

Camera as a Side Arm.

If you have your machine with you, rou will sometimes see chances to get a deer or other wild creature, but f you go back to camp for it your opportunity will be gone. If you are o have it with you at all times, it must be light and compact.

The vest-pocket cameras are exellent little machines, but do not answer my purpose, the picture they take being too small without enlargement, and they have no shutter speed (only one-fiftieth of a second.) -Out-



AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE NUMBER TWO. OF ORDINANCE NUMBER ONE, PROHIBITING THE RUNNING AT LARGE OF ANIMALS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF TAHOKA, AND ORDER-ING THE PUBLICATION OF SAME, AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CON-FLICT THEREWITH.

SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Tahoka, tuat Article Number Two of Ordinance Number Oue, prohibiting the running at large of animals within the city limits of the City of Tahoka, be amended so as to read as follows: That any person or persons who shall suffer or allow any horse, cattle, mule, burro, sheep or goat belonging to him, to run at large within the incorporate limits of the City of Tahoka, shall bhall be deemed guility of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than one dollar, nor more than five dollars for each animal running at large and each day said animal is allowed to run at large shall constitute a saparate

SEC. 2. That this Ordinance be published in the Lynn County News, a weekly paper published in Taboka, Lynn County, Texas, and that this Ordinance shall be in effect from and after June 16th,

SEC. 3. That all ordinances here-to-tore passed and published, by the City Conneil of Taheka which are in conflict with this Ordinauce are here by repealed.
