Housing, 'Appreciation' Cited As Keys To Hiring, Keeping Foreign Help Here

Christmas cards for the families and birthday cards for the kids may be the answer to getting — and keeping — Mexican National workers. That's the system which six of the nation's largest canneries, including Campbell's and Heinz, use effectively to keep their workers happy.

"You gotta provide well for them, you gotta go get them, you gotta give 'em good (and I do mean GOOD) housing and you gotta give them more than just seasonal work," said the word of Henry LeBlac, Texas Employment Commission official from Austin.

He said as much in a talk before members of the Western Texas Farm Labor Association at their annual meeting here this past week. "I had never realized before the important role housing plays."

Pay scale is not as important as comfortable, pleasant surroundings for the workers, LeBlac said. "They have good housing in the Rio Grande valley, houses as good as the U. S. citizens have. They expect the same sort of housing when they move farther north to work."

"And another thing: They don't come 'singles.' They are families, closely knit families,

and they live and work as a unit. If you want Mexican Nationals, then you have to provide family-type housing, much better than the barracks lived in when they were doing the farm work in this country."

LeBlac suggested that the organization look into the possibilities of FHA financing for housing units.

"You can get 50-year loans as an organization for such projects," LeBlac told the association members. "You also can secure financing for such projects on an individual basis, but you can't get 30-year loans; the government figures individuals will die, but organizations will live on. That's the reason for the long loans to organizations."

And he added: "But I want to stress that the housing which you provide for your Mexican

Nationals must be good — not short-gun type of construction. That's why I suggested going the FHA route; if FHA provides the money, then the houses must be standard."

LeBlac stressed the fact that pay scale is not set by the labor department for such workers. "There are hundreds — thousands, in fact — of these Mexican Nationals who are living in the United States on permanent visas. As long as they behave themselves and do not land on relief rolls, they can stay in the United States and work. The only thing they must do is register each year."

"But the government sets no minimum salary for such workers; they are treated in exactly the same manner as are U. S. Citizens, and the pay you give them is determined entirely."

Man 'Forgets' August Rites, Marries Again

A 37-year-old absent-minded man who got married last August and again in February of this year, is in bad with the law on two counts:

1. At Lubbock he's wanted on a worthless check charge.
2. Here he's wanted for bigamy.

The much-married man was picked up by the sheriff's office here this past week at the request of the Lubbock officers. Then it was discovered that he had more wives than the law allows. Accordingly when Lubbock gets through with him, he's to be brought back here and tried on the bigamy charge.

The sheriff's office here explained that the man first took a 40-year-old woman as his wife back last August. Then it seems he forgot all about that little ceremony and in February of this year picked himself

up a woman eight years younger than his August bride. Sheriff's office here didn't know whether he was living with either woman at the time of his arrest.

Except for picking up the much-married man, it was a quiet week here. One person was arrested by the sheriff's department for contempt of court for failure to provide child support as ordered by the court.

One person was arrested on a worthless check charge, and the city lodged a vagrant in the county jail. The highway department arrested one person on a charge of failure to control speed, resulting in an automobile crash, one person for failure to have a safety sticker on his windshield, and one person was arrested by the highway patrol for investigation.

County Spell-Down Slated For Tuesday

Some Bailey county boys or girls who know how to spell "incognominous" or maybe "harpyngits" is going to walk off with the title of champion speller of Bailey county next Tuesday.

The winner will be determined at the county spelling bee in the high school auditorium, starting at 2:30 p.m. Taking part will be 12 of the county's best spellers from six schools. However, each school will send along an alternate, and it's possible the judges will decide to let all contestants — 18, counting the alternates — take part in the event.

Giving out such words as "instantaneous," "munchage," and "molecules" for the spell-down will be Fred Johnson, veteran of the spelling bee series, conducted each year by the Muleshoe Journal and the Bailey County Journal. The winners will take part in the district meet May 1 in Lubbock, sponsored by the Avalanche-Journal.

Acting as judges will be John

Shelton of the Muleshoe State Bank, Robert Alford of the First National Bank, and City Manager Albert Field.

Meantime, this weekend, pupils are doing some last-minute cramming in the little book which is used for the bee "Words of Champions," issued by the National Spelling Bee.

Schools which are competing include Bala, Three Way, Richland Hills, Hilltop, Deshazo and junior high school.

