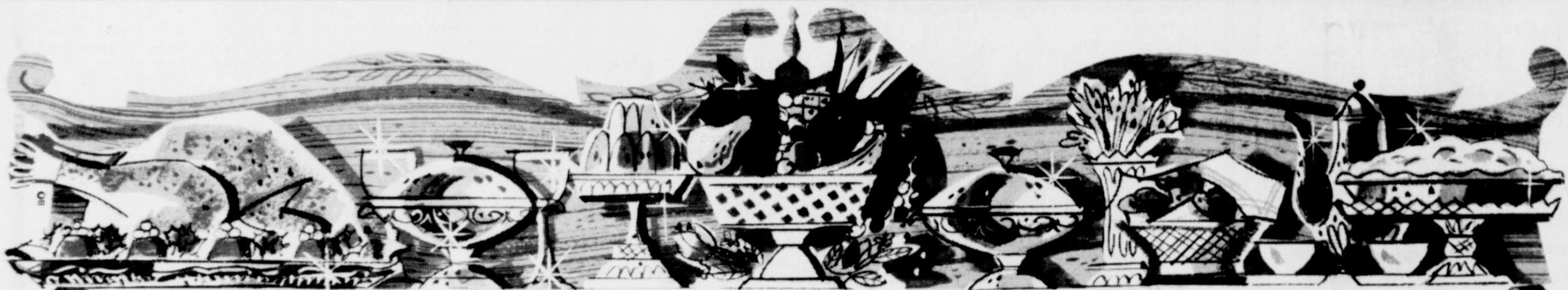

Soil Samples Should Be Taken Following Harvest

The end of the growing season is an ideal time for taking and getting soil samples tested. Don't wait until the spring rush of field work to do this important job, reminds County Agent Bill Griffin.

Common tests are for pH, calcium and magnesium, needed as a basis for liming. Levels of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium are also measured. In addition, suitable methods have been developed for testing for the micronutrient zinc.

Soil sample boxes, information sheets and tips on how to take soil samples are all available from the offices of county agents throughout the state. Griffin added that he would welcome the opportunity to discuss soil sampling and testing with interested persons.

The soil sample must be carefully taken if it is to reflect the actual plant food situation in a given field or pasture. Several samples must be taken at different spots over the field and then mixed into a composite sample.

Each composite sample should be numbered and the information sheet covering the field completely filled out. This information is valuable to the soil scientist when he makes fertilizer recommendations, explains the county agent.
