## Hospital Funds Approved

Garland Thornton, president of the Lynn County Hospital District Board, informed the Lynn County News that a \$365,000 grant has been approved by the Texas State Health Department, at a meeting on December 8.

The proposed hospital will have 24 beds and complete operating, diagnostic and laboratory facilities. Estimated cost of construction and facilities is \$700,000.

A popular election was held in November 1967, at which time the Lynn County Hospital District was confirmed and bonds in the amount of \$365,000 were approved.

The Hill-Burton program of the United States Congress appropriates money annually. to be designated to various states for grants. These grants will enable communities to build or improve hospital facilities. These grants match funds voted by the particular local hospital governing body.

A site for the local hospital will be selected in the near future by the district's Board or Directors. Plans will also be finalized in order that bids may be let for constuction later this spring. Construction time is estimated at

## Tax Collections Over Halfway

Tax collection to date for 1968 are at 68% complete, according to George McCracken, County Tax Assessor-Collector. This figure, percentage-wise, is the same as for the same period in 1967.
