THE SANTA FE RAILWAY

is making good progress with its new lines in northwestern Texas. Already, a line has been completed from Plainview to Lubbock, and by November the steel will be laid from Lubbock to a point in the southeastern corner of Lubbock County. From this point, a line will be built southward to Tahoka, twenty miles; and on to Lamesa, thirty miles farther. The main line of the construction in this territory is from Texico southeasterly, by way of Lubbock, to Coleman, a distance of 275 miles or more. From Lubbock to Coleman the distance is 200 miles, and, between these two towns, the contractors have 500 teams and one thousand men at work. Steel will be laid on this line from Coleman, northwesterly. At Coleman, the new construction finds a spur of the San Angelo branch. From Plainview, a line is to be constructed, immediately, to Floydada, a distance of twenty-five miles. This branch, ultimately, is to be built to a connection with the Coleman line. On the Coleman lines are the towns of Post City, Snyder and Sweetwater. Post City is an entirely new town, platted by Mr. Post of "Postom" fame, who owns nearly all of one county, (Garza), and he designs it to be a model little city. C. E. Brown of Tahoka and C. H. Doak and T. J. O'Donnell of Lamesa have undertaken to obtain the right of way for the Tahoka and Lamesa line, and the work is to be crowded to the limit of possibility.—The Earth.

Votes for Women in Denver.

"It was a decided mistake to give women the right of the ballot," says a woman politician of Denver in Woman's Home Companion for November. The average woman is better than the average man. At least that is my observation. The average politician is as bad as the average man politician—only she is worse! "Women, generally speaking, vote to please the men. There are those who will take issue with this statement, but it is nevertheless true. Perhaps it may be different after women are better educated in political affairs, if that time should ever come, but under existing conditions the women as the men suggest. Left to themselves and uninfluenced by the men, the woman vote would be chaotic. We wouldn't know where we stood in an election till after the votes were all in, because women are influenced by all manner of things the ordinary mortal would not reckon with. By way of example, a really handsome man is a strong asset for any political ticket in Colorado!

"Women are by nature of a trusting disposition in everything save love affairs. It is therefore an easy task for the men to control their votes. For that reason in planning a campaign we decide upon candidates and principals that will appeal to the men and then leave it to them to win their wives, mothers, sisters or sweethearts over to their views."
