### The W. H. M. Society.

The Woman's Home Mission Society met in social session Monday afternoon with Mrs. Harry Crie. After devotional exercises conducted by Mrs. Paul Bradshaw, a brief discussion of current business of the society, was followed by a most enjoyable half hour of social intercourse. #### Votes for Women in Denver. "It was a decided mistake to give


