FARM STATISTICS ALSO GIVEN

Total of 6 459,998 for Entire Country. While Texas Has 435,666, Ok: lahoma 191,791.

Washington.-In the announcement of the population of continental United States as 105,683,108, a gain of 13,710. 842, or 14.9 per cent, Texas holds fifth place in the rank of states, the same as ten years ago. The states leading Texas are in order named: New York, Pennsylvania, Illinois and Ohio, which has been their position for twenty years. New York, with more than 10,-.000,000, and Nevada with 77,407, are the largest and the smallest states in point of population. Oklahoma, which ranked twenty-third ten years ago, now ranks twenty-first

The number of farms in the United states, according to a bulletin just issued, is 6,455, \$98, an increase of 98,-469, or 1.5 per cent. A farm for census purpose is all the land directly farmed by one person, either by his own labor or that of his family and hired help. The greatest number of farms is recorded for Texas, which is 435.-666, a gain of 17,972, or 4.3 per cent compared with ten years ago and an inc: ease of 93,476 compared with 1900.

Oklahoma's farms number 191,791. an increase of .8 per cent, compared with a 76 per cent for the previous ten years. Other southwestern states: Arkansas .32,602, increase of 8 per cent; Louisiana 135,455, increase of 12 per cent; New Mexico 29.841, a loss of 16 per cent.

VAN ZANDT AGAIN HEADS CONFEDERATE VETERANS

Houston, Texas.-General K. M. Van-Zandt of Fort Worth was unanimously re-elected by acclamation and without opposition, commander in chief. of the United States Confederate Veterans at the meeting Thursday afternoon, despite his expressions to the effect that he did not care to continue in the office.

Following his election General Van Zandt appointed general A. B. Booth of New Orleans, adjutant general and chief of staff.

Among the resolutions adopted was one thanking governor Robertson of Oklahoma for his message to the association. Another asked the federal government to return the cotton tax alleged to have been illegally collected immediately following the close of the ver. Still another provided that in the future there shall be one sponsor, three maids of honor, one matron of honor and one chaperon from the association and from each corps, division and brigade This eliminates camps and companies from sending official ladies to the reunions. The respective heads will desigante the official ladies. It was further stipulated that the official ladies must be lineal descendants of confederate vet-

One resolution adopted committed the association to small pensions for old negroes who served with the confederate army. The states are asked to make these allowances for faithful negroes.

REDUCTION IS SEEN IN NATIONAL DEBT

WAS \$200,000,000 LESS ON SEPT 23 THAN IT WAS ON JUNE 30, 1920 RECORDS SHOW

Washington.-The amount of the national debt, in an announcement by secretary Houston of the treasury department, on Sept 25 was \$24,101,110-.91. This is a reduction of nearly \$200. 000,000 since June 30, the close of the government's fiscal year.

In this connection the foreign debt to the United States, or what the foreign governments owe us as a result of war operations, amounts to \$9,450,551.61. The United States originally advanced to nations this amount plus \$114,500,000, which has been repaid. During the war period the world, cave the United States, was on the verge of going broke. The United States was one of the few nations that had cash on hand, and plenty of it, and was willing to spend it to advance the fortunes of humanity.

The heaviest borrower was Great Britain, to which government we advanced \$4,277,000,000 They have repaid \$80,181,641. France got \$2,987,477.-800. and has repaid about \$32,000,000. Belgium received \$349,214,467, and has paid back but \$10,000. Serbia is down for \$26,780,465, of which \$605,-326 has been returned, while Roumania has returned to the United States treasury \$1,794,180 of the \$25,000,000 she received, Cuba got \$10,000,000, and still owes \$9,500,000. Italy down for \$1,631,338,986, Russia for \$187,729,750. Czecho-Slovakia for \$60,524,641, Greece for \$10,000,000 and Liber ... for \$26,000. still owe those amounts A very large percentage of the money was expended by the government; in this country and remained at home, so to speak.

Practically all of the money was loaned at 5 per cent.

CAN NOT LET RUSSIA JOIN GERMAN UNION

Allies to Enforce Treaty Regardless Of Result of Plebiscite.

Paris .- "Important measures" are to be taken to enforce the terms of the treaties with Germany and Austria and prevent a union between those nations, should the proposed Austrian plebiscite decide in favor of the project, according to the foreign office. (The Austrian national assembly on Oct. 1 adopted unanimously a motion calling on the government to carry out within six weeks a plebiscite on the union of Austria and Germany.)

Both Art. 8 of the Versailles treaty and Art. 88 of the St. Germain treaty provide that Austria's "independence shall be inalienable, except with the consent of the council of the league of nations," and Germany is obligated to respect Austria's boundaries as defined in the peace treaty. There has been no suggestion, it is pointed out, that the league of nations would approve a union of Austria and Ger-

Art. 88 of the St. Germain treaty also says: "Austria obligates herself to abstain, unless with the consent of the council of the league, from any act tending to compromise her independence directly or indirectly." and particularly "by participation in the affairs of another power."





