Fifteen Accidents Recorded Last Month

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 15 accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of May, according to Sergeant H. E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, 16 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$15,257.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first 5 months of 1969 shows a total of 31 accidents

resulting in 3 persons killed, 34 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$31,417.00.

Lubbock - Key agricultural leaders and agribusinessmen from 19 South Plains counties will meet in Lubbock today to discuss and formulate plans to boost the economic development of the area.

Purpose of the meeting is to revitalize unified efforts of the South Plains Development (SPD) Program which was launched about 2 years ago. Officers and an executive committee will be elected.

The 19 counties participating in SPD are Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Gaines, Dawson, Borden, Andrews, Martin, Howard, and Midland. County Program Building Committees in each of these counties have played an important role in the program and will be instrumental in its future success.

The Bronze Star Medal was awarded for meritorious service in connection with military operations against a hostile force. Date of the

action was during May 1968 to May 1969.

The Air Medal was presented for distinguishing himself by meritorious achievement while participating in sustained aerial flight in support of combat ground forces in Vietnam during May 1, 1968 to December 8, 1968.

Sgt. Cline has signed up for another tour of duty and is presently assigned to the Far East theatre of operations.

The resignation of Gordon Shultz, band director, was accepted. Mr. Shultz has accepted a similar position with the Rankin Schools.

Other business included authorization of participation in the State Supplemental Salary Aid Program for the 1969-70 school year. The cafe-

teria operations report and financial statement were reviewed. The operation showed a net profit of \$51.58 for the 1968-69 school year and a May balance of \$6,949.50.

The Average Daily Attendance report showed 995.48 for the current school year, compared to 1,006.16 for the 1967-68 year. The average membership for 1968-69 was 1,053.15 compared to 1,070.60 for the previous school year.

ing, who is replacing Mrs. Pat Scott.

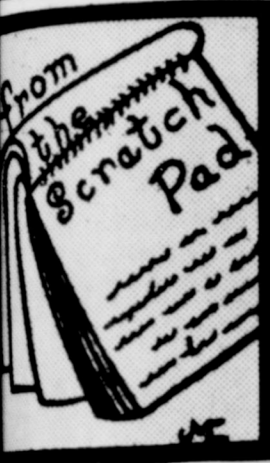

We apologize for the lack of information concerning some of these, and too, wish that reproduction could be as good as some of the memories cherished by you, the Old Settlers of Lynn County.

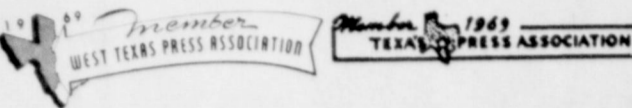

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Man has not yet been able to invent a milk machine that is better than the cow. The cow converts fortified rough feed into a highly nutritious food: Milk.

But man has done a lot of things to that milk. He has purified it, homogenized it, evaporated it, dried it, soured it, flavored it, taken out the fats, and left some in. And all of this to please the homemaker.

Dairy month - June - which glorifies milk, has the support of the nation's 4-H members engaged in a dairy foods project.

The Carnation Company of Los Angeles has a stake in June, too, as sponsor of the national 4-H Dairy Foods program. More than half-a-million 4-H'ers participate in the program, according to an estimate made by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Carnation has provided incentive awards in the program for the last 22 years. This year a new state award has been announced. It is an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

Previously the top state award was a handsomely engraved wrist watch.

The six 1969 national champions will receive \$600 scholarships. Medals of honor will be presented to those who qualify for the four county awards.

Projects vary throughout the area, but most center around preparing main courses, desserts, salads, and snacks from dairy products.

Meal planning and cooking with dairy foods adds variety to the menu and most of all, insures better nutrition for the family.

Showing how it is done and explaining some of the scientific reasons why certain things happen during cooking are demonstrated by the youthful cooks. They learn a lot about nutritional make-up of milk, and why milk is one of the best and cheapest foods for growing boys and girls.

