Kansom is submitting propositions to the different points along the proposed line and will in the :ca: futare determine on the territory through which it is to be eriencied and fertunate th the e tury through which it is to pass. The property holders aud business men ath along the line are very anxious for the road. It will be a great factor it developitg this wondertul Patrhandle country. It will not oniy extend north to the rich coal fields of Colorado but will give us direct connection with the most importand cities of Central and Southera Texas, and the Guif.of Mexico.
