Hospital Funds Approved

Garland Thornton, president of the Lynn County Hospital District Board, informed the Lynn County News that a \$365,000 grant has been approved by the Texas State Health Department, at a meeting on December 8.

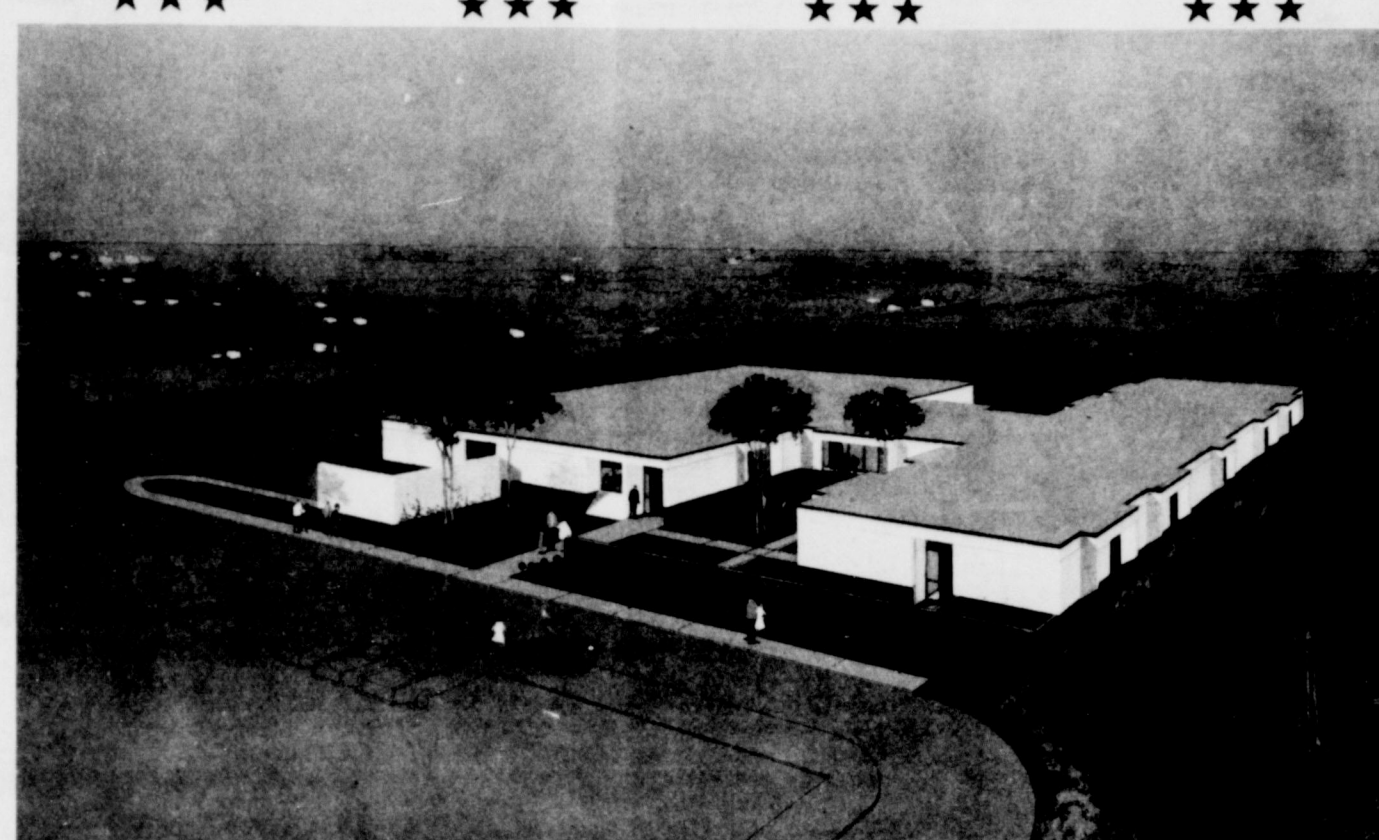
The proposed hospital will have 24 beds and complete operating, diagnostic and laboratory facilities. Estimated cost of construction and facilities is \$700,000.

A popular election was held in November 1967, at which time the Lynn County Hospital District was confirmed and bonds in the amount of \$365,000 were approved.

The Hill-Burton program of the United States Congress appropriates money annually, to be designated to various states for grants. These grants will enable communities to build or improve hospital facilities. These grants match funds voted by the particular local hospital governing body.

A site for the local hospital will be selected in the near future by the district's Board or Directors. Plans will also be finalized in order that bids may be let for construction later this spring. Construction time is estimated at one year.

Tax Collections Over Halfway Mark For 1968

Tax collection to date for 1968 are at 68% complete, according to George McCracken, County Tax Assessor-Collector. This figure, percentage-wise, is the same as for the same period in 1967.

The net received to date for November is \$15,942.06, compared to \$14,232.83 in 1967. The only difference over the 1967 collection is that the hospital taxes are included for this year. Discounts for November totaled \$329.65 which was just above the last year total.

The October, 1968 total collected was at 63% complete with \$197,749.44 received and discounts totaling \$6,112.28. These figures also were above the amounts recorded for the same period in 1967.

The tax figures reported are collection for state, county, High Plains Water and hospital. Also, these are before fees and commissions yet to be paid.

Voter registration is below that of October-November, 1967, 988 persons registered that year in October and 433 for November. To date for 1968, 786 persons signed the rolls in October and 193 during November.

Mr. McCracken reminds taxpayers that the early payment discounts will end this month, with full tax notice figures being collected beginning January 1.

City Wells Used Since September

A local citizen complained one day recently about the quality of the Canadian River water, not knowing that City of Tahoka has taken no water from the project since September.

Tahoka started receiving water from the project in April, but by September had used its quota of 45 million gallons, states Milton Uzzle, city administrator. Since that time, local city wells have been used.

Next year, however, Tahoka's quota from the Canadian project will be 90 million gallons and this will increase slightly each year unless a drought cuts down on the Meredith Lake on the Canadian intake.