Recipes of the Month

Patio Summer Salad
Salad Mold 5-cup 6-8 servings
1 pkg. lemon-flavored gelatin
1 cup boiling water
1 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Dash of salt
2 cups applesauce
1 cup diced celery
1/4 cup diced pimento
4 cups cottage cheese

Dissolve gelatin in boiling stir in lemon rind, lemon juice and salt. All apple-sauce, celery, and pimento; mix well. Pour into mold, which has been rinsed with cold water. Chill until set. Serve with cottage cheese.

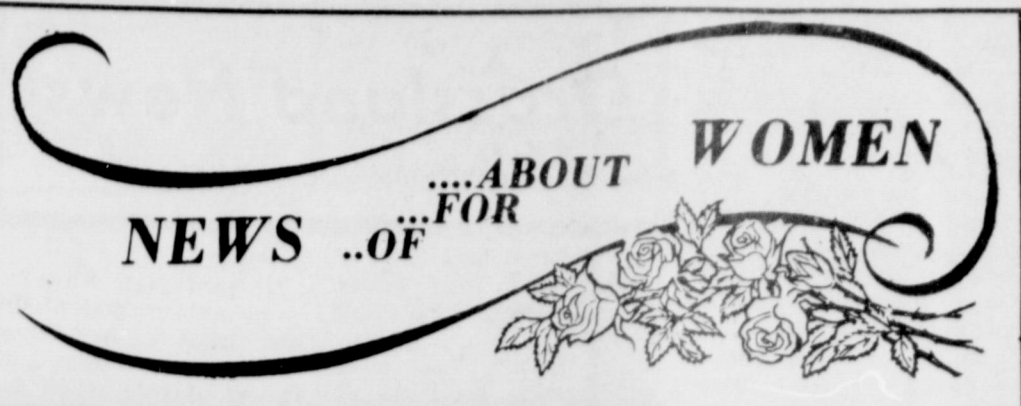
The bride is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Gagnat of Lubbock.

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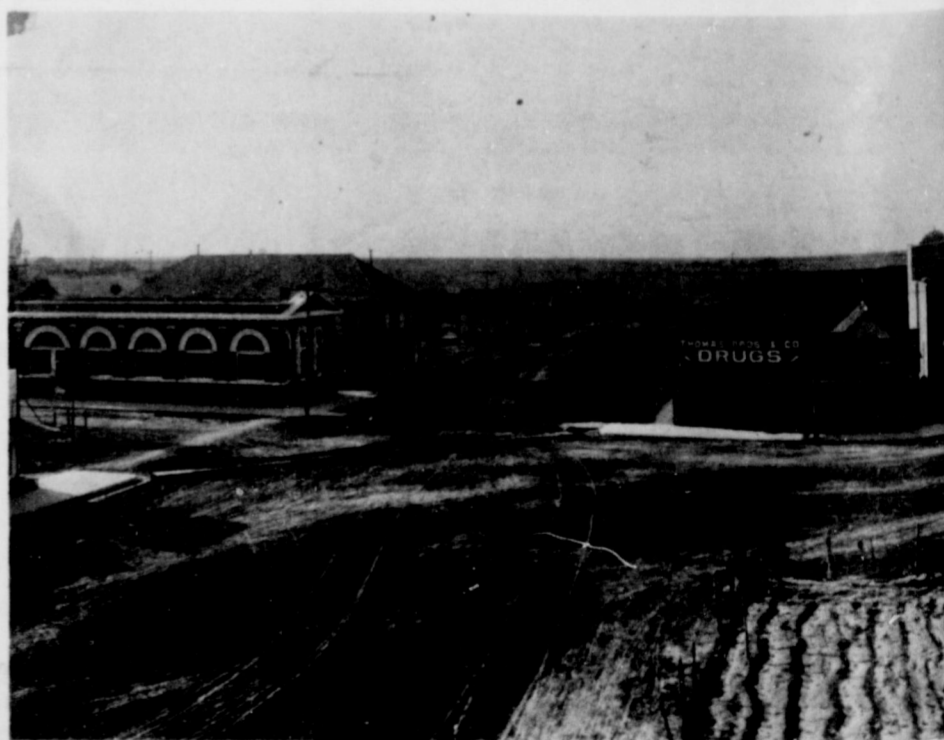
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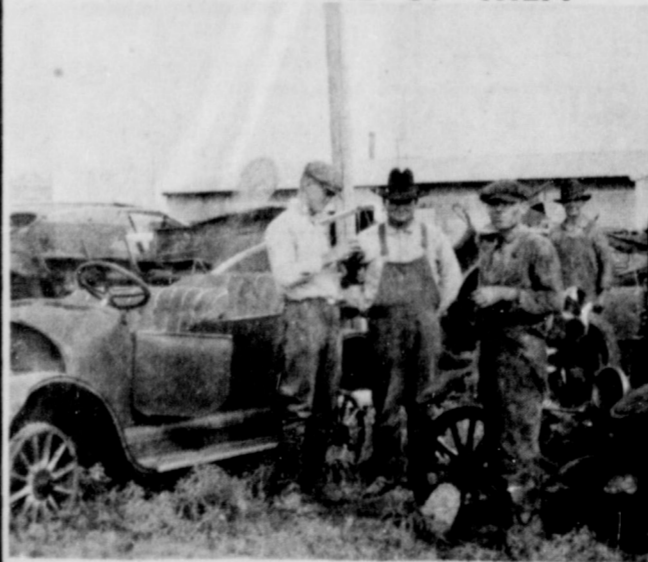

