Gardners and home owners in Lynn County may be not ing the yellowing of leaves on some of their fruit trees. ornamental and lawn grasses during this season. This condition known as cholorsis re sults from iron deficiency.

Chlorosis is caused by the inability of plants to take up sufficient iron which is essential for the development of chlorophyll, the green pigment in leaves.

Primary causes of the dis order are high lime content of the soil and excessive use of phosphate fertilizer.

In addition to fruit trees. oaks and maple, ornamentals such as roses, pyracantha, abelia, hollies and photenia are also suppetible.

Regardless of the type of shrub or tree, chlorosis can easily spotted. Leaves will yellow between the veins early in the growing season. Veins usually remain green but, in extreme cases, the entire leaf yellows and may be almost white in appear ance.

Grass tends to turn yellow in spots and close observation may reveal a striping of the leaf with green veins and yellowing in between.

Chlorosis can be controlled by spraying the foliage until wet with solution of iron sulfate (copperas). For trees and shrubs, use two level teaspoons of copperas per three gallons of water and include about one and onehalf teaspoons of liquid household detergent to in sure even coverage. For grasses, increase the amount of copperas to three level teaspoons in the same mixture. Three or four applications at weekly intervals may be required for effective control.

In addition to foliar spray. soil applications of copperas is recommended. One pound of copperas per 100 square feet of a rea broadcast and watered in is adequate

producers on the High Plains of Texas have another weapon at their disposal for use in controlling weeds. The new procedure is aerial application of atrazine and propazine.

"Field trials with aerial application of these herbi cides in 1966 and again in '67 gave excellent control of carelessweeds." points ou! Dr. Allen F. Wiese, who heads up the weed control program for the area. He is located at the USDA South western Great Plains Re search Center here.

"Results of these trials have resulted in significant changes in weed control in grain sorghum." he says. 'to include labels for aerial application of both atrazine and propazine.

Furthermore, the tests showed that a minimum a mount of carrier to be used in aerial application would be one gallon of carrier for each pound of herbicide to be applied. Ground application studies in conjunction with aircraft trials indicate that the total amount of carrier can be safely reduced to 10 gallons per acre. Wiese ex plains.

"Apparently, the most important consideration when applying either atrazine or propazine is good coverage. the researcher points out "Total gallonage of the car

rier is of minor importance. "Both pre- and post-emerg ence aerial applications were studied." Wiese points out. "In the pre-emergence trial one and two pounds of active ingredient of propazine per acre was applied in two and one-half and five gallons of water carrier per acre, re-