Murder Trial Slated; Special Venire Of 120 Persons Called

Twenty-six-year-old Cornell Solomon, a Muleshoe Negro, is due to go on trial tomorrow on a charge of murder with malice in the beating death of Arthur (Bud) Rayborn, 43, a Clovis Negro.

The death occurred last July 12 following a fracas just outside the Silver Grill Cafe in

Muleshoe's Negro section. Rayborn was found dead at his home Monday by Clovis Police after a neighbor had called the Clovis police to report she had seen Rayborn lying on his bed at moon and again that evening.

Also injured in the fracas was Eula Mae Young, 40, another Muleshoe Negro who received a severe gash on her head. After being treated at West Plains Hospital here and released, she went to the Muleshoe police department and filed charges of aggravated assault against Solomon. He later was fined \$250 on the assault charge after pleading guilty before County Judge Glen Williams.

He was in the Muleshoe county

jail, unable to pay his fine when Rayborn's body was found. Solomon said he hit Rayborn when the latter started to ward him after an argument in the cafe over a half pint of whiskey.

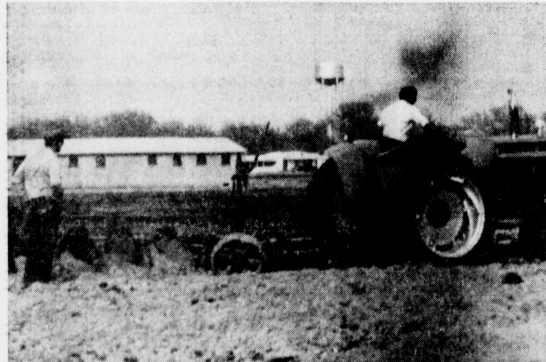

ly by what they are willing to accept."

LeBlanc said, however, that the workers are not interested in mere seasonal work unless it can be worked out with other areas to provide year-round labor for the Nationals.

"If they come in here to harvest your tomatoes in late summer and then are out of a job when the first frost comes, then they are not interested in coming," LeBlanc said, "but if they can be brought in for the entire summer season, using

them for other jobs also that will keep them busy until autumn, then they are interested, and they will work for you. Such an arrangement permits them to do what they work into a plan where they can go north in the summer and south in the winter to work in the Rio Grande. I suggest that you get together and work out an entire - season program for such workers."

At LeBlanc's suggestion Western Texas Farm Labor Association set up a committee to look into the possibilities of F.H.A. housing for the Mexican Nationals.

Association President Virgil Nowell explained that "if housing is one of the problems which we face, then we certainly should study every possibility for creating the needed housing."

He named these men to the study committee: Bill Millen and Horace Hutton, Bailey County; Clarence Martin, Palmer County; G. L. Willis, Castro County; B. T. Hamilton, Lamb County, and J. B. Noiland, Deaf Smith County.

Association Manager Elvon DeVaney said the workers "must be shown they are appreciated, and we are planning special events for them to show that appreciation." He said the Mexican Nationals may be given special recognition at the Independence Day program, for example. "And other events will be planned to show our appreciation," he added.

LeBlanc said 75,000 Mexican Nationals now in Texas "will be leaving soon to go to California and other areas to work during the summer months. If you can meet their conditions, then you might as well have them to work in this area."

It would appear that the labor situation boils down to these facts:

1. Mexican National labor is available if:

A. "Good" housing is provided.
B. Pay is fair.
C. Entire families are permitted to work.

D. Complete season work is available.

E. And if the Nationals are shown appreciation for their work.

Without the braceo program, which was abolished early this

year by the U. S. government, many farm labor associations are finding the going touch. It was brought out at the meeting here this week. However, such organizations can continue to be of unquestioned value to the farmers in lining up domestic and Mexican National labor."

Western Texas will continue to operate despite the fact that a few of those who belonged suggested that the co-op be abolished. Six members withdrew as a result.

Most members, however, seemed to be of the opinion that Western should continue, aiding in lining up help from sources available, such as domestic and foreign workers.

Western Labor Association renamed these directors: Virgil Nowell, Bailey County; Cameron Gault, Deaf Smith County; J. R. Smithson, Castro County; Harold Allison, Bailey County; and Charles Hough, Palmer County. DeVaney continues as manager.