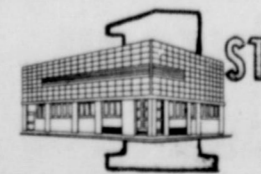

"Marry Me—I Dare You"

During a teenage party, one of the girls tossed a playful challenge at her boy friend: "Marry me—I dare you!" The idea seemed so hilarious that they drove across the state line, found a justice of the peace, and went through a formal wedding ceremony. Afterward, both the "bride" and the "groom" returned to their respective homes. A few days later, uneasy about what they had done, they went to court to have the ceremony annulled. And the court ruled that, despite the formalities, they were never truly married.



"Mere words," said the judge, "without any intention corresponding to them will not make a marriage." Most courts agree that, if a marriage is purely in jest, it has no legal standing. However, it is a different story if the marriage—although meant to be temporary—is no joke. Thus: An engaged couple had a bitter quarrel the night before their wedding day. In tears, the girl said they should break up. But the young man pleaded: "My boss has promised me a raise on the basis of our getting married. Let's go ahead so I can get the raise. Then, later, we can

have the marriage annulled." But in this case, the court refused to grant an annulment. The judge said this ceremony, even though entered into for a special, limited purpose, was still a marriage at the moment it was performed.

What about a "trial marriage"? One couple got married with the private understanding that, if things did not work out, either one of them could have it annulled. But here, too, the court found no grounds for annulment. As one judge put it: "Marriage is not something to

be swept aside lightly. To permit the annulment of a marriage otherwise legal, upon mere proof that the parties agreed beforehand to have it annulled, would destroy the dignity of the marriage relationship."

