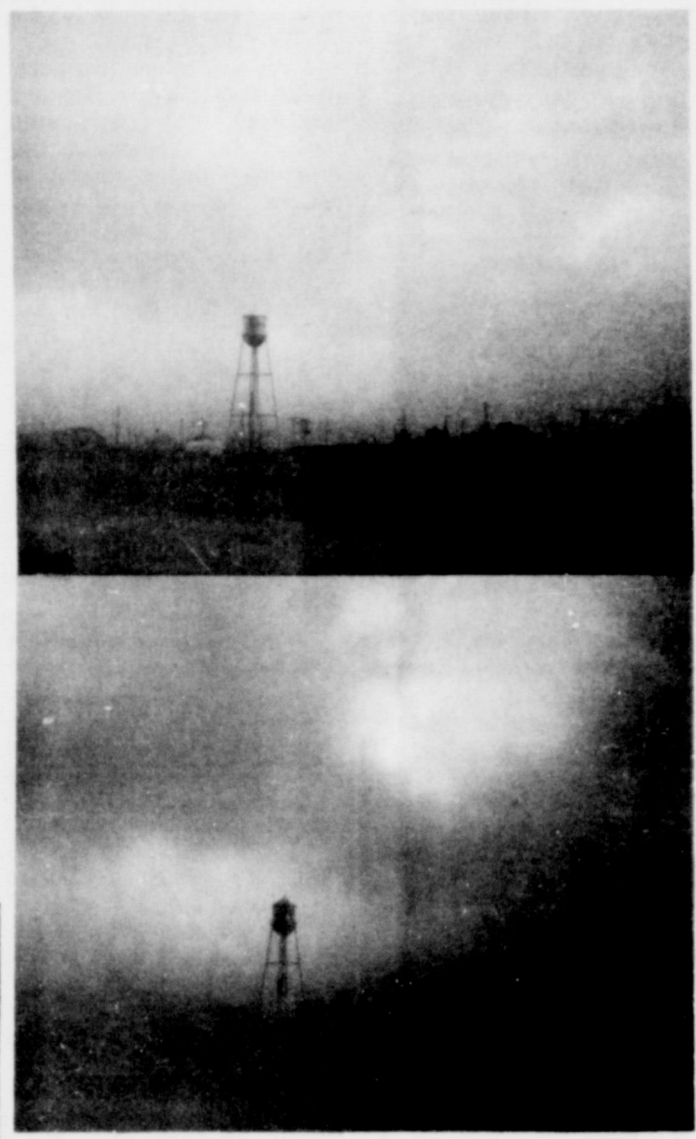
Ann Davis Will Terminate Job

County 4-H Group Will Attend Camp

County Cotton Totals Listed

Lynn County was one of five counties within the Plains Cotton Growers territory, planting over 100,000 acres of cotton during 1967. Other statistics show that 111,111 acres were harvested with a percentage loss of 7.0. The yield per harvested acre was 432, showing a total production of 99,900 in 500 pound gross weight bales for 1967. Lubbock County was tops for the area showing 143,300 acres planted and harvesting 136,000 acres, a 5.1 loss. Total production was 158,500 bales, with a 559 yield per acre.

Personnel, Sick Leave Are Approved By Wilson Board

The Wilson School Board met in regular session on Tuesday, June 25 in the Homemaking Cottage. Items of business included accepting the resignation of Mrs. Gladys Kirtley Comer as 3rd grade teacher and the approval of Mr. Coy Cook as band director and math teacher. The Board adopted a cumulative sick leave program for the teachers, approved minor changes in bus routes for next year, accepted a bid to replace a fender and head light on bus No. 1, approved joining the Media Services of the Educational Service Center, approved transfer in and out of the district and approved a bond budget of \$2,000.00 for the coming year. The Board also heard a financial luncheon report for the school year just ended. The school received \$4,139.89 worth of commodities from the State Department this year. The luncheon fund showed a slight profit at the end of this school year. By joining the Media Services of the Educational Service Center, the school system will have access to several hundred films owned by the center. \$5,000.00 worth of educational movie film were purchased by the center this summer for use this next school year. The school will pay \$1.00 per student to receive this service. The center is located in Lubbock. The sick leave policy adopted by the Board for year accumulative to 15 days. This time can be used for personal illness, illness of someone in the family, or for a funeral of a relative.

