### Mr. Bailey's Speech

In our last weeks issue we printed the speech of Ruben M. Ellerd, in his view, would speak in the name of Senator Bailey, at the house Monday at this place. We did not print the notice to Mr. Bailey, for that is one of the things we are unable to understand. A country newspaper can support its name after all he has said of it. Neither did we care particularly about pleasing Mr. Ellerd, but had simply ignored the paper and therefore we did not know whether he had an audience. We printed the notice as a matter of course, as we do any item, in hopes that some of our readers might be interested, and we will report the speech in this issue for our readers who were unable to be present. Mr. Ellerd began his speech at 2:35 p. m Monday April 27, saying that this controversy was not more than just Bailey or Ellerd, but means the disruption of the Democratic party of Texas, for this fight is being carried on not so much by Baileys personal enemies as by the sworn enemies of true democracy. Mr. Ellerd said he and J. J. Ellerd, who was present and a true friend of Bailey, had another brother who has been reading that arch enemy of democracy, the Dallas News, and has therefore been misled and is against our Joe. He said that he did not like the idea of so many Socialists and Republicans mixing in Democratic affairs; he believed the people have the right to elect their representatives, but this does not mean all the people. We were divided on Hoggism, Bryanism and now on Baileyism. W. R. Hearst is opposed to Bryan and pure democracy and Bailey has been him and his wishes

so all his power is being used to crush Bailey. All kinds of false statements are being circulated against Bailey. When the famous telegram "Save Texas" was sent, purporting to be from Pierce in Missouri to Bailey, Pierce was in another state. The Dallas News is the handbook of Democratic enmity. Bailey's enemies are spending over \$2,000 a day in a vain but malicious effort to defeat him. When Bailey was exonerated at Austin, Hearst scattered his papers broadcast, filled with vituperative statements by the self confessed perjurer Gruett. Bailey has been charged with 42 crimes, some of them felonies, but has been convicted of none. Here are some of Hon. Veal's charges against Bailey "He became a millionaire in seven years, he is said to be worth over \$3,000,000," and others equally as absurd, as for instance, "Bailey is so cruel in his home, that his only daughter committed suicide," when in fact he has only three children and they are all small boys. I had no intention of taking any active part in this campaign, but I was at Hale Center when Tillson in his speech, quit his assigned subject and made an anti Bailey speech. As I followed him I could not help replying in kind. Judge Kinder followed me and he also quit his subject and spoke in no measured terms against Senator Bailey, even going so far as to say "I will quit the Democratic party if they retain Bailey." However, he is getting better and has not bobbed up again since, and I think when he comes down here he will again be a Democrat. To show that I am for pure Democracy and a clean citizenship, is the only reason I am making these speeches. About 100 were present to hear the speech part of which we print above.

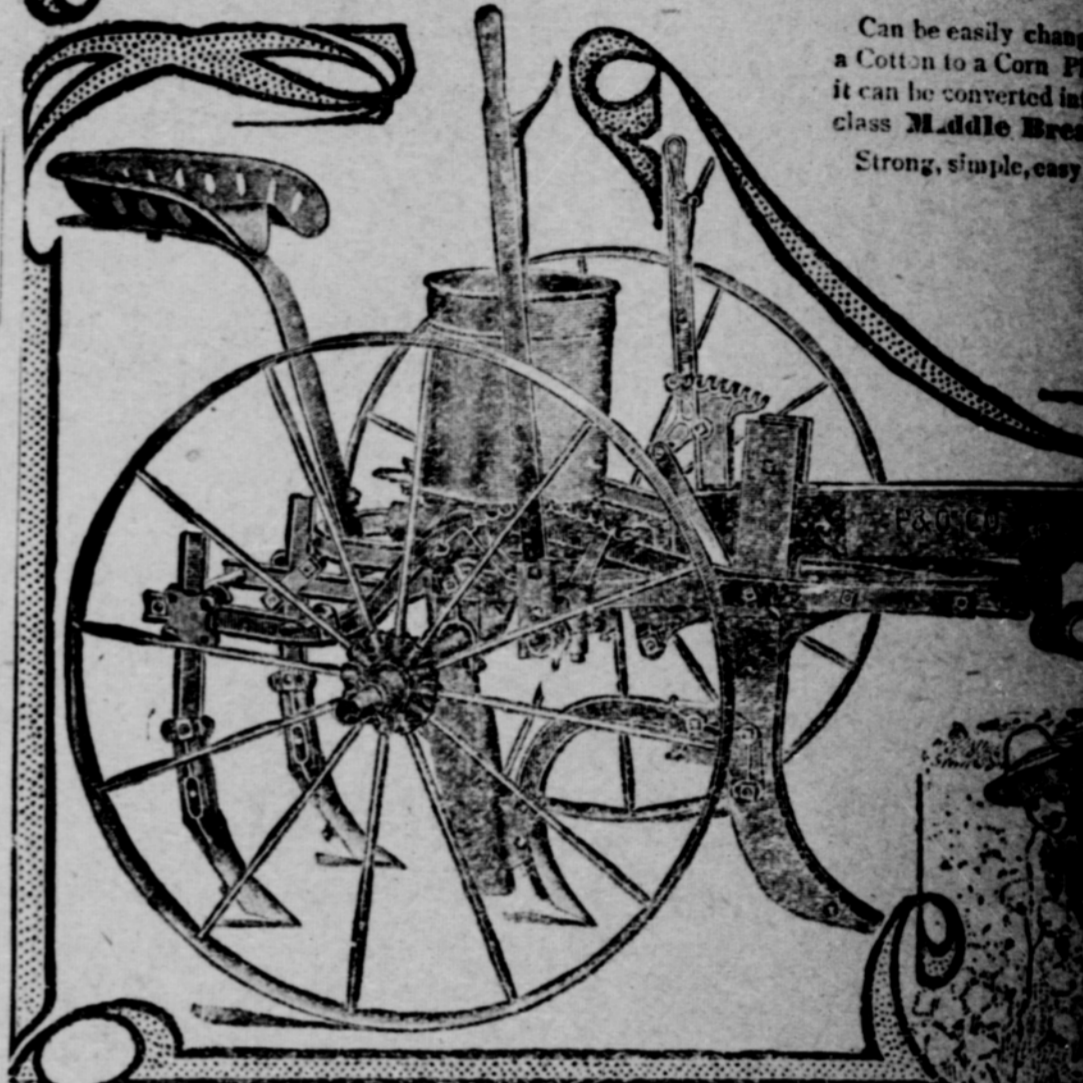