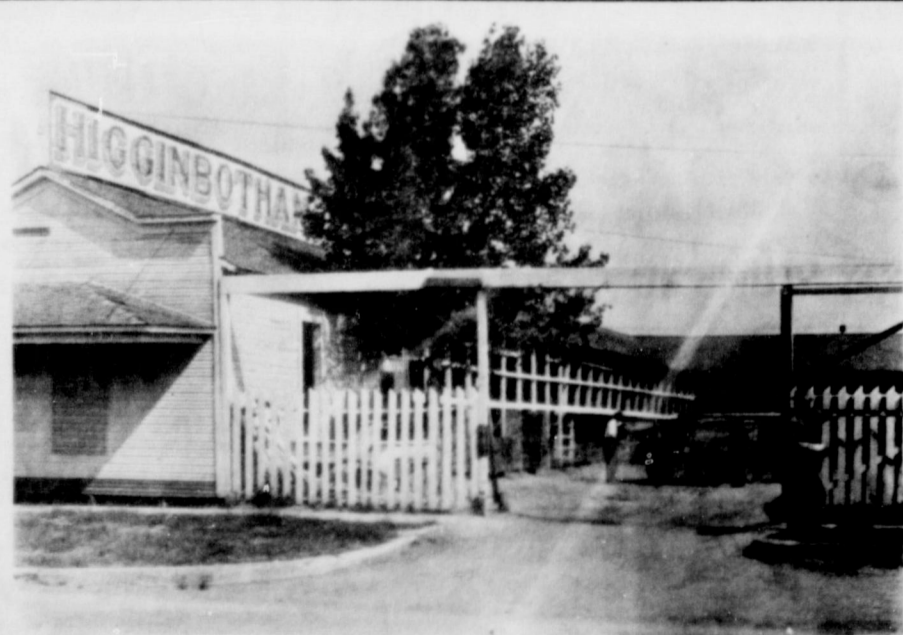

In the swimming pool at an amusement park, a small boy—gripping the edge—slowly pulled himself toward the deep end. Nearby sat a lifeguard. But the lifeguard was showing less interest in small boys than in big girls. Finally one beauty so captured his attention that he left his post to take her for a stroll. By the time he returned, the boy had drowned.

Was the management legally liable for the boy's death? A court said yes, because the tragedy probably could have been averted if the lifeguard had been doing his duty.

Not only amusement parks but also hotels and motels are, with growing frequency, providing swimming pools for their patrons. These pools, privately owned but open to the public, are subject to certain basic rules of negligence law.

First of all, the management must take all precautions reasonably called for by the peculiar hazards of the sport. That includes not only safe facilities but also adequate policing of behavior.

Thus, a hotel was held liable when a woman swimmer was hit in the face by a large, heavy ball. Four youths had been hurling the ball around the pool at full speed—a game which, said the court,

could and should have been halted by those in charge. However, policing cannot be expected to make accidents altogether impossible. In another case, a boy was injured when a companion suddenly shoved him off the diving board.

But this time the court put no legal responsibility on the management, since even the strictest supervision would not have prevented such an impulsive and unpredictable prank.

Furthermore, the victim himself may be guilty of negligence if he fails to exercise common caution. For instance, a court held it was negligent for a poor swimmer to enter the deep end of the pool when he was already suffering from cramps.

What if the cause of the mishap remains a mystery? As a rule that relieves the management of responsibility.

In one case, a girl wading in a hotel pool suffered a bad cut when she stepped on a fragment of clear glass. No one knew how long the glass had been there. No one knew how it had gotten there in the first place.

Under these circumstances, the court denied the girl's claim for damages. The court felt that blaming the hotel for such an unexplained accident would be sheer guesswork.

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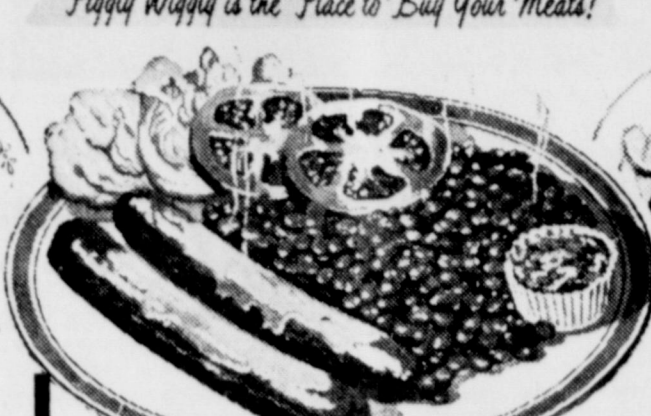