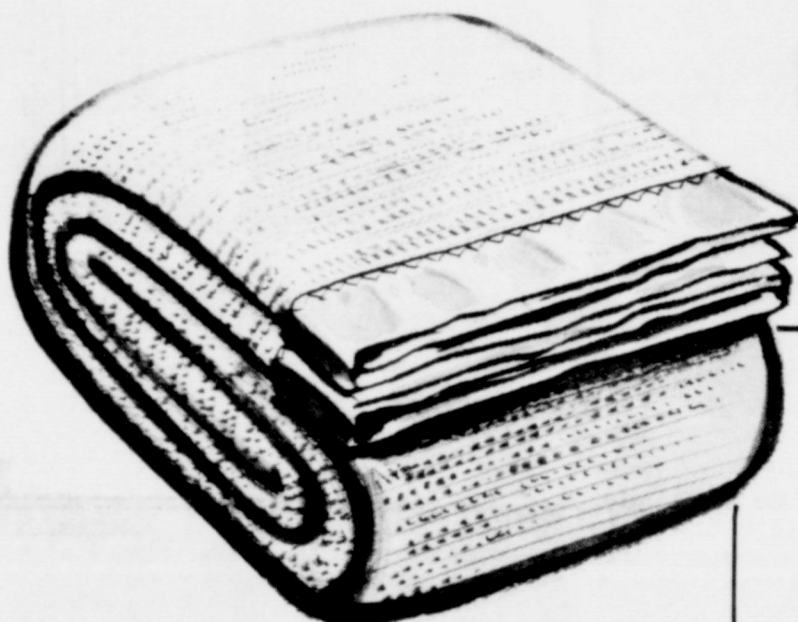

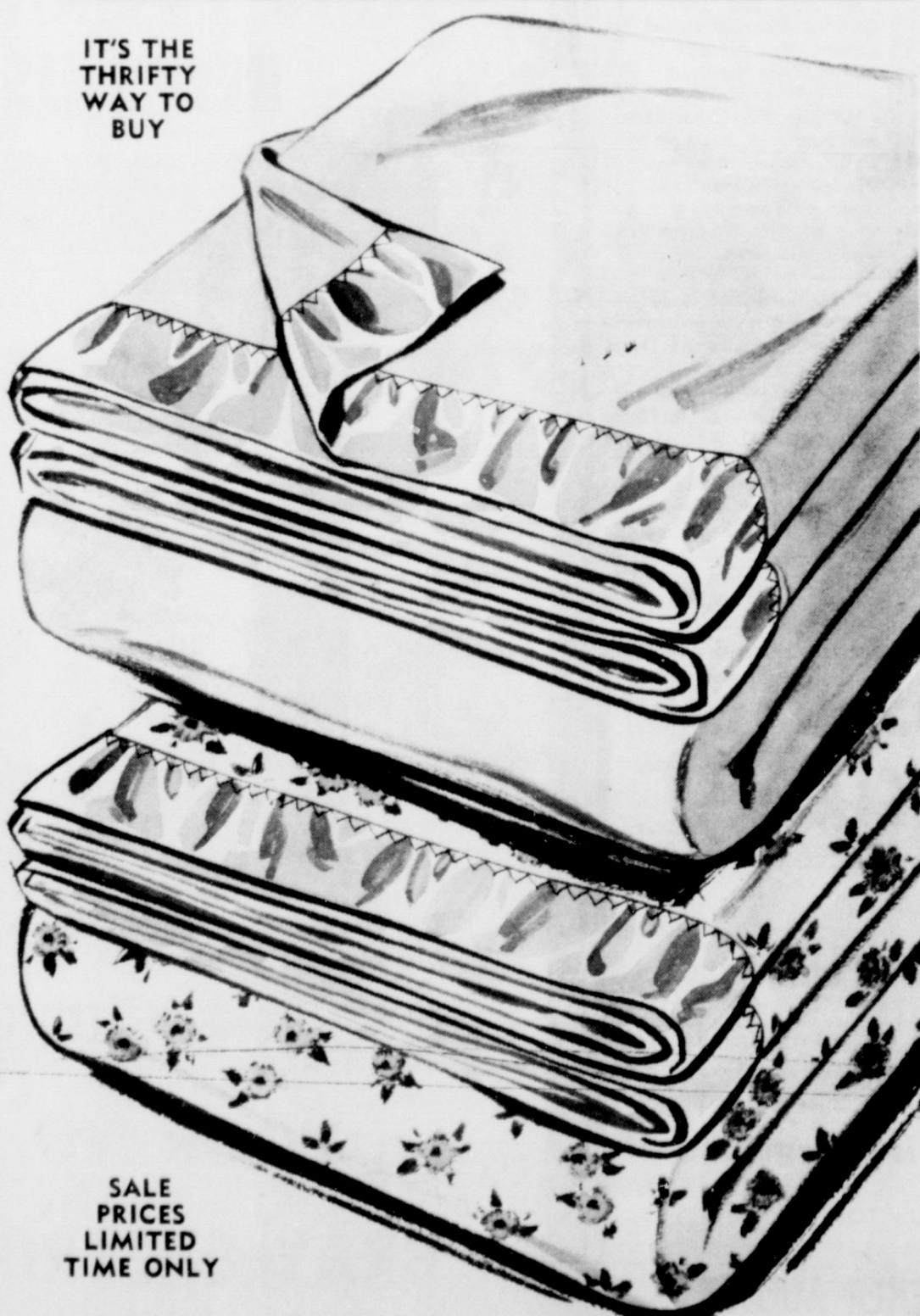

Chemicals Available For Weed Control In Sorghums

Chemicals Available For Good Weed Control In Malze

As that late planted grain sorghum emerges, weeds will likely be springing up too unless pre-emergence herbicidal treatment has been used.

If not, numerous herbicides are available for post-emergence applications, points out Bill Griffin, county agricultural agent. These include atrazine, diuron, 2, 4-D, dicamba (Banvel D) and MCPA. The type used depends primarily on the sorghum and weed size.

Atrazine is widely used and gives good control of both small and large carelessly weeds, says Griffin. At one to two pounds per acre plus one-half percent surfactant, this herbicide will control carelessly weeds less than one inch tall. Apply it in 20 to 40 gallons of water per acre with one to two pints of surfactant.

For large carelessly weeds, Griffin recommends using one to two pounds of atrazine in one to two gallons of special agricultural oil containing enough emulsifier for complete emulsification of 10 to 40 gallons of total carrier per acre. If weeds are difficult to kill, higher rates of oil, water and atrazine may be necessary. Weeds larger than six inches tall may be killed if they are under moisture stress.

Sorghum should be at least two inches tall on silty clay loam and oam soils and six inches tall on fine sandy loam soil that covers most of Lynn County, before atrazine treatment is used, points out Griffin. If two pounds of atrazine is applied with two gallons of oil in an oil-water emulsion, sorghum should be at least six inches tall. Do not apply atrazine or any of other herbicides over the top of sorghum in the boot or flowering stage, cautions the agent. Furthermore, do not use atrazine on loamy sand and sandy soils.

Aerial application of one to two pounds of atrazine per acre in an oil-water emulsion containing five to ten per cent oil gives good weed kill, says Griffin. Limit the total carrier to a minimum of one gallon for each pound of atrazine applied.

