Practically all attempts to reach the American people have been through the medium of the metropolitan press. The people of Mindamao, Moro Province, desire to lay their case before the readers of the conntty press of America, so they may become acquaimed with actual conditions here.
The committee of the Commereial Club of Zamboanga having this important work in charge is composed of Messers. James G. Gregory president, and P. H. Frank, secretary treasurer of the Club, both wholesale merchants, and the undersigned, president of the Bank of Zamboanga. I have been a resident of these Islands since 1889 . with the exception of two tisits to the United States, and short tipis throtgg China, Japan, Malay States, Bomeo, Dutch Celebes and Jata, which countries I shall handle in desctiptive letters later on. It is to be regreted thit a greater ntimber of people have niot intere-ted themselves in the domestication of the buffalo, the wildness of which is due to timidity and not to their ferocity since they have become tractable with gentle and kindly treatment. Of course here on the Goorlnight stock-farm that place set apart for the Buffito consists of herbage covered hills, canyoms and plains, watered by springs stream covered with a varity of grasses and other vegitation, which was the habit of the present herd of Buffalo which thrives apon it, this tract of land was e-p-cialy selected for perpetuating this heard of Buffilo by Colonel coovinight and remains in the state of nature existing when this preserve was fenced and set a part for this purpose
So in the meantime the colonel will undotibily continue fo manage his own aff firs as strcces-folly and in the same public spirited manner as he has in the past and will give to the world as the result of his labors, not only a new race of cattle with the added valuahle characteristics, but practically verifying what was believed to be possible by Darwin. Climatic and health Conditions
The $c$ ' mate of the Plilippines is pleasant, equable and healthful It is doubtful whether any other countly is the world is more favored in this respect. Malarial fevers are rclatively few, predaceous an mals are unknown, and insects and reptiles prejudicial to human life or health extraordinarily few in number. At the level of the sea throughout the entire archipelago the mercury rarely goes below 60 degrees or above 90 degrees Fahrenheit during the entire year From the middle of November until the middle of March the climate is delightful, and from that time on until the latter part of June it
is hot during the middle of the day, but considerably less so than in many parts of the Utiiled sates in the summer
AREA of the phititppine istiands.
The area of the Philippines equals that of England, Iteland, Scothind and Watee, and the Islands are capable of smpporting a population of otre hundred in llion people. It is doub fut if on the face of the eath todil at atea so latge as that of the Phlippifle Islands can be found which contains such a vast population together with such virgin resotures in every litre of industry. So prodig it is trature of het gifts, and so prodtuctive is the soil of the archipelago that only a scratch here and there is trecessaty for the suppott of eight millian people. It must be remembered, however, th it triatked strecess is attaitred here ority as it is attained in other cottilties, that is, by intelligent and ethergetic work.