Iron and Steel Work in India.

India has already laid the basis of a steel industry in the establishment of two important and successful iron and steel works; namely, the Bengal Iron and Steel works at Kulti, which turns out 100,000 tons of pig iron per month, and the Tata Iron and Steel works at Sakchi, about 155 miles from Calcutta. which has a monthly production of about 20,000 tons. But georgette has a promising rival the realm of blouses. These include also blouses of satin, of duvetyn, and of canton crepe. Crepe-de-chine used for making blouses is not at all a new idea, but it is shown in a new departure, that is, in two colors in a single blouse. The taffeta blouses ought to prove very successful for winter wear, first, because of their good looks and then because they are warmer than georgette, and there is a cheerful brilliance about them. They are often embellished with striped or plaid

Among georgette blouses there are some lovely models in which plain and dainty and beautiful fabric in a figured design partly veiled with the plain material. Plain georgette forms wide panels at the back and front and is extended into sash ends that tie at the sides, terminating in fancy bead ornaments on small silk cord. The elbow sleeves are lengthened by shaped flounces of the plain crepe, and there in taffeta silk among late arrivals in are tiny buttons set close together as a finish down the front.

JESUS BEGINS HIS GALILEAN MINISTRY.

LESSON TEXT-Matthew 4:12-25. GOLDEN TEXT-Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand .- Matt. 4:17. ADDITIONAL MATERIAL - Mark 1:16-20; Luke 5:1-11.

PRIMARY TOPIC-Jesus Chooses Help-

JUNIOR TOPIC-Jesus Teaching and INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC -The Call of the First Disciples. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC -Jesus enters upon his mission.

I. The King His Own Herald (vv 12-17).

1. The reason for (v. 12). The news of the imprisonment of John the Baptist caused Jesus to forsake Judea and go into Galilee. The fate of John he accepted as foreshadowing his own. Because of this, he withdrew from the metropolis and went to the remote regions where his work would attract less attention. When the people wilfully reject the truth and attempt to do violence to the messenger, he should turn from them unless

specially directed otherwise.

2. To whom the proclamation is made (FV. 13-16). The people in Capernaum. This was done in fulfillment of a prophecy in Isaiah 9:1, 2. These people did not enjoy such privileges as those around Jerusalem, This was one of the darkest and most corrupt of the provinces, and now it is getting the light first. This foreshadowed the present age when the grace of God would reach out to the Gentiles. But this is just like the Lord. He did not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance. Master, to go to the most benighted souls with the message of light and

3 His message (v. 17). "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand," This is the same kingdom which John the Baptist and the Old Testament prophets proclaimed. It means the Messianic earth rule of Jesus Christ. This is not our message, for ours is the gospel of the grace of God through faith in the finished work of Christ. We should call upon men to repent and believe the gospel of Christ's death for their sins and resurrection for justification. The time is coming when heralds will again announce the coming of the kingdom, and the King himself will come forth from the heavens to establish his mediatorial kingdom. For this we pray when we intelligently say, "Thy kingdom come."

II. The King Summons Servants to His side (vv. 8:22).

1. His command of authority (v 19). He did not use arguments, but issued the mandate. The King's voice is autocratic. To command is the King's prerogative, not to argue or entreat.

2. The station of the servants called (vv. 18, 21). They were men of lowly birth-fishermen. God chooses the foolish things of this world to put to shame the mighty, that no flesh might boast before him (I Cor. 1:26).

3. They were called to definite service (v. 19). "I will make you fishers of men." He had previously called them to be disciples (John 1:36-42). He now called them to service. This call, then, was not the gospel call to sinners, which is always "Believe on me," but the call to service, of those who had already heeded the call to discipleship. The qualities which made them good fishermen-patience. bravery to face the storm and the night, the perseverance which toiled all night though no fish were caught, would make them good fishers of men.

4. Their prompt -obedience (vv. 20, 22). They gave up their business and homes, not even inquiring where their salary was to come from. They put their trust in him who called, believing that he was able to supply their

III. The King's Triumphal Progress

He went the whole rounds of Galilee teaching the Scriptures, preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing all manner of diseases. He did a threefold work:

1. Teaching the Scriptures in the synagogues (v. 23). The revelation of God needed to be explained. This is what he was doing at Nazareth (Luke

2. Preaching the glad tidings of the kingdom (v. 23). The King who was present and was heralding his own mission was ready to establish his kingdom if they would have been willing to receive him.

3. Healing all manner of diseases (v. 23). There was no form of disease which he could not cure.