Band or broadcast treatments, either directed at the soil or over the crop, also give effective weed control. Do not feed sorghum forage to livestock until 60 days after treatment. Plant only sorghum, corn or winter wheat the year following atrazine application. Drift at the time of atrazine application is not toxic to cotton.

Dicamba and 2, 4D are effective for killing small annual broadleaf weeds, points out Griffin. Yields were reduced considerably last year due to improper timing of application of these herbicides. They should be applied when sorghum is 6 to 15 inches tall. Use caution with larger sorghum. Do not treat after the seed head is beginning to emerge into the tip of the boot. Severe head blasting will occur if sorghum is sprayed over the top after this stage.

Apply dicamba at a rate of one-fourth to three-eighths pounds per acre broadcast over the top of sorghum. Sprays directed at the base of the sorghum will likely cause lodging. Dicamba will drift if wind and application pressure is high although it is not as toxic to cotton as 2, 4-D.

Diuron is another good herbicide for controlling small broadleaf weeds in 15-inch sorghum. Apply it as a directed spray to weeds at a rate of two-tenths to four-tenths pounds per acre in 20 to 40 gallons of water containing one-half per cent surfactant.

MCPA is a new herbicide that is similar to 2, 4D. However, it is somewhat safer and is less toxic to cotton.

Remember, time of application is the critical item with regards to post-emergence weed control in grain sorghum.

Lynn County is included in the list of counties under the Herbicide Law. Before spraying Hormone type herbicides a permit must be secured from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

ever worms are found. While cases are most numerous in southern counties of Texas, positive identification of cases from as far west as Pecos County have been made. New Mexico, Arizona, and California are also reporting an increase in case numbers.

Occasionally a Lynn County farmer will say that he has had a case of screwworms in cattle or swine. I would like to emphasize the need for sending in worms for identification. Should we have a confirmed case of screwworms, the County would receive a fly drop that eliminated the screwworm

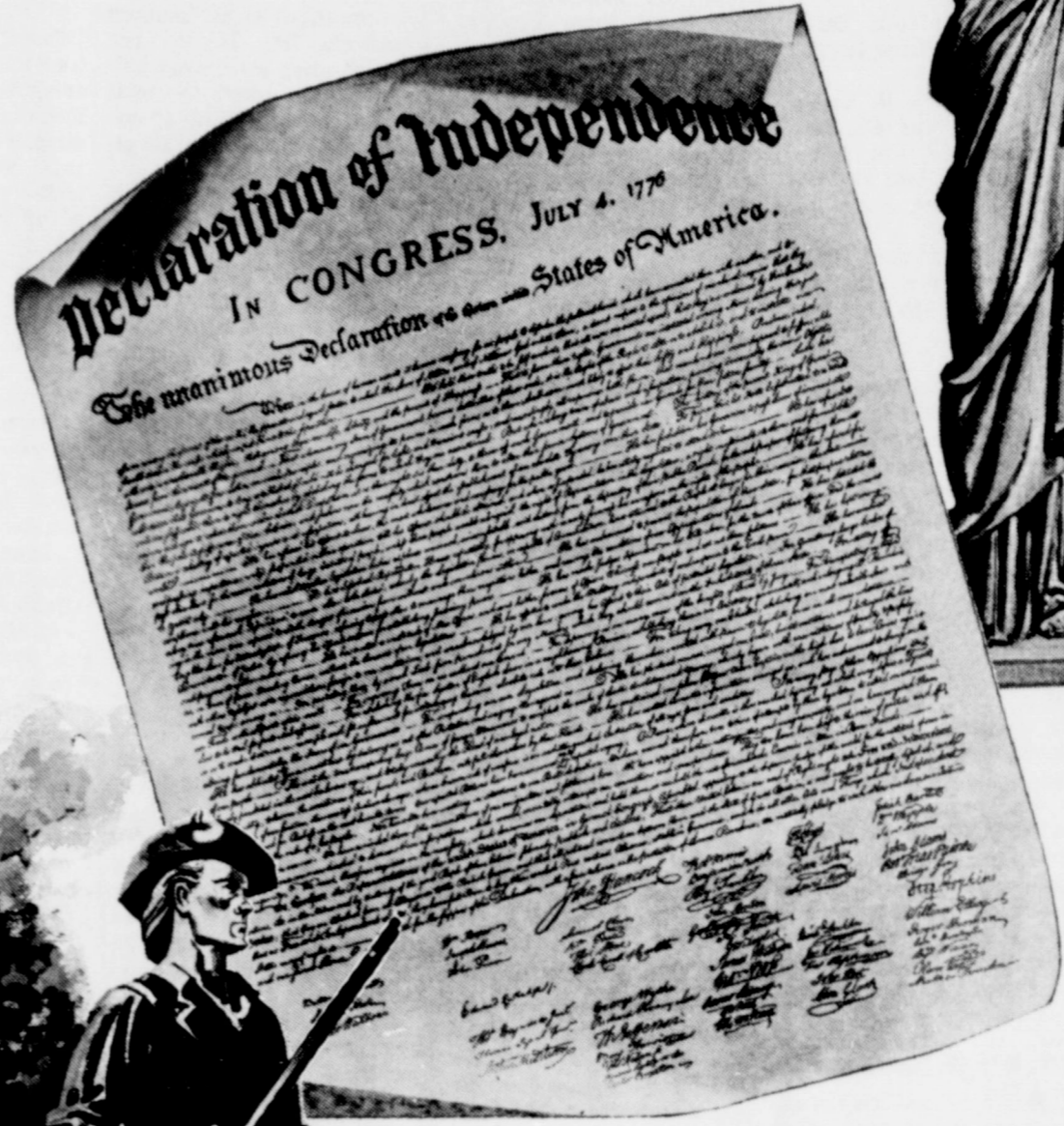
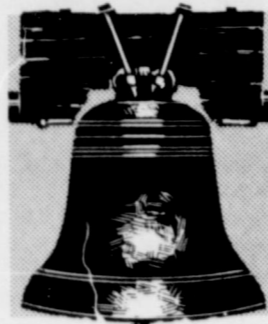

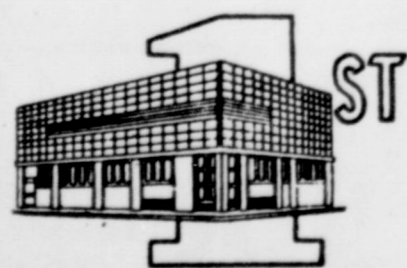
